AMVETS To Organize Here Tonight: Charter Already Forwarded

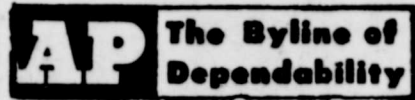

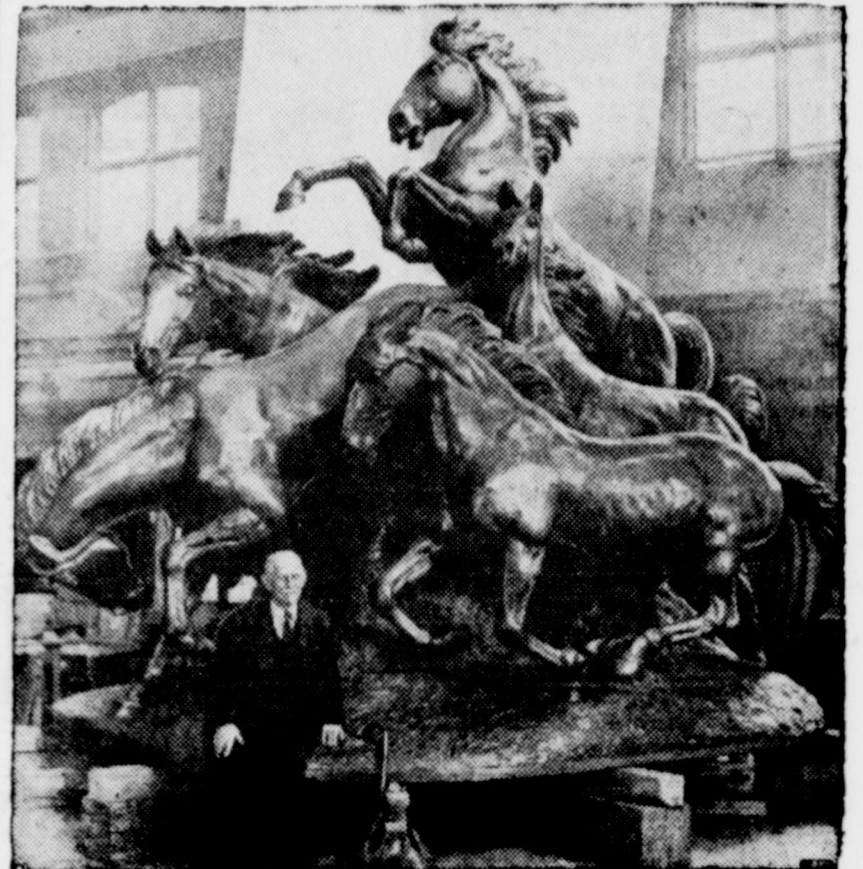

Noah Webster, compiler of the Great American Dictionary of the English Language, and one of the earliest and foremost lexicographers, died 105 years ago this week. His work was, to a large degree, responsible for American literacy. His books on grammar and spelling sold enormously for a century. The descendants of his dictionary are, at present, circulated thruout the land. Another anniversary is celebrated this week—that of the birth of Carolus Linnaeus on May 24, 1707. The great Swedish botanist, who wrote in Latin, the scientific language at that time, founded the modern system of classifying plants.

Naval Officer Returns To Duty After Visit With Mother: Broken Hip

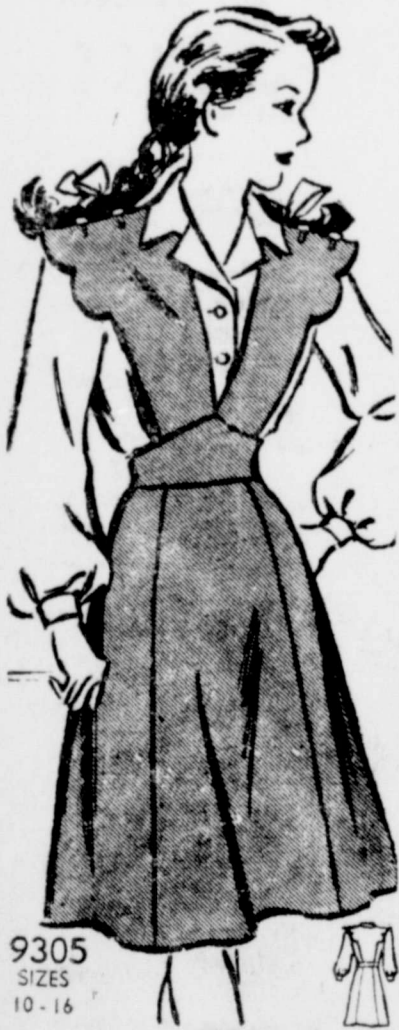

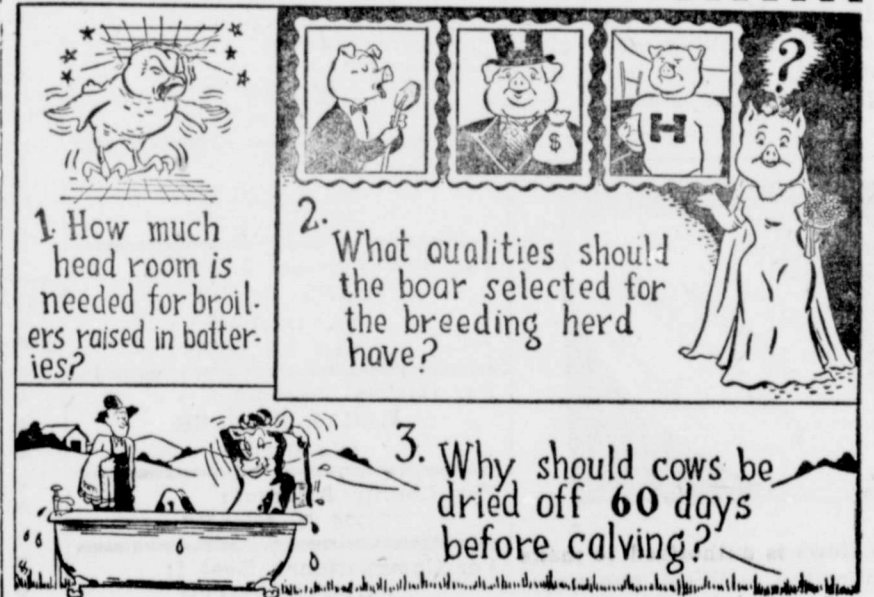

Farm Facts



1. How much head room is needed for broilers raised in batteries?

2. What qualities should the boar selected for the breeding herd have?

3. Why should cows be dried off 60 days before calving?

1. Head room depends, of course, upon the age of the chick. We recommend 11 inches of head room for starting chicks and 14 inches for chicks from six to 12 weeks of age. Broilers should not be left in batteries after they reach 12 weeks.

2. The major factors to consider in selection of the herd boar are:

- a. Individuality, or outward appearance.
- b. Ancestry, or the inherited ability to produce strong, healthy and desirable offspring.
- c. Performance record, or the test of production.

3. It is during this period that the unborn calf gains 2/3 of its birth weight. Proper conditioning of the cow during this dry period will increase milk production. Tests at the Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company show that 100 lbs. of extra condition (over the weight of the calf) during this 60-day dry period will mean approximately 2,000 lbs. of extra milk after freshening.

Stirs Swiss Anxiety

BERNE, Switzerland—The quick ruthless scheme by which Russia confiscated all private property in Romania has created a new wave of apprehension and fear among the people of Europe. And nowhere is the anxiety more acute than here in Switzerland, the richest and most progressive na-

tion on the continent.

This is the banking and financial center of Europe. For 100 years its sovereignty and neutrality have been recognized by all nations.

But today the Swiss people literally are worried sick over the persistent aggression of the Russians. And from France, Belgium, The Netherlands, Italy and Spain have come frantic calls to diplomatic and financial leaders here asking: "How much farther will the Russians go?" I talked to many of these leaders. Obviously they don't know the answer to the Russian plan, but they frankly admit that Russia can take anything in Europe she wants including Switzerland, unless the United States moves quickly to check her ruthless program of confiscation and domination.

Here is what happened in Romania as told to me by an American officer who was in Bucharest and saw the plan operate. First, the Russians announced all citizens must register within the next 48 hours and declare, on penalty of death for evasion, the total amount of their personal wealth, whether in money, jewels, real estate or what have you.

The day following the registration the announcement was made that each person would be permitted to keep 3,000,000 dinars, except farmers actually engaged in working farms could keep 4,000,000 dinars. All other private property must be, and was, turned over to the Russian occupation forces. In the days before the war a dinar was worth about 2 cents, but due to the excessive inflation created by the German control of Romania and by manipulation since the Russians came in, the dinar has sunk until last year you could get 6,000,000 for an American dollar. The Russian confiscation means, therefore that Romanian citizens can keep only 50 cents out of whatever personal wealth they had with exception of the working farmer who is allowed 66 cents. Business houses, industries, homes—everything has been turned over to the Russians. The people as individual owners of anything of value have been wiped out and are now living by orders and by sufferance of the Russian authorities.

Americans in Bucharest at the time of the confiscation expressed amazement and disapproval. Immediately word was sent via word of mouth thruout Bucharest that Romanians seen speaking to, or even greeting, Americans on the streets would jeopardize their chances for food and work.

"As a result of that edict my own Romanian friends were afraid to speak to me on the street or even phone to me," my American officer friend said.

"You must get this story told and retold to America," said a Swiss banker to me. "We are doing everything possible to arouse the people of the few free states left in Europe to the peril of the Russian horde, but surely when your people in America know what is in store for them if Russia dominates the world they will understand the urgent necessity for prompt action".

The contrast between Vienna and Berne is startling. On the Austrian side of the border, and the German, too, there is desolation, destruction, unemployment, frustration and above everything else, mental and spiritual destruction and decay—all of it due to two wars brought on by power-mad military leaders. Here in Switzerland everything is peaceful, prosperous and hopeful. The Swiss have spent the last 100 years building up homes, industry, education, culture and a free way of life. They have not had to pay the price of war, either as participants or as a conquered people. Switzerland as a nation is a federation of small sovereign states. If such a federation could be formed out of the free countries of western Europe there would be a chance to save Europe, but the Swiss know, and every other informed people of Europe know, that only thru economic support from America now and for the next few years

will Europe ever get that chance. In the meantime, home owners and free citizens of these western European countries think about what happened in Romania and shudder with fear and apprehen-
