Playing Wilkins' Drug, Roberts pitched a shut-out, allowing only three bingles.

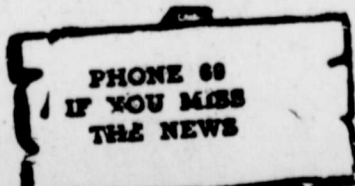

New Medical Clinic Opens Sunday: Lowrey Clinic: Visitors Are Invited

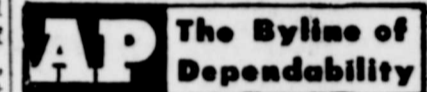

Helen Hayes Tells How To Make "Old Warriors" Chicken Pie

"Although my career keeps me terribly busy," says Helen Hayes, distinguished stage, screen and radio actress, "I manage to spend some time in my kitchen each day. I love to cook, and best of all, I like to make this chicken pie":

"Old Warriors" Chicken Pie

1 hen (6 or 7 lbs.) 1 dozen hard boiled eggs
2 cans of French mushroom soup (fresh mushrooms salt and pepper
rooms (fresh mushrooms 1 tablespoon of chopped
darken color of pie.) celery
pie crust
(for eight people)

Store hen in refrigerator for 24 hours. Boil as you would for salad and add seasoning as desired. Allow chicken to cool and soak in cooking water for another 24 hours. Then skim off all fats that have risen to top of pot and place in clean used fat can. Halve mushrooms and slice eggs separately. Dice chicken and place a layer in bottom of deep baking dish. Then add a layer of sliced eggs and a layer of mushrooms. Repeat layers until dish is full. Meantime, boil away half of the stock in which the chicken was cooked and pour remainder into dish. Cover with a very short pie crust and bake as an ordinary pie.

"No matter how busy I am," says Miss Hayes, "I see to it that all my used kitchen fats and table scraps are salvaged. It's really smart and thrifty, for meat dealers pay well for every pound turned in."

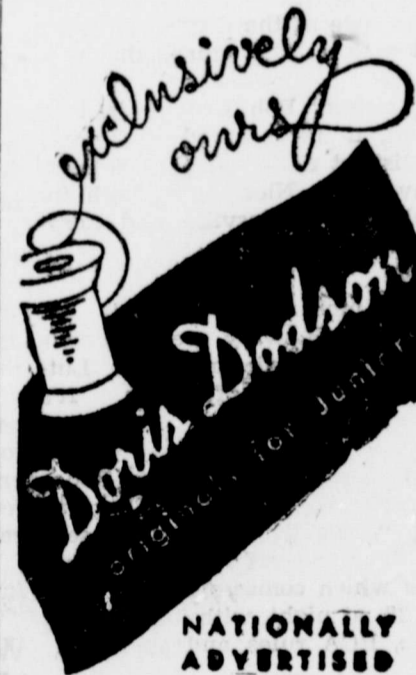

Dear Friends:

For many years the States of the South have realized that it was impossible for each of them to maintain a first class technical or graduate school for every trade, profession, or subject, such as engineering, law, geology, medicine, etc. Texas has been able to do far better than many of her neighbors. Many of our poorer neighbors have found it impossible to properly finance any such institutions. Some states do not even attempt to maintain any kind of medical school because of cost. Texas has provided rather good facilities in most lines for white students. We have made some effort to provide facilities for colored students, but we have recognized that in many cases we must send colored students to out-of-state institutions, at considerable expense, to provide anything like adequate facilities.

I see no prospect for most States, North or South, to ever adequately finance institutions of the quality we need so long as each State tries to maintain its own separate college in each subject. It is just as impossible as it has proved to be for each local community to maintain a first class high school. Just as the local communities have turned to consolidated schools, so it seems necessary for neighboring States to unite in joint support of institutions of higher learning. It seems reasonable to believe that in this manner it will be possible for the students of many States to enjoy better opportunities than they could otherwise.

It was, therefore, proposed a number of years ago that the States be allowed to make agreements to thus pool their resources. The Southern States were the first group to work out a definite

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•SOUND EFFECTS IN NICKELODEON DAYS

DENVER—(AP)—John T. McParland, retiring at 71 as superintendent of the city auditorium, recalls that in the silent movie days, former Mayor Robert Speer insisted on a free show for the public every Sunday.

"Eighteen of us used to go crazy trying to give realistic sound effects for those shows," McParland said. "We had rock crushers, steam whistles and fire bells back of the screen and a 35-piece orchestra out front."

"We had a war picture one Sunday. I got hold of the adjutant general of the state national guard and he loaned me a gatling gun. There was no blank ammunition for the gun, so he had an entire company stay up Saturday night digging the slugs out of the bullets. The theatre even smelled like a battlefield after that show."

compact on this subject. They brought it to the Congress for approval as the Constitution requires. It seems to me to be so plainly in the public interest to allow these States to work together that I could see no logical reason for opposing the bill, but sometimes opposition comes from the most unexpected sources.

While this compact applies to schools for either white or colored students, it seems clear that it means more to the colored students than to the white students. Among the institutions it might save and maintain on a high standard is Meharry Medical College in Nashville, Tenn. This institution has probably trained more colored doctors than any institution in the world. Approximately one-third of the student body at Meharry has come from States where they could have entered institutions along with white students in their own States. This indicates to me that the serious colored student who is interested in getting a medical education, rather than in social equality would rather attend a firstclass colored college, just as most white students would prefer to go to a white college. One would, therefore, suppose that the real friends of the colored people would be especially anxious to see this compact approved, and thereby assure the continued operation of Meharry and similar institutions, which must have the support of several states if they are to continue to function.

It was, therefore, rather surprising to find all of the opposition to this compact should come from the little group of negro congressmen, "American-Labor" representatives and others who loudly proclaim themselves to be friends of the negro. These people seem to me to be far more interested in "social equality" than in educational opportunities for negroes, complained that this compact would enable the Southern States to offer first class opportunities for both white and colored students—but in separate institutions. They would evidently rather see the colored students go without education than to see them get it in separate schools.

I believe in better education for both white and colored students, but I believe in it in separate schools. I, therefore, voted FOR the compact as did an overwhelming majority of the House.

A rather similar situation exists in regard to the housing program. I think most everyone will have to admit that the FHA loans authorized by what is known as "Title Six" have resulted in the construction of more houses than all other programs. Senator Taft and his associates are now holding up any extension of this FHA program which has proved its ability to get houses constructed, in the hope that in that way they can force the passage of their own controversial public housing bill.

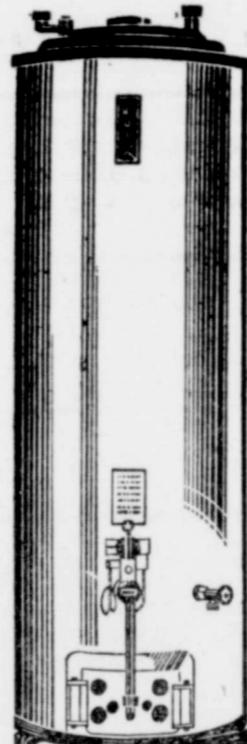

FRANCE— U. S. Supplies Block French Communists!

PARIS, France—So long as the United States can export coal and wheat to France there is little danger of the Communists getting legal control thru elections of the French government. The Communists, however, are strong enough to paralyze and neutralize France completely in event of

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open hostilities with Russia.

Here are some of the factors favorable to Russia if a shooting war should start.

All the major industries such as transportation, communication, steel, motors and public utilities are at the mercy of Communist-dominated unions, the leaders of which are avowed Communists, loyal to the Kremlin.

Communists announce that if a showdown comes openly they have plans to blow up all important industrial plants, tie up transportation and throw France into helpless chaos to prevent French industrial production from being used against Russia.

At least 30 percent of the police of Paris, Lyon, Marseilles and other large cities of France are Communists.

The situation in the air forces is even worse. There are 40 percent of the operating personnel, pilots excepted, and 80 percent of the technical ground crews are claimed by the Communists.

Off setting all this are many circumstances inimical to Soviet aggression:

The vast majority of Frenchmen are Catholics and Pope Pius XII has made it clear the Catholic church will not compromise with Communism as advocated by the Kremlin.

The present French government is an anti-Communist coalition in which the Communist party is no longer represented. The Bidault administration is much stronger than it was three months ago. Communists are being weeded out of the administrative jobs they seized after the liberation and no longer exert the official pressure they used to blackmail their way to varied success in the last elections.

The announced willingness of the United States to export coal and wheat to France has knocked the props out from under the Communist party line which for months had been shouting that only cooperation with Russia would France be kept from starving.

Agreement by the French government, although not yet announced publicly, to waive its protest against revival of the heavy steel industry in the Ruhr, and to accept assurance of the United States and Britain that manufacture of armament by the Germans will be forbidden completely. This was another blow to the Soviets who had counted on the French to block, at all costs, reactivation of the steel industry in Germany.

French people to the menace of Communist infiltration is noticeable. The Anti-Soviet press has given many columns to dispatches telling of ruthless methods used by the Russians to gain control of the Balkan countries and of the numerous opposition leaders in these countries who have been murdered or "legally" executed by Russian puppets. More and more the French are less inclined toward Communism al Soviet.

"Just give us coal and wheat and we will lick the Communists," one of France's most important officials told me. "We have great hopes for the success of the conference on the Marshall Plan, but no matter what comes out of the conference France will weather the storm if we have the coal and wheat."

Slightly cynical but quite realistic was the view expressed by an "independent" newspaperman with leanings toward Russia. He told me that Germany is the big stake for Russia. "Without Germany, France would be useless to the Soviets," he said, "but with Germany the Communists can take France any day, probably without firing a gun. It will fall in their lap."

It is significant that no matter with whom you talk in any of these European countries they all agree, regardless of their personal prejudices, that in the revival of German industry lies the salvation of Western Europe.

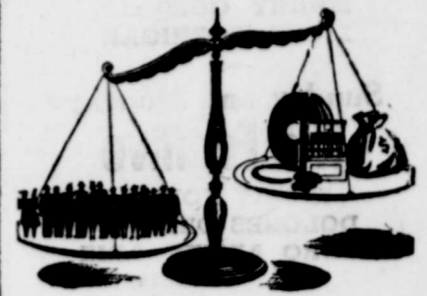

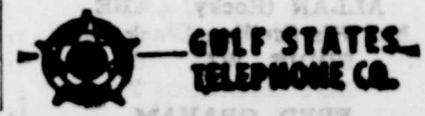

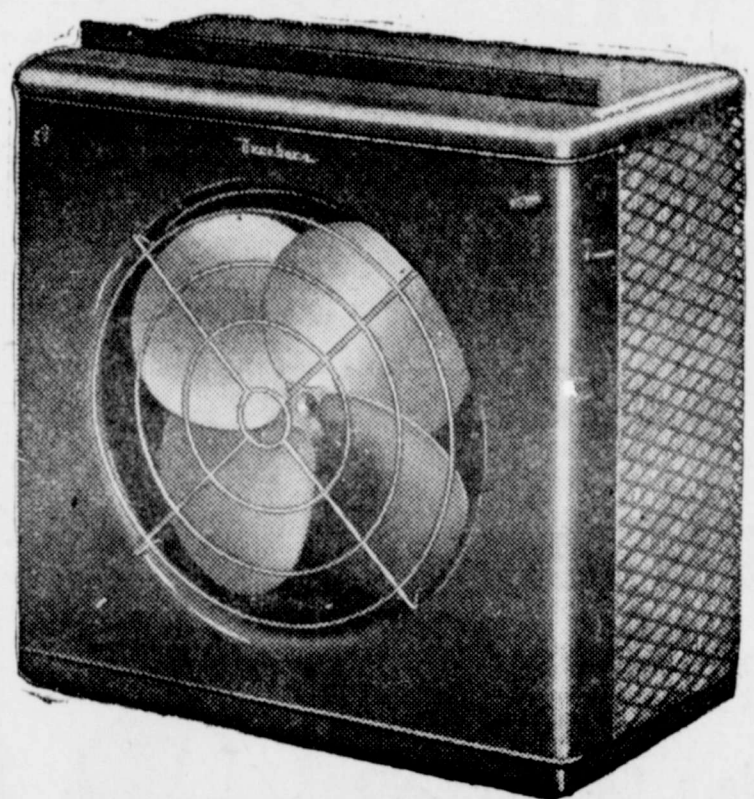
