Even though quotas on peanuts have been suspended by the Secretary of Agriculture for the 1948 program year and a farmer may plant all the peanuts he wishes, the acreage he plants needs to be measured in order to establish a history on his farm. These measurements will be used in establishing the 1949 Peanut Marketing Quota Allotment. If you are a farmer who plants peanuts, please contact the office as soon as you have planted

Mr. Qualls, 27, was born July 3, 1920, and was a son of C. C. Qualls and the former Miss Social Weaver.

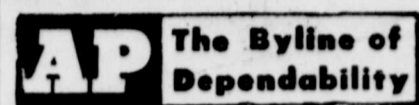

Clois D. Stone, Administrative Officer, states that it is not the same farms that carry out the practices each year because lots of farmers complete their practices, such as terrace systems, and other farmers ask for these practices in succeeding years.

The practices carried out in 1947 were as follows:

Terraces—630,583 linear feet were constructed on 78 farms and the ACA payments for helping carry out this practice were \$7,550.38. This being about 70 per cent of the cost of construction.

Diversion terraces—69 farms constructed 50,250 cubic yards, and earned \$4,020.00.

Vegetative waterways were established on 14 farms and consisted of 24.8 acres. Payment earned was \$396.80

Earthen Dams—11 farms constructed 11 dams totaling 12,712 cubic yards, which earned \$1,271.20.

Drainage Ditches—42 farms constructed ditches to take care of excess water from terrace systems on 1755 acres and earned \$2,932.33.

Wells for livestock water—22 wells were drilled on 22 farms with a total depth of 4,239 feet, which earned \$8,478.00.

Elimination of destructive plants of cedar and underbrush was carried out on 207 arms in the extent of 7,170.3 acres, which earned a payment of \$22,524.15.

Mowing pastures—34 farms mowed 1,769 acres and earned \$884.50.

Seeding Pastures—125 farms seeded 9,992 pounds of pasture grasses on about 1665 acres and earned \$6,659.47.

Reseeding pastures—52 farms seeded 13,752 pounds of pasture grasses and legumes on about 1,620 acres, which earned \$3,499.32

Sodding pasture—5 farms sodded 36.0 acres to earn \$180.

Winter legumes—277 farms planted 131,625 pounds of winter legumes on about 6773 acres and earned \$9,878.24.

Ryegrass cover crops—32 farms planted 11,195 pounds of annual ryegrass on about 559 acres, which earned \$873.21.

Summer legume cover crops—189 farms carried out the practice by seeding 69,524 pounds of summer legume seed on about 5,782 acres, earning \$12,751.62.

Harvesting pasture grass seed—1,233 pounds of seed were harvested on 3 farms from 102.5 ac., and earned \$209.61.

Phosphate materials—181 farms applied 1,060,200 pounds of 20% superphosphate on about 7,068 a. to earn \$10,071.90.

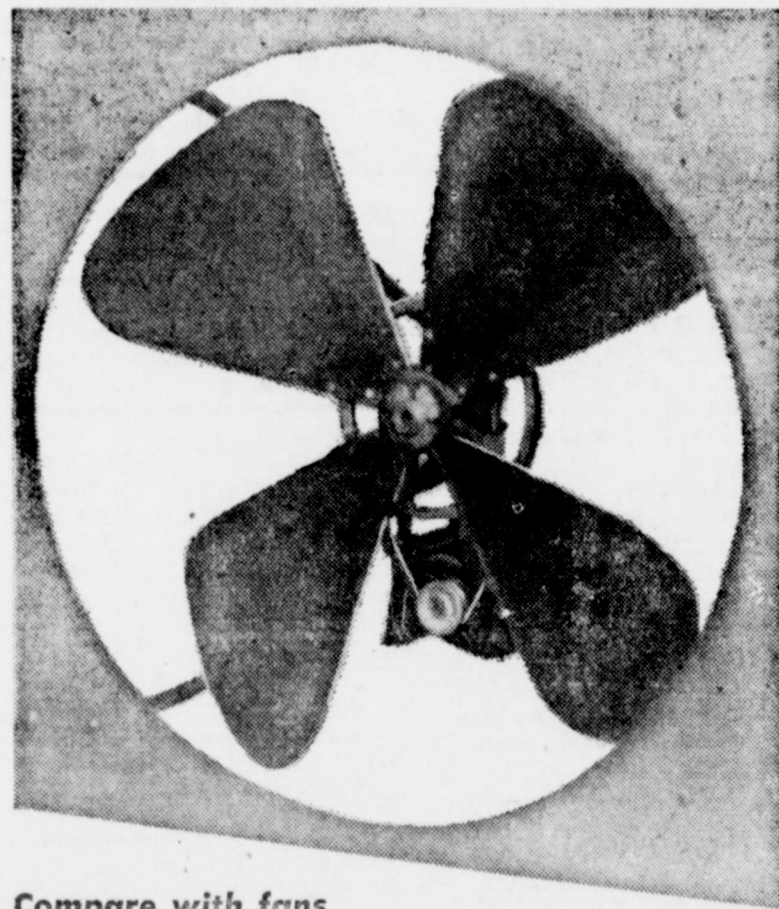

rope. The committee was organized at the outset of the war under the leadership of Cardinal Francis Spellman, Archbishop of New York, and has been directed by James Norris, a layman, whose home is in New Jersey.

We have observed the remarkable effectiveness of this committee's work in all these war-torn countries of Europe. Had UNRA been administered with the same devotion to the cause of relief of human suffering that has characterized the Catholic program there would be an entirely different picture, both economic and political in Europe today.

Wherever there is need for relief you will find a Sister of Charity in her wide white coat administering to the sick, the wounded and the starving. I say "wounded" advisedly, because there is sporadic and isolated guerrilla warfare going on thruout almost all the Balkan countries. Whatever is given to these distressed people is delivered by a Sister of Charity. They ride trucks and mule-drawn wagons into every section of Europe except those places in the Balkans from which they are barred by the Russians.

Relief of all kinds is distributed to all classes of needy people regardless of race, religion or color. And whether it be a can of soup, warm clothing, a bottle of sulfa tablets, or what, every article, every box, carries a label, printed in the language of the locality, stating that it came from the National Catholic Welfare Committee and had been "donated by all the people of America". That label goes on everything the Sisters of Charity distribute in every country of Europe. That little label has done more to offset the vicious propaganda of the Russians among the common people of these countries against America than any other one agency of American good will.

In some countries, notably in Hungary and Romania, the Russians demanded that the relief be turned over to them for distribution. But Jim Norris and the Sisters of Charity said "NO". If the Sisters could not personally deliver relief supplies the trucks and wagons would stop coming. The Russians fumed and argued, but finally gave in because the Sisters of Charity have become so popular with the poor and distressed inhabitants the Russians didn't dare bar them.

This policy was adopted by the Catholic committee because of the scandalous manner in which UNRA supplies were used to poison

the people against America. The UNRA organization, everything that has been written to the contrary notwithstanding, was shot full of pinko politicians and fellow travelers who turned over distribution to the Communists and Russian representatives. This was before the elections in Hungary, Romania and Bulgaria.

Armed with food, clothing and medical supplies from UNRA, the Kremlitrained relief staff went about these countries distributing the supplies, more than 80 percent of which had been donated by America. All families who received the UNRA help in these countries were required to sign a pledge that they would vote Communist. If they didn't sign they got no help. The Communists in charge of distribution told them the supplies were the gift of Russia.

The people, few of whom could read, and practically none of whom understood English, could not tell from the labels, which were in English, that the Communists were lying. They were led to believe that Russia was the great and good provider, that the Americans didn't care if they did suffer and starve. And the Russians did it with our supplies paid for by American dollars. That is the tragic, almost treasonable scandal of UNRA administration in the Balkans.

In sharp contrast the work of the National Catholic Welfare Committee has been a great bulwark against Russian penetration during these last two years, while Americans were slowly awakening to the Soviet menace. It is practically the only agency which serves all races and all creeds thruout Europe except the American Quakers Relief Committee, which is doing just as fine a job only on a smaller scale.

In Paris we visited the Mother House for Relief, under the direction of the beloved Sister Regereau. It adjoins the little chapel in the Rue du Bac where the body of Ste. Catherine Labourie lies beside the altar, visible thru the glass wall of her crypt. We watched the Sisters of Charity at their work of organizing relief. We talked to them about their experiences on the trucks and wagons, in the villages, in the hills and in the port towns.

Their eager evotion to the cause their profusely expressed gratitude to the American people for giving them "a chance to serve God and humanity", the uplifting inspiration of their saintly faces, made me, the son of a Methodist minister, profoundly grateful for the existence of the Catholic church and especially for the merciful service of the Sisters of Charity.

I recalled that one of America's most noted men of religion said to me just before we left New York: "Christians everywhere must unite in a great spiritual awakening if we are to save the world from the stark paganism of Soviet Russia."
