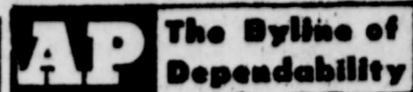

## CHAMBER OF COMMERCE COMMITTEES DIVULGE PLANS FOR 1948 AND AFTER

1. **AERONAUTICS**—Continue efforts to secure an all-weather runway for Scott Field, use our effort and the influence of the Chamber to petition Congress to continue the G. E. Flying program which will be discontinued July

1st. Encourage the building of a landing strip at Evant and one at Copperas Cove, obtain airmarking symbols in the following towns of Coryell County: Evant, Copperas Cove, Oglesby, Ireland, Purnela, Pearl and Jonesboro; properly publicize all Coryell County airports, landing areas, and airstrips in air journals, air directories etc.

2. **AGRICULTURE**—Sponsor a Legume Field Day for Coryell County annually, create and sponsor a watermelon shipping unit in Gatesville to ship melons by rail to large markets, sponsor a hybrid corn program for Coryell County, sponsor signs along the principal highways calling motorists attention to the ACA or SCS programs being practiced in the adjoining fields.

3. **LIVESTOCK**—Sponsor at least four of the following shows this year: Fat Calf and Hog Show, Poultry Fair, Quarter Horse show, Ram and Billy Sale, and the annual show of the Peregred Sheep Breeders Association of Texas. Try to establish a Grade A milk market in Gatesville and give special attention to the up-building of Coryell County's dairy association.

4. **CIVIC IMPROVEMENT**—This committee will create a com-

### GERMANY—

**U. S. Errors May Put  
Russ At Reich Helm**  
BERLIN, Germany.—The United States occupation forces in Germany are making a heroic effort to hold the line against Russian aggression in the face of what may prove to be insurmountable difficulties, the most serious of which obstacles originate in Washington.

When Gen. Lucius Clay and Robert Murphy, his able political adviser who has the status of ambassador, took over administration of the American zone in Germany, they were almost fatally handicapped by two colossal mistakes that already had been made by Washington:

1. The State Department had given unofficial sanction to the principles of the Morgenthau revenge program.

2. The State Department, with the approval of President Roosevelt, had given plates to the Russians for the printing of occupation currency. We also agreed to back this paper money with the credit of the United States government.

The result of these tragic errors gave the Russians just about everything they needed for the domination of Germany. While the Americans fiddled and fumed around with the Morgenthau ideas the Russians proceeded to print billions of occupation marks and flood German economy with this paper. Russian soldiers actually carried occupation marks around by the bagful. They paid as high as \$1000 for cheap American wrist watches. The effect was chaotic inflation. Gen. Clay put a stop to it by calling in all the currency we had printed and issuing new currency which can be used only by members of the military forces and United States civilian personnel. The cost to the United States of this idiotic effort to please the Russians has been estimated at from \$500,000,000 to \$1,000,000,000. And the Russians, with poker faces, howled to high heaven when Gen. Clay stopped their financial picnic, and claimed we were violating our agreements. Obviously we had been financing Russian theft of Germany.

When Germany fell the Russians were prepared with plans made months in advance. They went to work to take over everything they could lay hands on. The Americans came in without plans and with nothing except dogood intentions. The weak-kneed, appease Russia at any cost policy of Washington cost us two years and it easily may develop that these early mistakes have cost us our chance to save Europe from complete domination by Russia.

Even after two years, the Washington government still is adhering strictly to the four-power agreement on control of Germany despite the fact that the Russians literally refuse to agree on anything the other powers propose. Our hands are tied by this four-power pact while all Russian hands are busy undermining us and stealing everything in sight at the point of a gun.

Russia has control of radio Berlin, largest transmitter in Germany, altho the station and transmitter are located in the British zone.

So certain are the Russians they will remain permanently in Germany they have erected a magnificent monument to the Russian soldiers who fell in the siege of Berlin. This monument, too, is
