A & M Poultry Specialist Speaks to Large Crowd At City Hall Friday Eve

Ted Martin, Poultry Specialist of A & M College in cooperation with County Agent W. P. Graham, spoke to a large crowd of poultry raisers and outlined a good plan for making poultry pay, at the City Hall Auditorium last Friday evening.

Mr. Martin stressed these points Starting with chicks from high producing hens; rearing chicks under favorable conditions, and proper temperature, ventilation and spacing; having pullets ready for the high priced egg season—October, November and December; proper size flock for economy of labor—300 to 600 birds, if not this many have only 20, leaving the higher figure to go to 200.

He also said 300 to 600 hens required very little more time than 125. The large flock justified good housing, proper management, and an honorable place in the farm program. He thought Coryell County with its balanced farm program and favorable market location would be justified in an expansion of its poultry program.

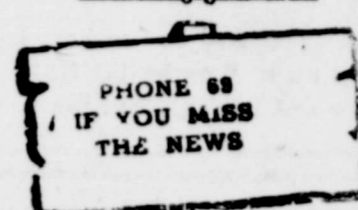

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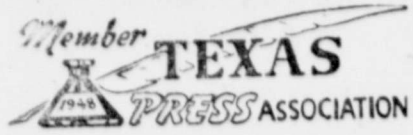

You Pay for It

Other day that classic journal of ours, the Arkansas Gazette, commented: "The government has it all figured out what people do with every penny of their money. Now, if only the people could figure out what the government does with it." That is a real poser! To be sure, government has to spend a lot of money. We are a big nation. Moreover, we find it necessary to take on obligations in many foreign lands

But whether the government (specifically the federal government, where they throw around big sums) spends no more than is needful is important to everyone. Government is not a luxury; it is a necessity. Yet, to read the budget figures you would think all operations were on a luxury basis.

Government Spends

That government is expensive was proved again by John T. Flynn, who showed in Reader's Digest that TVA, a government project, forgot to include certain items in its book-keeping. Instead of the indicated profit, there was a real deficit of \$130,000,000 to June 30, 1944. Flynn shows there was an actual loss in sales of power to that date of \$15,000,000. This demonstrates that efficiency is a quality unknown to government operations.

Here's a prophecy. Wait until the budget is presented to this Congress, then watch the departments and bureaus fight any reductions. Increase the appropriation and swell the payroll — but shrink the swollen department? Never.

Way to Depression.

This kind of selfishness means meager tax savings. It permits little tax reduction for folks who so much need relief. The more we tax and the more we spend for government, the nearer we get to depression.

Taxes of all kinds are too heavy these days. Corporation taxes are burdensome. Income taxes on all levels are too high. The individual income taxes cut down the rewards of the wage earner, keeping him from saving and investing. Instead, his tax payment is earmarked: "government expense." Some people oppose tax reductions for corporations and individuals, without realizing that continued heavy taxes will undermine our economic system and their own standard of living.

Decisions Lie Ahead

Obviously, one of the quickest ways to halt wasteful and unprofitable bureaucracy is to stop feeding fuel to its fires. Government, without a plentiful supply of tax money, could hardly be wasteful government. Congress has the power to say what the government shall spend and what amount it shall collect in taxes. It is up to us to see that our Congress keeps a proper rein on collections and expenditures.

Unwise spending and taxing could take this nation into the bankruptcy of communism. It could do it more quickly than anything else. Indeed, the power to tax is the power to destroy. We must see to it that America keeps an efficient and well-managed government, not a wasteful bureaucracy. That will be a powerful factor in deciding, in the coming months, whether America will remain prosperous and economically stable.

Miss Boyd was born and reared near Coryell Church and there received her religious training. She compiled the history of the church. After the work was completed, I told the story to the late Fred Acree of Waco. Mr. Acree asked me to buy the story for him. After some correspondence, arrangements were made made with Miss Boyd whereby the story was sold to Mr. Acree. Before Mr. Acree's demise he presented the manuscript copy to the Baylor Historical Library where it now reposes. In the interest of the Coryell County Historical Society, I wrote Mr. Guy B. Harrison of Baylor Library for permission to publish the story. Mr. Harrison graciously granted the permission as his attached letter shows.—Frank E. Simmons.

Coryell Baptist Church

Coryell Missionary Baptist Church was constituted in June 1854, by Elders John Clabaugh and S. G. O'Brien, in the home of Green Franks.

The charter members were: Green Franks, J. G. Green, Sarah Ann Green, James McIlhane, McIlhane, esse James, Catherine James, Martha Hicks, Rebecca Gibson, Jesse Lee, Margaret McIlhane, Naomi Hall, Martha and Jesse Jones, Wyatt Hall.

John Clabaugh and S. G. O'Brien were among the Baptist ministers who were instrumental in the organization of many

churches in this Central Texas area.

This particular church was named for James Coryell, for whom also Coryell County, Coryell Creek, Coryell Hills and Coryell City were named. James Coryell was born in Adams County, Ohio, in 1796, and came to Texas in 1825. He became a member of the Robert Leftwich Colony, and in 1829 a member of the Sterling Robertson colony. He was a surveyor and locator of colonists for the Robertson Colony, with headquarters at Viesca. He served in many ranger companies including those of Capt. Tom Barron and Capt. Geo. B. Erath. He was killed by Indians near Fort Milam in May 1837.

John Clabaugh came to Texas in 1840, and died in Freestone County in 1889. He organized the church at Perry in 1853, and was its first pastor. O'Brien also was among the early preachers at Perry. They both assisted Rev. John McClain in the organization of the Onion Creek Church at Eagle Springs in 1858. S. G. O'Brien was born in North Carolina and was educated in Wake-Forest College. He taught school at the O'Brien School located at Bosqueville in the early 1850's and was active in school and church work thruout his entire life. The Coryell Church was the first church of any denomination to be organized in Coryell County, and it has had a continuous service since that early day in 1854 when a few settlers met at the log home owned by Green Franks and organized for concerted religious activities.

There is no written records of this church that bear date earlier than 1885. For that reason we have relied upon fragmentary history, as remembered by early pioneers, for our information. It appears that all records prior to 1885 were lost or destroyed.

During the Civil War the church was served by the Rev. J. H. McClain, who was instrumental in the organization of many churches, including those of Perry in 1853, Onion Creek, 1858, Coryell, 1854 Comanche, 1882, McGregor, 1884, White Mound at Mound, 1874 and many others of the Missionary faith.

During those turbulent days prior to and during the Civil War the worshipers at church would bring their guns for protection, for Indian raids were common on this, then advanced frontier, and horse rustlers were marauding the country to secure horses for illegitimate trading.

Among the very early members of this church that have been gratefully remembered by the pioneers are the following: Dr. Jim Revis and wife, Bill Edmonds and wife, August Meroney and wife, Jim Lee, Savina Draper, John Taylor, J. W. Ramsda'e, Andrew Kerby and wife. There were many others whose names are not remembered by our sources of information.

In later years came the following families who helped to bear the burdens of the church: W. J. G. McIlhane, J. F. Strickland, N. E. Foster, T. E. Stribling, J. W. Merritt, J. H. Morris, S. V. Merritt, Sam Morgan, Lewis Graves, Minerva W. Whitlock, Felix Boyd, Calvin Edwards, W. R. Anderson, and S. J. Caldwell. Among those mentioned above, who were active members, there were also people of many denominations, and no denominations, who co-operated for the success of the church.

Prior to 1883 the congregation worshipped in the old two story school building, in that year the old building collapsed with the congregation, fortunately no one was injured. It then became necessary to erect a house of worship. Henry Hall and Green Franks gave the land upon which to build the new church. W. J. G. McIlhane and wife, M. A. Davis and wife, J. H. Morris and wife, J. F. Strickland, Ethan Allen, Miss Mollie Allen (Mrs. Jim Graham), Mrs. S. J. Caldwell and Mrs. Martha Earp were the com-

mittee appointed by the church to canvass the settlement to secure funds to build a new church. After many difficulties had been overcome, the new building was erected and put into use in 1883. It was kept in use until 1929, when six Sunday School rooms were added, and now, (1941) the old building, with the additions mentioned, is still in use, and in good condition.

In conference the membership were discussing the purchase of a new stove, when Grandma Whitlock offered \$1.00 which she had earned knitting. People contributed liberally after Mrs. Whit-

lock had given all she had. In 1892 the first musical instrument was used in connection with worship. It was an organ used during the annual revival meeting. Some objected to music in the church (other than vocal). Some hailed it as an innovation. After the meeting closed, and after a lengthy discussion by the members, in conference, the organ was purchased, however, some of the aged members felt that the door was thereby opened for the devil's entry into the church, and they asked for the church to withdraw fellowship from them. The most of the early

membership also opposed the Sunday School, and that organization was broken up by conscientious objectors at an early date, to be regenerated, and made strong, in later years.

Coryell Church is the mother church of Rainey Creek, Bluff Creek, Tonk Creek and Oglesby Baptist churches. Rainey Creek and Tonk Creek churches have been discontinued.

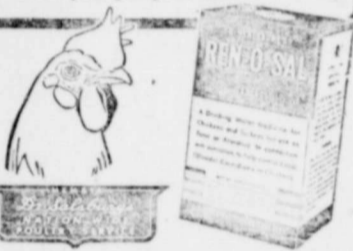
In August 1916, under the leadership of pastor R. H. Gibson the first B. Y. P. U. was organized in the Coryell Church.

Car Recovered At Burnett Stolen Here Saturday Night, Week Ago

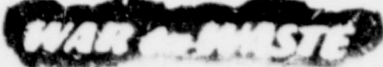

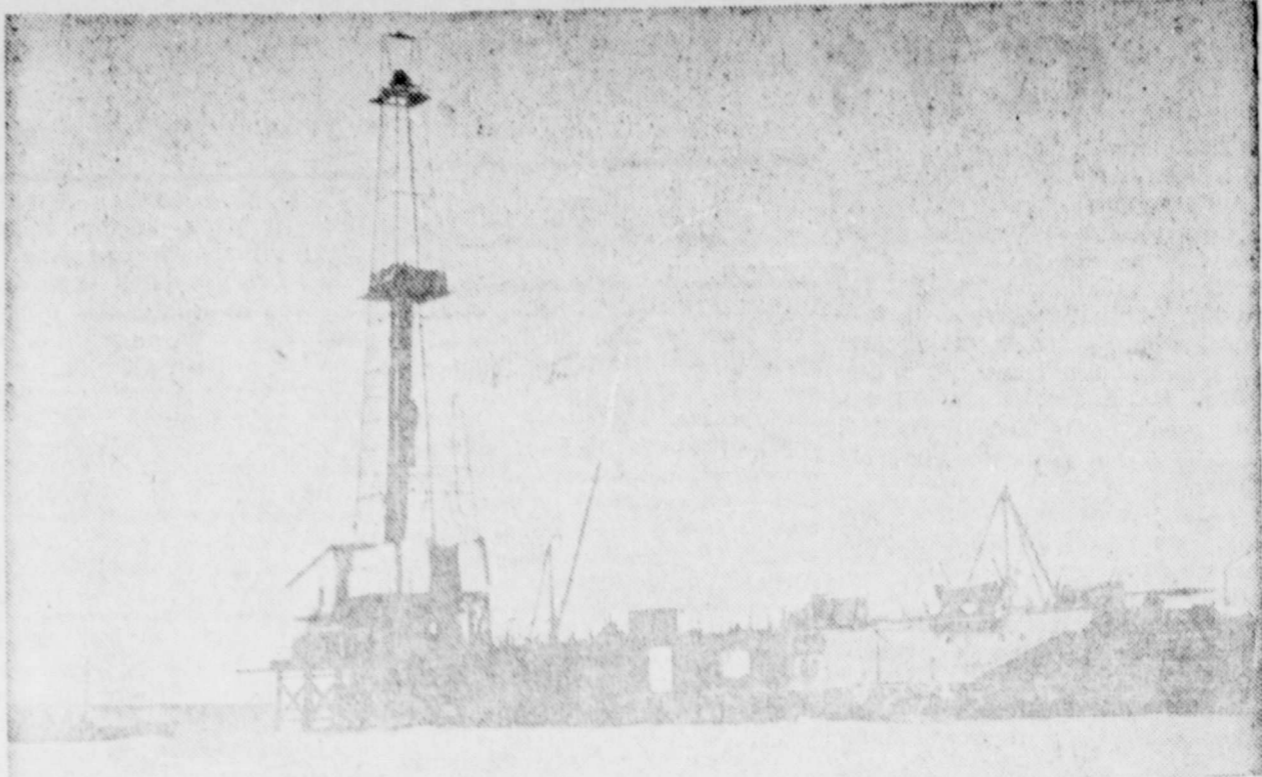
Pitson Boyd was the first President and Miss Jessie Foster was secretary.
