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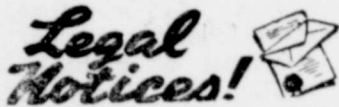

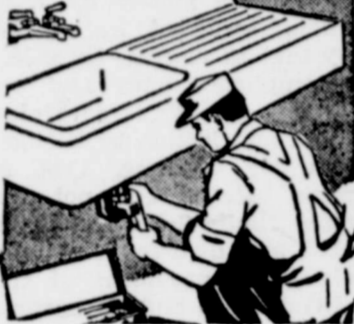

May 16-22

The great society of mercy, the American Red Cross, marks the 67th anniversary of its foundation this week on May 21. Its founder and first president was Clara Barton, a selfless woman who devoted her life to helping others.

Employed in the U. S. patent office when the Civil War began, Miss Barton became distressed at the plight of battle casualties. She nursed injured soldiers on the battlefield and organized various forms of relief. During the Franco-Prussian war, she carried on her mission of mercy in Europe. As a result of her determination, nations represented at the Geneva conference formed an International Red Cross, a branch of which was finally organized in the U. S. Today, the Red Cross functions in peace as well as war.

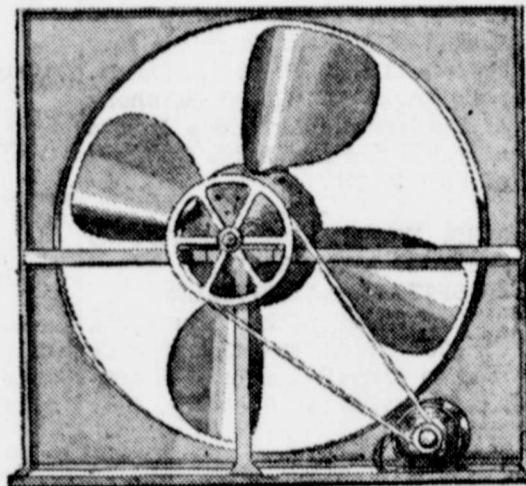

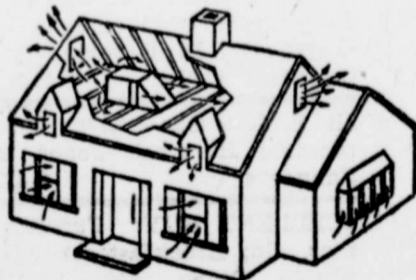

Dear Friends:

It is never possible to predict the closing date of Congressional adjournment, but there is always an increase in tempo as a prospective adjournment date approaches. The Republican Convention is scheduled for the week of June 21. The Republican leaders have stated they intend to adjourn by that date. I doubt very much that they will, but we can definitely feel increasing

pressure each week. Our committee holds hearings every morning, which lap over and extend past the time the House convenes. The daily sessions of the House are longer and our mail gets heavier as more and more people write about more and more things which they fear will be lost if they are not pushed before adjournment. In addition there are always lots of visitors from home at this time of year. The result is that we find we need the extra hour (we have daylight saving time in Washington). I am, nevertheless, glad to see this activity if it will but result in getting us home earlier.

On several previous occasions the railroads have tried to get Congress to pass legislation exempting them from the anti-trust laws as they relate to rate making. The railroads have actually gotten together for years and have agreed on freight rates. They have worked up one of the most complicated and in many respects one of the most unfair systems ever devised. They particularly discriminate against the Southwest, and all the railroads have joined together so that there can be no change. The Supreme Court has held that this arrangement was illegal, but the Bulwinkle Bill legalizes these rate making combinations. I have always believed in competition. I believe that the people of the Southwest are entitled to just as favorable rates as those people of any section of America. I offered an Amendment to this bill to make it inoperative as to any rate which was higher than the rate for similar service in some other area. My Amendment was voted down, proving, as I see it, that the advocates of this plan do not want to give us the same treatment that the Northwest receives. The Bill passed over my "NO" vote. I am hopeful that the President will veto it.

The House passed another Bill which I opposed. This was the Bill to require Executive agencies

to furnish any Committee of Congress with any papers of information in their possession. This argument over the powers of the branches of government is as old as the government itself. I feel that the Executive should go just as far as national security permits in making information available to Congress, but I know there are lots of matters relating to our military and foreign affairs that should not be made public. You simply cannot give these confidential files to as many people as there are Congressional Committees, and expect them to remain secret. I feel that President Truman has not been as frank with Congress as he should have been, but I don't think that we should allow our resentment to danger the very security of our country, and I therefore voted against the Bill.

Today, the President sent a message recommending enactment of a long time agricultural program. I am glad to have his support. Our Committee has been working on this very matter for months. About everyone will agree with the President's suggestions that we should have farm price supports, but they will disagree as to the level. I think that the basic commodities which can not be stored should be supported to 90% of parity. All will

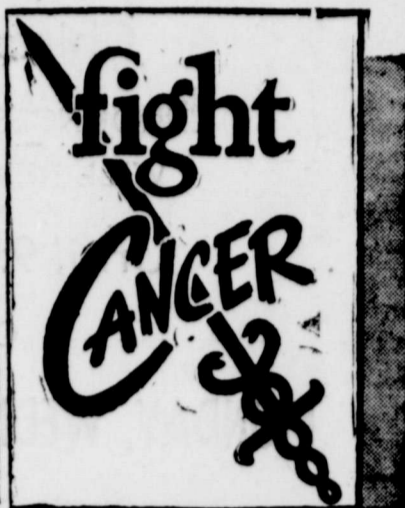
