Surviving besides his wife and child are his mother, Mrs. J. F. Sellers, Jonesboro; four brothers, J. F. Sellers Jr, Gatesville; Dick Sellers, Waco; Kenneth and Carson Sellers, both of Jonesboro; and three sisters, Mrs. Maggie Gibson, Waco; Mrs. Grace Massingill, Hamilton and Mrs. S. A. Joiner, Rising Star.

Interment was in the new I. O. O. F. Cemetery, Hamilton.—The Hamilton Herald-Record.

**Ausborn R. Warren Is Killed In Rodeo Accident at Meridian**

Ausborn R. Warren, 18, was killed Saturday night at the Meridian rodeo when he was thrown by a wild bronc at they emerged from the chute. Sheriff George Gaines of Bosque County said the animal had been drawn by an other contestant, but had been assigned Warren in a last-minute change. The accident was about 9:30 p. m.

The youth's ribs were crushed when the horse brought its hind feet down on his chest. He was dead on arrival at the Holt Hospital at Meridian.

Funeral services were held at Scott's Funeral Home, Gatesville, conducted by John T. Overby, and interment was in Restland Cemetery, Morton Scott & Son, Funeral Directors, in charge.

**Wyatt B. Watts To Be Buried Here: W. W. II Casualty**

Pvt. Wyatt B. Watts, deceased son of Mrs. Grace Shelton of 2104 Saunders St., Gatesville, will be returned here for burial shortly. He is being brought from Manila, Philippine Islands aboard the U. S. Army transport Lieutenant George W. C. Boyce, and is to arrive at the San Francisco Port of Embarkation.



The 4,459 men were originally interred in temporary military cemeteries in New Guinea and the Philippine Islands.

Private Watts was stationed in Hawaii in November 1943, and was moved from there. He received a Silver Star award, and it was awarded to his mother in a posthumous ceremony at Camp Hood, by Lt. Col. Orlin D. Horne, Chemical Warfare Officer. The citation read: "For gallantry in action—Island, June 7, 1944. Pvt. Watts was a member of a mortar squad which had set up on open terrain the only position available which their fire could be accurately directed on the enemy. He was seriously wounded in the ensuing action, but remained and worked with the squad until he was too weak to carry on, soon, thereafter, dying.

He refused to give up the fight and insisted on remaining at his post, stating that he was needed to keep the mortar in action. The heroic performance of duty by this intrepid soldier is worthy of the highest praise. Pvt. Watts serves as an inspiration to all his comrades."

Pvt. Watts was killed in New Guinea, and was a member of the 186th Infantry.

Pvt. Watts had one brother, Wilson Watts in the service and he served 3 1/2 years in Australia. In December 1945, he was sent to McCloskey General Hospital, Temple and received a medical discharge.

Funeral services will be announced on arrival of his remains.

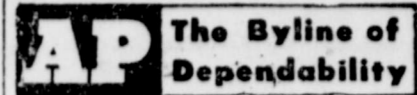

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### Here's Columbia Sheep Story Promised: A New US Gov't Breed

"The Columbia sheep was developed by the United States Department of Agriculture as a true breeding type to replace cross breeding on the range.

"In 1912 rams of the long wool breeds were crossed with the high quality Rambouillet ewes to produce large ewes yielding more pounds of wool and more pounds of lamb:

"The first cross Lincoln-Rambouillet line was the most promising of all crosses. The Bureau of Animal Industry maintained this line and by intensive breeding and selection produced a true breeding strain with the characteristics of the superior cross-bred line.

"As this was the first breed of sheep developed in America the name COLUMBIA was chosen.

"The original cross was made at Laramie, Wyoming, and the Foundation of the Government Columbian flock was moved to the Sheep Experiment Station at Dubois, Idaho, in 1918.

"The outstanding record made by Columbias on the western ranges has created interest among sheep men of other areas. While they were originally developed for range conditions they have proved admirably adapted to the more lush grasses and the small flock management of the middle west. Their heavy wool clip, hardy, fast growing lambs, "open faces", and ease of handling are characteristics highly valued by all practical sheepmen."

Here are some of the "Bases of Inspection" of this breed:

Size: Mature Columbia rams should weigh 200-275 pounds; mature ewes, 120-200, depending on the conditions under which they are raised.

Fleece: They should shear an annual fleece of 12 pounds or more, depending on environmental conditions. The fleece should grade 1/2, 3/4, or 1 block, but should not show a greater variation than two grades.

Head: Columbias of both sexes are hornless and open faced.

Color: Hair on the face should be white. The occurrence of black pigment on the nostrils and hooves and in small spots on the ears is not objectionable.

Neck: Moderately short, neatly attached, full, free from wrinkles and folds.

Shoulders: Wide, tightly laid on top and even with backline.

Chest: Wide and deep with forelegs set well apart.

Back: Level, wide and strongly muscled.

Rump: Long and wide with dock carried well up.

Ribs: Well sprung, wide and deep.

### Leasing of Camp Hood Area Suspended For Present

Congressman W. R. Poage informs Dawson Cooper, President of the Chamber of Commerce, that the U. S. Engineers have called off the leasing of the lands in North Camp Hood. This covers the two blocks of land which were recently advertised to be leased.

Mr. Poage sends along a copy of letter received from Colonel B. L. Robinson, District Engineer, in which he states instructions have been received to suspend all activities so far as the outleasing of North Camp Hood is concerned. To quote from Mr. Poage's letter: "As far as I can see, there is nothing we can do other than to wait until the size of the Army and its needs for the cantonment areas are determined. Of course, it would be a mistake to lease this land to the former owners and take it back in just a few months."

The former landowners had been

### Jet Planes Working With Armored Vehicles Please Hood General

CAMP HOOD, Texas, May 31. (Spl.)—"I believe we accomplished our mission", Maj. Gen. James G. Christiansen, commanding general, 2nd Armored Division, told officers who participated in "Exercise Mesquite", Saturday. "Coordination improved as we went along", he added.

"Mesquite", a four-day air-ground exercise which took place on the Camp Hood reservation saw units of the 12 Air Force and the 2nd Armored Division on maneuvers from Monday, May 10 through Friday, May 14, practicing coordination between jet planes and armored groups.

The exercise, which was to dislodge "Aggressor" nation troops from the Camp Hood-Gatesville area, actually started May 6, when Aggressor forces composed of Co. B, 17th Armored Engineers began to assemble targets and planes began reconnaissance.

The use of Aggressor troops in green uniforms from various mechanized infantry and other divisions, corps and armies belonging to mythical nation named "Aggressor", has always been confined to army level maneuvers. 2nd Armored's use of them is the first they have been used on division level.

Saturday, officers of the ground and air forces who took part in the exercise listened while hogs ranking officers in a critique of operations expressed pleasure at the results. Immediately after the critique personnel of the 12th Air Force returned to their base at Riverside, California.

Brig. Gen. John H. Collier, commanding general, Combat Command A, who, with Lt. Col. Seth J. McKee, AF, was joint operations control, discussed the exercise from the point of view of the ground commander. Gen. Collier was extremely pleased with the record of the jet planes in bombing the targets one minute after being marked by the artillery.

Col. McKee, representing Maj. Gen. Glenn O. Barcus, commanding general, 12th Air Force, said, "I believe we achieved our goal. Cooperation left nothing to be desired, and improved each day".

Col. McKee also stated that the 27th Fighter Squadron with jet

Mrs. Celia Adaline Ballard, 86, died Friday, May 28, 1948 at the E. C. Barrington home on RFD 2, Gatesville.

he was born April 2, 1862 in Blunt County, Alabama, and spent most of her life in Coryell County. Her father was Jesse Bynum of Blunt County, Alabama. She was a member of the Methodist church.

Services were held May 29, 1948 at 3 p. m., at the Methodist church, Pearl, interment was in the Bee House cemetery. Rev. B. F. Reynolds conducting the services. Morton Scott & Son, Funeral Directors in charge.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. E. C. Barrington, Gatesville; 4 sons, J. H., Pearl, P. E., Gatesville, W. P., Abilene, and G. L., O'Donnell. There are also 24 grandchildren, and a brother, A. L. Bynum of Hamilton.

During August of 1890 he started to work with the Citizens National Bank, which later became the First National Bank. That was on the same corner of the square and in the same building where The National Bank now operates. He was elected to Assistant Cashier in 1901, Cashier in 1919 and President of the First National Bank in 1921. In 1938 the First National Bank and the Gatesville National Bank consolidated, and Leake Ayres continued to serve in the capacity of president, which title he now holds. He started his career in banking back when the total deposits of all the banks in Coryell County were less than \$100,000.00. On their reports as of December 31, 1947, the total deposits of the four banks now in the county amounted to over \$7,000,000.00.

Much of the time of Leake Ayres has been devoted to public service. He served for many years on the School Board, and was active in Boy Scout work. For a long number of years he was Superintendent of the Sunday School at the First Methodist Church, where he was also chairman of the Board of Stewards, one of the trustees for the Church, and several years served as treasurer of the Methodist Central Texas Conference. He is the son of W. L. Ayres, a pioneer merchant of Gatesville, who came to Coryell County from Tennessee in 1882. He has lived in Gatesville since that time, and continues to be one of its most influential citizens.

## Farm News

Everybody considered the Sheep Show and Sale very successful. Prices received were satisfactory to most of the breeders.

It was encouraging to see such a large number of stud rams stay in Coryell County. The present high price of wool and mutton is doing much to encourage sheep raisers to give a sheep program more attention.

Too long has the sheep flock been considered the scavenger of the pastures. Sheep like cattle, should receive a protein supplement during the winter months if a strong crop of lambs are to be expected. Along with a good feed a rigid program of parasite control should be practiced—control of stomach worms with phenothiazine, and control of the lice and ticks with rotenone and sulphur.

After the sheep are sheared is a good time to dip them or spray them.

Gatesville is hoping that the Texas Sheep Breeders Association will see fit to make Gatesville the place for their Annual Show and Sale.

### Insects

Grasshoppers are more numerous in this County than any year since 1929. Should dry weather prevail grasshoppers will infest the fields. For several weeks the County Agent has been holding demonstrations and urging farmers to kill the grasshoppers while they are small. Up to date we have two insecticides, Chlordane and Toxophene, which do a wonderful job of killing the grasshoppers while they are out in the grass and weeds. If the grasshoppers are not killed at this stage, and vegetation becomes scarce in the pastures and fence rows they will invade the fields for greener food. This will require bait poison in the fields of small cotton.

One of the above insecticides, Toxophene, is recommended for control of the flea hopper and

Boll Weevil. A 20% Toxophene dust applied to the rate of 10 lbs. per acre gives good control of both insects. Chlordane dust is expected to do the same thing. Early season dusting is considered necessary. Farmers should be prepared to make cross field surveys for the presence of the Flea Hopper and Boll Weevil.

If small squares are being blasted in the top of the stalks, Flea Hoppers are present, and if many squares are being stung by the Boll Weevil, say 25%—25 squares on 100 stalks, treatment is necessary. Toxophene and Chlordane are available at this time and the source of these products can be obtained from your County Agent

### Swine

Billy Guyon Taylor of Gatesville has made a good record in selling his pigs outside the County. He sold a boar pig to the County Agent of Somervell County, and another boar pig and gilt to County Agent of San Saba County. This speaks well of the kind and quality of Billy's pigs. Billy's sow placed second in the County Show of high quality Gilts last year.

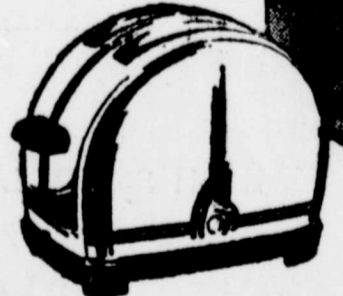

Americans don't like to restrict anybody's freedom to advocate any kind of government or economic system he wants, but I believe almost everyone will agree that the government must protect itself from any foreign government. When a person or organization seeks to place our land under the control of Moscow it is just too much, and yet that is just what most Communists would do.

As far as I am concerned, if these people believe Russia is so much better than the United States, they should go there and enjoy themselves. I would not interfere with their government there and I don't think they should seek to interfere with ours here. If anyone wants to advocate Communism either as a form of government or as an economic system, he can continue to do so, provided he has no connections with a foreign power or organization.

I regret that we were forced to take this action. The Bill is not entirely in keeping with my views. Its guarantees of protection to the accused individual are not as clear as I had wished, but definitely the Bill is not as far-reaching as its opponents claimed. I know that if we are to maintain our free institutions we must free ourselves of the influence of those who are more interested in the success of a foreign government than in the welfare of our own. I, therefore, voted FOR the bill.

It is expected that we will act on the extension of the Reciprocal Trade Agreement Act next week. The Republican majority has refused to hold public hearings on this measure. In violation of the Rules, they have closed the doors and have come out with what I understand will be only a partial extension of this Act. Apparently they are getting ready to go back to the Smoot-Hawley Tariff which killed all world trade and threw the whole world into a depression. Today it is more important than ever that we remove trade barriers if we are to ever receive any repayment on the sums of money due us. The other nations of the world have no dollars. They can only buy our goods and repay our loans with their goods. If we are by that very action, making it impossible for them to buy our goods or to pay their debts to us, I want to sell Texas cotton, and I want to collect what we can of the debts due our country, I, therefore, fear that the secret action of the Republicans may be most hurtful.

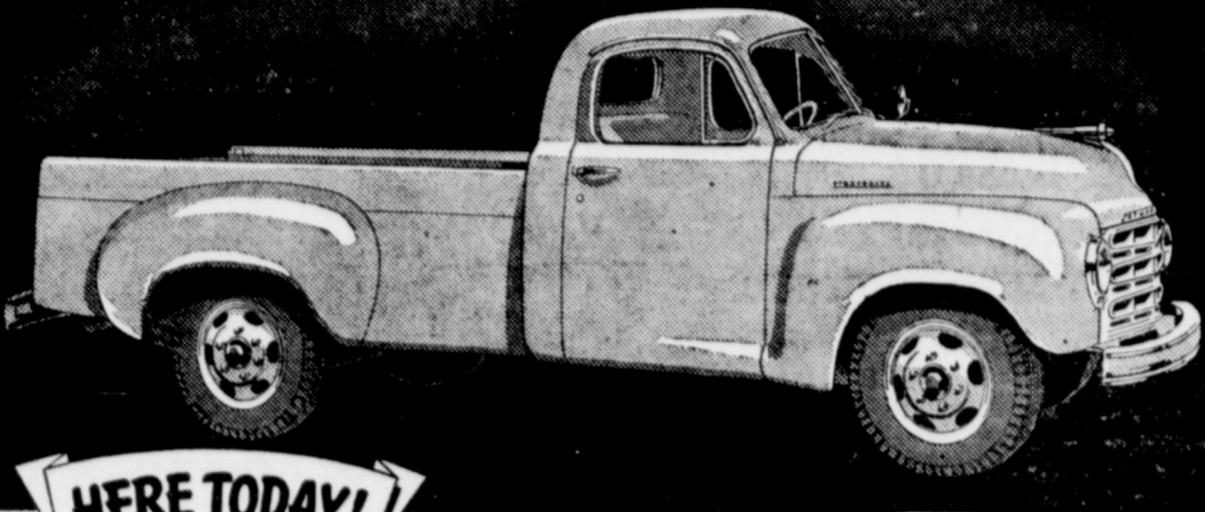

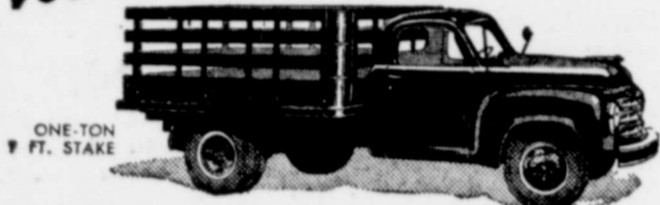
