What part the American small business man must play in Uncle Sam's World leadership will be pictured to Chamber of Commerce members at their annual

banquet in Gatesville, Thursday evening, March 25.

Under the title of "World Leadership or Oblivion", Stanley W. Foran, Dallas business man, will picture the enlarged opportunity presented American business and professional leaders in today's shrunken post-war world; with U. S. A. pitched into the position of Number One Nation.

Against a background of thirty years in sales management, merchandising, advertising and public relations work, Mr. Foran has made nearly 2,500 talks since 1938 emphasizing the past accomplishments and futureibilities of the American way of life.

Born in Detroit and receiving his early professional education in the swiftly-growing motor car industry, Mr. Foran wrote advertising and publicity for many automobile makers including Ford and Studebaker. Resigning in 1917 as Advertising Manager of the Scripps-Booth Motor Car Co. at Detroit to enter World War I as a U. S. Army aviator he returned to civilian life at Grand Rapids as part owner of the leading advertising agency in Western Michigan.

Subsequently as sole or part owner of three successful advertising agencies in the East and Southwest, he had a hand in marketing and building good will for many of America's leading producers of goods and services including heavy machine industries, railroads, banks, utilities and petroleum products marketing organizations.

Landowners Being Contacted to Lease Camp Hood Area

According to information as furnished by the U. S. Engineers at Fort Sam Houston, former landowners of two tracts have been written to inquire as to their desire to lease land formerly owned by them and also additional land.

The U. S. Engineers only want to know whether or not they are interested, and their inquiry does not constitute an obligation on the part of the land owners to lease the land should they answer in the affirmative. The Engineers must have answers to these inquiries to formulate plans for leasing of these two tracts.

Following a telephone conversation with the Engineer's office in Fort Sam Houston, Dawson Cooper, President of the Chamber of Commerce states: "I am advised by that office that no details nor plans for the leasing of the land have been prepared, and all the Engineers want to know now is if the landowners are interested in leasing the land. They tell me that at a later date a representative will be here to contact each individual. Stating they desire to lease the land does not obligate them in any way. I urge all former owners to write in immediately if at all interested."

The two tracts which may be leased are on the northwest corner of the camp area. The large tract of about 14,000 acres is bounded on the east by West Range Road, on the south by the old Browns Creek Road, and on the west and north by the camp area boundaries. The other tract of about 8,000 acres is bounded on the east by the old Georgetown Rod, on the south by the Cow House Creek, and on the west and north by the camp boundaries.

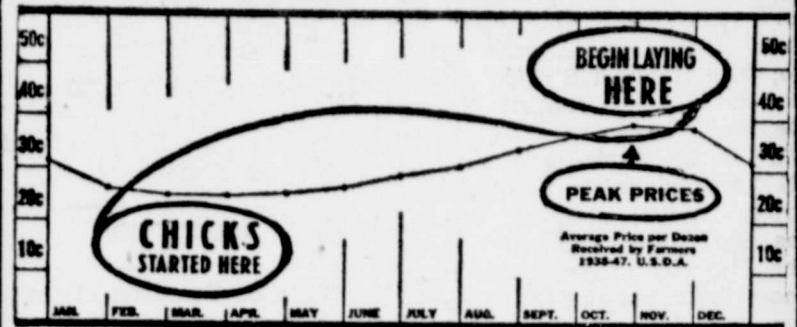

SAFE DRIVING

At the baseball game, you can't tell the players without a score card, and behind the wheel, you can't drive safely without knowing traffic laws and obeying them according to W. J. Elliott, Chief of the Texas Highway Patrol.

"It's as simple as that," he said. "You can't be a safe driver unless you are a smart driver—and you are not smart unless you know and obey traffic rules."

Accident reports indicated left turns at intersections as one of the common situations which cause trouble because drivers do not know the rules. As part of the nationwide "Know and Obey Traffic Laws" program in which the Texas Highway Patrol is participating, he listed the following things a driver should remember about right-of-way on left turns.

1. When you are turning left, you must give the right-of-way to a car in the intersection or approaching closely.

2. When you are approaching the intersection and a car which has been waiting in the intersection to turn left (then starts to make the turn) you must allow it to make the turn in front of you.

3. When you turn left, be sure you are in the correct lane and that you give a signal.

4. Don't insist on your right-of-way at the risk of an accident.

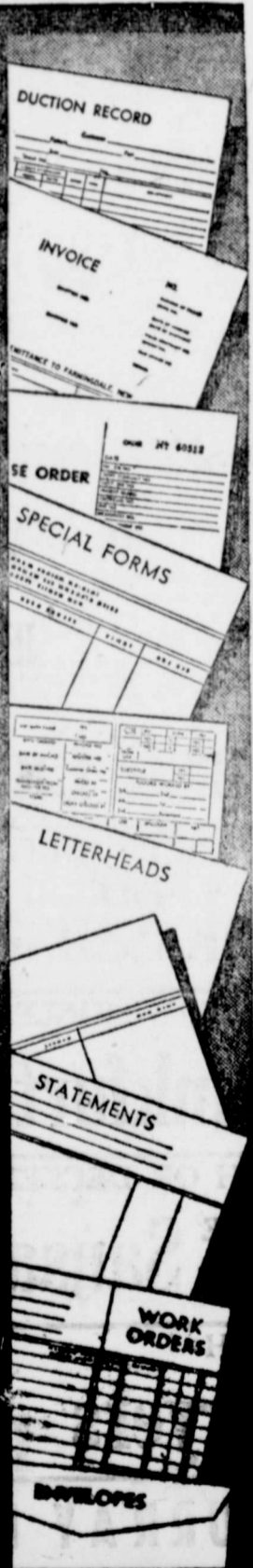

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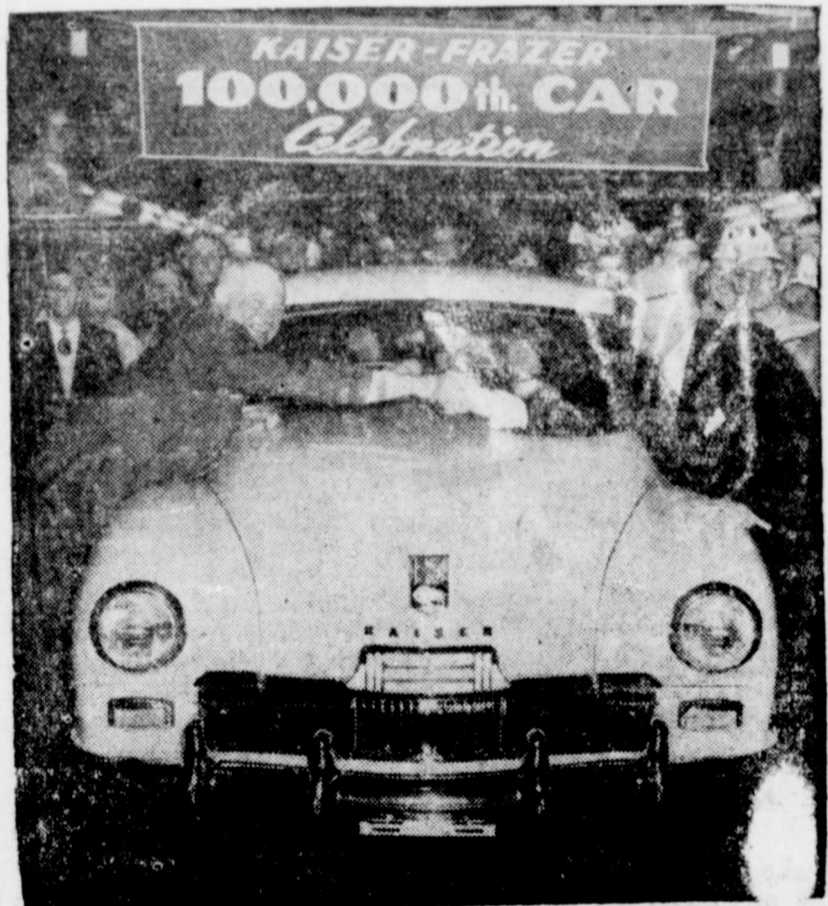

DEAR FRIENDS:

We are about to come to the end of a very active week of legislation. A great number of Bills have been before the House. From our standpoint, I think that the urgent Deficiency and the Civil Functions Appropriations Bills were the most important, although it is probable that the extension of rent control received more attention.

The rent control bill simply extended controls for thirty days. Presumably this was done in order to enable the Republican leadership to have additional time in which to decide whether they wanted to continue control or not. As I see it, rent control clearly shows the difficulty of maintaining a partially controlled and partially free economy. The owners of rental property have to pay the same increased cost of living that others have to pay. In many cases they have no other income, and in my opinion they are entitled to receive a fair return on their property. I don't think that any one group should be penalized for the benefit of another group. This Bill made no effort to correct this injustice. I voted against it.

The Urgent Deficiency Appropriation Bill was a more or less routine measure providing certain funds that were urgently needed to keep certain activities going. Before this Bill was brought up, I discussed with members of the Committee the desirability of adding funds for the REA. They all stated that they would have to oppose any effort to place such a large item as this in the Bill, but stated that if we would wait a couple of weeks they would give us a chance to put the amendment on the regular Deficiency Bill. I felt that this was a fair proposal but some of our members insisted in offering an amendment to this Bill. It was defeated by a vote of 151 to 181. I fully realize the need for this additional money and voted for the amendment even though I felt that the strategy was bad. It doesn't ordinarily help the chance of a proposal to have it defeated by a record vote. Most of the members will find it difficult to later change their votes even though they might like to do so.

REA must have the authority to borrow more money in order to enable it to finance local cooperatives that want to order wire. With wire and other materials as scarce as they are, the local cooperatives must order now if they are to get materials two or even three years from now.

now. They do not have to spend the money now but they must have it, or else the suppliers will sell all of their materials to the private owner companies who have the money in the bank. Just as a matter of practical politics, I know that since most of the Republicans voted against providing these funds, they will probably continue to withhold them until the House votes on an amendment offered by a Republican. I want the funds for REA and I shall support such an amendment regardless of who offers it.

The Civil Functions Bill carries the appropriations for flood control. It contained \$4,000,000 for the continuation of work on the Whitney Dam. This great project is well under way and while I had hoped to get an extra million dollars this year, we will be able to continue the work that is now going on.

I consider it a mistake to offer an amendment to insert a certain appropriation unless there is a good chance of passing the amendment. It is evident that no one could add any new projects to this Bill. Several members, from other States, tried it but everyone of them lost. I think they weakened their chances of receiving support in the Senate later this Spring or in the House next year. For that reason, I did not offer any amendment to provide any funds for the commencing of work at Miller Springs on Leon River. However, I did speak and again remind the House that the Little River Valley has experienced the worst flood in the United States and was entitled to prompt and effective aid.

I am disappointed in not getting money to start work on the Miller Springs Dam, but I expect to keep working on it and still hope we will be able to get favorable action.

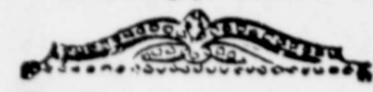

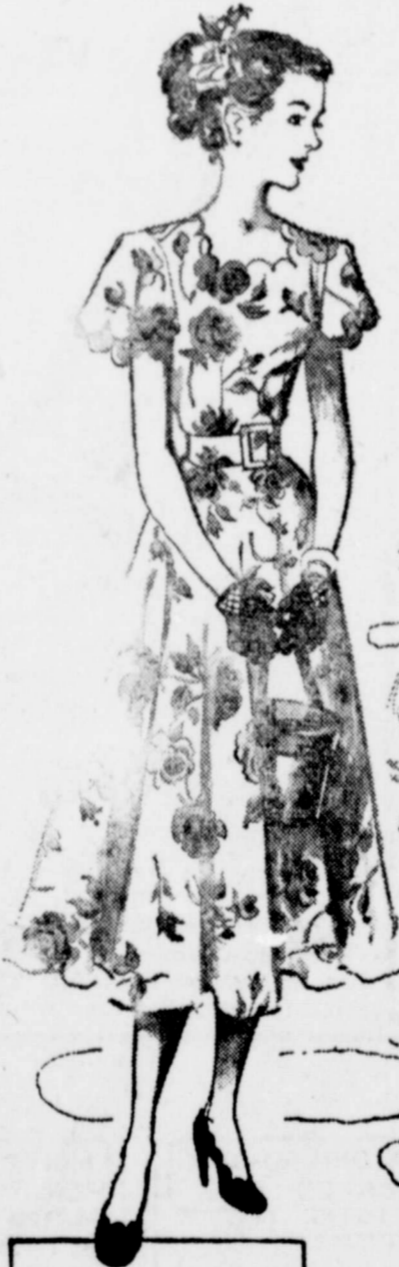
