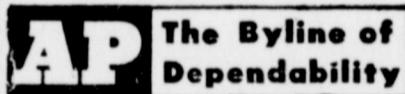
A. C. A. Orders for Hubam Clover Extended to March 31

Due to the recent hard freeze the Coryell County ACA Committee has extended the date for issuing prior approvals and purchase orders on Hubam Clover to March 31, inclusive.

Those farmers who planted Hubam Clover last fall as a winter legume and do not believe they have enough clover left to obtain a good growth by May 14, may cancel their approval issued on winter legumes, and ask for an approval to reseed the Hubam as a summer legume. If this is done the summer legume approval must be issued before the crop is reseeded and also by March 31.

If Hubam was seeded this spring and it froze out the farmer would also need to contact the county ACA office for new approval before reseeding, but not later than March 31.

Where Hubam Clover is grown as a summer or winter legume the specifications provide that a stand and growth which would justify harvesting as a feed crop must be obtained and the crop must be left on the land or turned under.

L. C. McKamie Heads Gatesville Sch'ol As Superintendent

Chairman of the school board, O. N. Hix has announced that L. C. McKamie, superintendent at Abbott, and County Superintendent of Hill County has been named as superintendent of Public Schools, at a meeting Tuesday afternoon.

Mr. McKamie is the former chairman of the Texas State Girl's Basket Ball League, which Gatesville High School Girls won at its inception in the Baylor University Gymnasium, when it was first held.

Mr. McKamie will take over the school July 1, when the term of Superintendent George W. Wier expires.

Sgt. Roy L. McClendon Killed In Service To Come Home Soon

On the William Shenk, a ship being used to bring men from the South Pacific battle fields, Guadalcanal, Iwo Jima and other points, was the body of Sgt. Roy L. McClendon of Oglesby, whose nearest of kin is Bessie McClendon.



So far the arrival of Sgt. McClendon's remains have not been announced, and of course, no funeral arrangements have been announced.

Sgt. McClendon was 22 when he entered the service July 3, 1942, and he was first stationed in the Hawaiian Islands. He served 12 months overseas and returned for a furlough again, March 2, 1945. He was then sent to Iwo Jima, and during the terrific battles on that now, American Shrine, was killed in action.

DEAR FRIENDS:

We are coming to the end of a week of many important events.

On Monday I appeared with citizens from all along the Little River Valley before the Senate Appropriations Committee, to again plead for the commencement of the Miller Springs Dam near Belton. This structure is so vital to the people of the valley along the entire length of the Little River, and we have been working on it so long that I feel it should be included in the pending Bill. We will probably know the decision of the Committee by the time this is printed.

On Tuesday the Agriculture Committee voted 16 to 10 to refuse, at this Session, to consider any relief for the users of Margarine. This was said to be in the interest of the dairy farmer, but if that dairy farmer sells whole fresh milk (his most profitable product), he has no interest in the price of butter. Actually, butter went up immediately. It now costs a dollar a pound in Washington, but I made personal inquiry of all the leading handlers of milk in Washington and found that they have not raised the price they pay the farmer for milk at all. In other words the butter manufacturers and the speculators make money as a result of the tax on Margarine. The housewife is forced to spend time and effort to color Margarine, and everybody is required to pay a higher price, but the profits go to the butter manufacturers, not to the dairy farmer, as the Republican members of our Committee have contended.

Wednesday we received the President's message on world affairs. I felt that it was well that our relations with Russia be discussed more frankly and openly. Only this way can we hope to be able to make the proper decisions. I firmly believe that the collective judgment of the American people is better than the judgment of any man or group of men, whether those men be Presidents, Congressmen, Diplomats, or Generals. President Truman very clearly stated the situation which confronts us. I know of no one except Henry Wallace and the Communists who deny the necessity of building up our own strength as well as strengthening the nations of Western Europe. Russia respects nothing but strength. Possibly if we are strong enough she will respect that fact and stop her aggression. Surely if we are weak she will not stop, and we will be forced into war.

The Speaker of the House told the European Aid Program will be before the House for debate on Monday, March 29. I expect to be here and to support the legislation. I believe that we must make it very clear that it means war if Russia tries to invade Western Europe. If we draw the line and show that we and our friends are able and willing to fight to defend that line, I feel that the chances are still good that we will not be compelled to fight. On the other hand, if we lead Russia to believe that she can effect a cheap steal she will try it just as Hitler and Kaiser Bill did. And that would bring us into war just as surely as German aggression did, only much faster.

I felt that it was unfortunate that the President did not emphasize the importance of immediately rebuilding our air power, including our factories and the construction of guided missiles. We must simply constantly maintain the most modern planes and weapons. We must also keep

men trained to use them, and factories ready to make more of them.

Later Wednesday afternoon, we began consideration of the Agriculture Appropriation Bill. Debate continued the balance of the week. On the whole, this is a far better Bill than the one the Republicans brought in last year. It increases the funds for the Soil Conservation Service by six million dollars, but cuts three million dollars from the flood control funds. It provides \$225,000,000 for 1949 Conservation Payments (PMA) as against the \$150,000,000 for REA loans. It gives the School lunch program \$65,000,000 (same as last year).

Just mix two tablets in each gallon of water all through the growing season. REN-O-SAL also prevents spread of cecal coccidiosis, in larger doses.
