




### Senator James Taylor Names Locals on **Education Committee**

Championship was played last night at 8.



The papers have been filled with these proposals and the Congress has telegraphic advices that the English-Russian proposal is for England to manufacture and deliver to Russia from the North England Locomotive Works 1000 narrowguage locomotives at an estimated cost of \$30,000,000. England is to receive the major portion of 3,100,000 tons of steel. Other items Russia intends to purchase under this agreement will include \$600.000 worth of scientific laboratory apparatus, 2,400 flat trucks, 2,40 winches, 200 excavators 54 caterpillar loading cranes, 250 auto timber carriers, 14 tugs and 4 dredges, 1,500 50-kilowatt mobile Diesel electric generators, 24 steam power turbine stations \$4.000,000 worth of plywood equipment, \$1,500,000 worth of timber-mill equipment, 48 voltage transformers 10 sets of oil-purifying apparatus and 300 100,000-kilowatt electric motors. Practically every item in this list of proposed purchases is made of steel of which this country is i nserious need and which Senator O'Daniel says is sorely needed to properly equip and maintain a fast moving, hard hitting national defense. 
