In the event I am elected, I pledge you that I will do my best to make you as good a District Attorney as you have ever had.

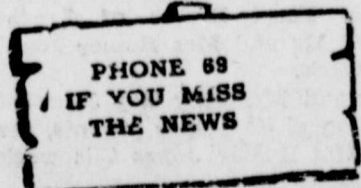

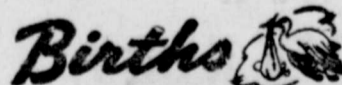

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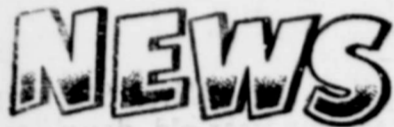
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## ARNETT LADIES CLUB

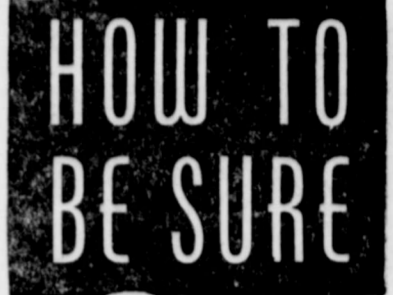

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## Martha Fay Eubanks Is Bride of Paul A. Martin, Thursday Evening

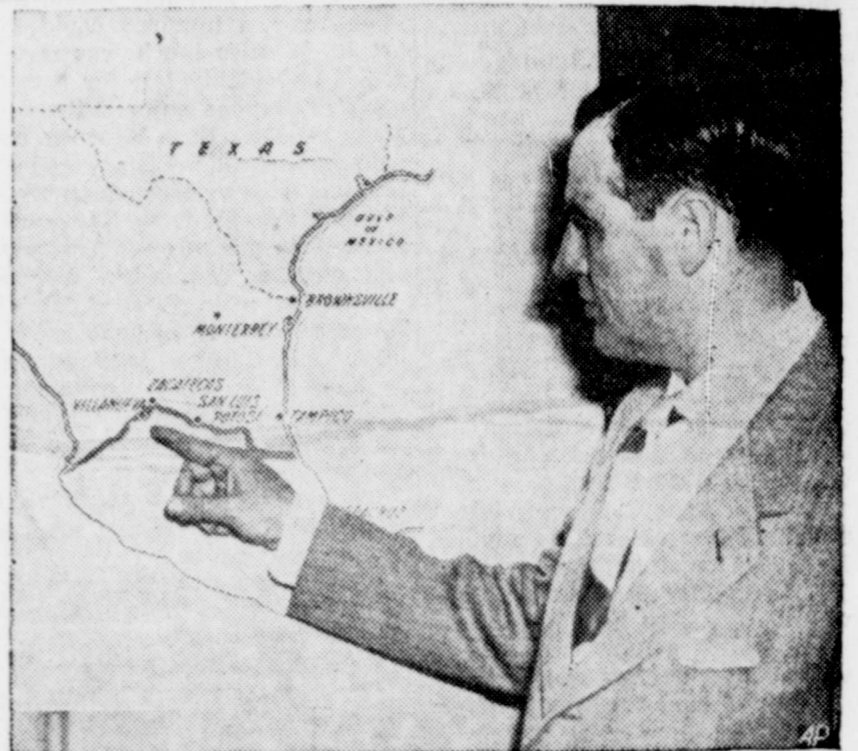

**Farm News**

A trip through a part of the County last Tuesday presented about this picture of the crop outlook:

Corn up and growing nicely, wheat still looks good, grain sorghums coming up, oats not killed by the freeze holding on and may survive ten days without rain, cotton land read yto plant, fall seeded alfalfa looking good and spring seeded alfalfa showing a promise.

Cattle and sheep are gaining weight after a hard winter. Pastures are green but grass is short and without rain soon will get shorter.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has covered most of the County with its program of cotton seed sterilization. Seeds have already been treated at Oglesby, Whitson, Copperas Cove, The Grove, Coryell City, Pancake and Turnersville, and the men are in Gatesville now, and will be here at the Brown Gin until Monday.

The April meeting of the Twin Mountains Farm Improvement Group was held last Monday night. The County Agent conducted a program on poultry.

4-H Club boys and girls are co-operating in an encouraging manner to the Baby Chick program. At least 25 have already received their 50 baby chicks and still others are on the waiting list for their chicks.

**How To Make Your Tomatoes, Peppers, Eggplants and Other Vegetables Grow!**

When setting out plants in the garden, pour a teacupfull of a starter solution around each one. Here are the directions for making the starter solution: Add one (1) pound of 5-10-5 fertilizer to five (5) gallons of water. (this is the same as 10 pounds to a barrel of water), mix well and let the solution stand for a while so it will completely dissolve. Repeat in seven to ten days to give the plants a good "send off". Fertilizer may be obtained locally. Inquire at the County Agent's office or feed houses.

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Dear Friends:  
 April 2, 1948.  
 Congress has just exhibited one of its bursts of speed. After many days of debate the House finally passed the European Aid Program on Wednesday night. The bill went immediately to 'Conference' to work out the differences with the Senate. Just before midnight on Thursday (April 1) the Conference agreed on a report, which was approved by the House this afternoon. I voted for the bill

and for the Conference Report. As I have previously pointed out, I feel that there are at least 3 basic reasons for supporting this program:  
**FIRST:** It is our duty as a Christian nation to help the needy—to feed the hungry—to clothe the naked—to care for little children. This bill does these things and much more.  
**SECOND:** It is to our selfish interest to maintain the buying power of our best customers. If we want to stop giving our goods and begin getting paid, we must strengthen Europe's economy. We must rehabilitate her industry. This bill does that and it strengthens our own economy at the same time by providing a continued market for our products. It means much to American agriculture, American industry and to American labor.  
**THIRD:** Self defense dictates that we should do everything in our power to strengthen those who will probably stand with us against Communism. Surely it is plain to all that sooner or later in one way or another we must have a show down with the USSR—whether that show down be at the council table, or elsewhere. I want all the friends we can have. This program at least makes it more probable that we will not stand alone. It may well mean that the final decision will be determined in Europe, not on American shores. I could not vote against a program that held out any reasonable hope of saving American lives, and in the final

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analysis, the possibility of saving America itself. Certainly this program alone will not accomplish that, but just as certainly it will help.  
 The income tax battle was decided this week. Just today both Houses voted to override the President's veto of the Knutson tax cut bill. This bill will reduce the revenue of the government by approximately 5 billion dollars. In view of the increasingly dangerous foreign situation I feel it is foolhardy to so slash our government's revenues. It is quite likely that it may force us back to a deficit in government finances. Surely we should avoid that.

In the second place, the addition of 5 billion dollars of purchasing power at a time when demand already exceeds supply at many points in our economy, must add to the dangers of inflation and result in increasing living costs, which will greatly outweigh any savings which the ordinary family might receive. Most of the reduction goes to those in the higher income tax brackets. Near forty percent of the reduction will go to less than 5 percent of the taxpayers, but all will suffer from the price increase which will undoubtedly follow.

In the third place, I know that the time to pay our debts is while our income is high. Our national income is at an all time high just now. Early this year I introduced a bill to appropriate \$7,000,000,000 to the payment of the public debt. I think both honesty and good business dictates that we begin to retire the debt before we make another tax reduction. (It must be remembered that we did remove the excess profits taxes two years ago—this gave business substantial relief.) The holders of government bonds are entitled to some consideration in connection with the solvency of their investments, and the consumers of America are entitled to some consideration in connection with the cost of living. I therefore voted to sustain the President's veto and against the bill.

Yesterday we were able to add \$100,000,000 to the funds available for REA loans to the deficiency bill. Today we secured the needed 218 signatures to the Discharge petition, which will give the House a chance to vote on the repeal of the restrictions on the sale of Margarine.

John Bieling, grandfather of Eddie Conlin of Gatesville according to a story in a New York newspaper, is the pioneer in song recordings.

Mr. Bieling, at 79 died at his home at 102 Lafayette Avenue, Hempstead, N. Y., after a long illness.

Here is the rest of the story "Nationally famous tenor with the Hayden quartet, he moved to Hempstead in 1920, when he opened a phonograph and record store. He retired in '926.

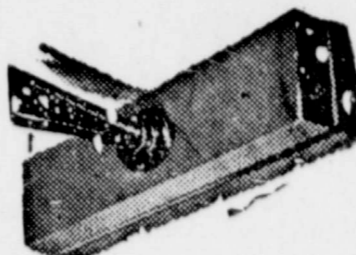
"Mr. Bieling began his recording career in 1894 at Thomas A. Edison's laboratory in Orange, N. J. He made early cylindrical records with a quartet. He later joined the Haydon and American quartets, with whom he made cylindrical and disc recordings for two decades.

"Mr. Bieling's recordings were produced by the Columbia Recording Company and The Victor Talking Machine Company. He sang with such then famous vocalists as Bill Murray, Steve Porter, William S. Hooley and Henry Burr Songs with and "The Night Train to Buffalo", which he was associated are "Sweet Genevieve", "Darling Nelly Grey."

"Mr. Bieling was born in New York City and later moved to Elmhurst where he lived for 16 years. He formerly was active in the Hempstead Elks Lodge.

"Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Neta Von Oesen Bieling three sons, Hempstead, and Fred W. of Massapequa; 3 daughters, Mrs. Magdalen Meyran of West Hempstead, Mrs. Nellie Michener of Hillside Heights and Mrs. Charlotte Conlin of Williston Park."

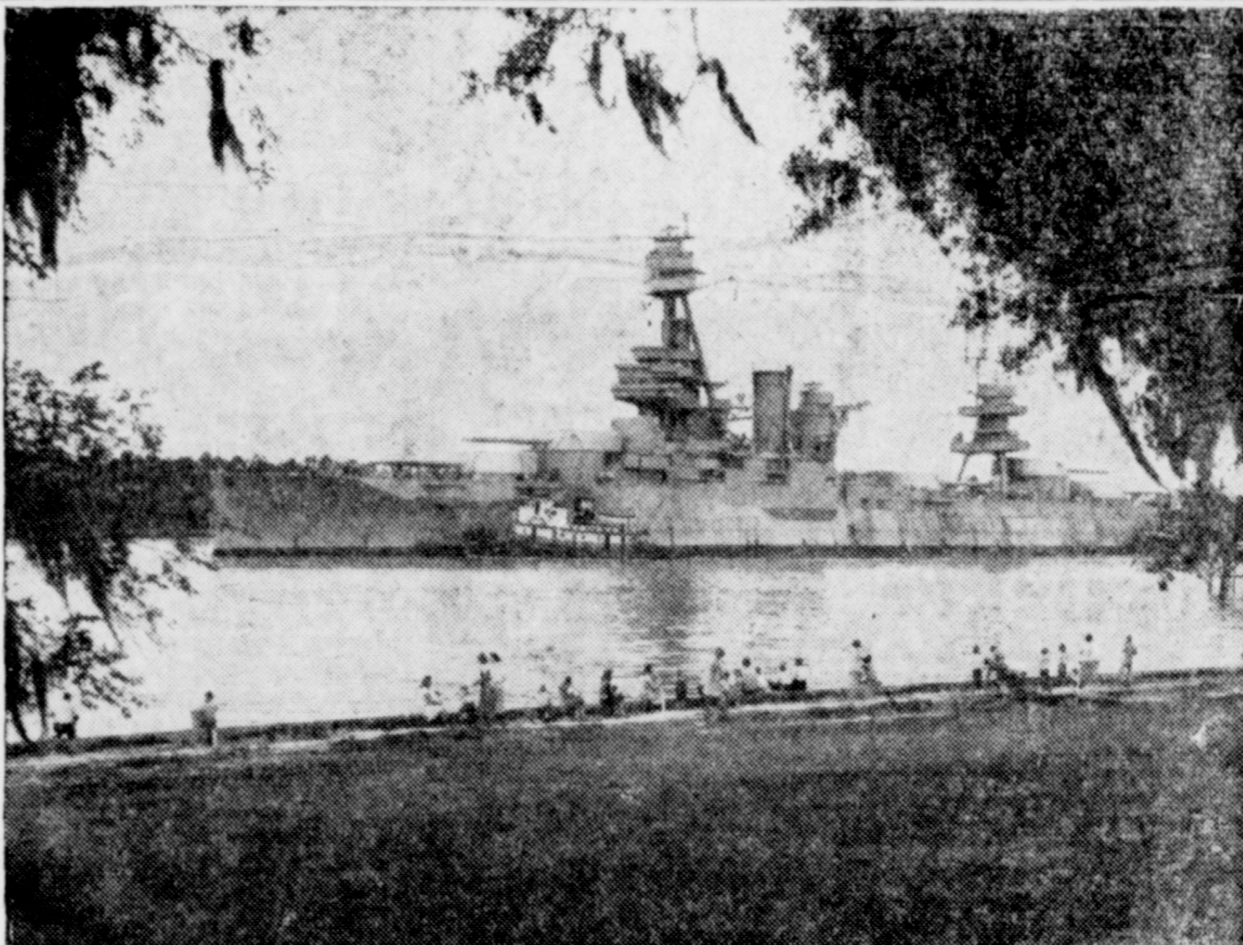
