#### How To Make Your Tomatoes, Peppers, Eggplants and Other Vegetables Grow!

When setting out plants in the garden, pour a teacupfull of a starter solution around each one. Here are the directions for making the starter solution: Add one (1) pound of 5-10-5 fertilizer to five (5) gallons of water. (this is the same as 10 pounds to a barrel of water), mix well and let the solution stand for a while so it will completely dissolve. Repeat in seven to ten days to give the plants a good "send off". Fertilizer may be obtained locally. Inquire at the County Agent's of-
