Voters Urged To Support W. W. Roark For State Senator

W. W. "Red" Roark of Temple, Texas, Bell County Representative for six years has announced his candidacy for State Senator for the 21st District, composed of Bell, Coryell, Hamilton, Bosque and Erath Counties and has launched a vigorous and energetic campaign.



Those who are familiar with Roark's record as a law-maker in the Texas House of Representatives pointed out that he has untiringly and consistently worked for increased old age assistance and other social security benefits; for farm to market and lateral roads; for all measures that were for the benefit and betterment of the farmer; rancher; and laboring man. Official Report Of School Supervisor To Dept. of Education

Here's the gist of the report by State Department of Education Supervisor R. R. Kay, which he made on Gatesville High School to the Texas State Department of Education, L. A. Woods, State Superintendent.

"In order that schools may be properly certified, it is essential that the minimum requirements be met. To that end the supervisor who recently visited your school makes the following report:

- "1. Credits added: None.
- "2. Credits dropped: None.
- "3. Observations, Recommendations, and comments:

"It is recommended that this school be placed on the "Warned List" of accredited schools pending the correction of the following unsatisfactory conditions:

"1. Library—A full time librarian with at least 24 hours of library science should replace the present librarian; clerical assistance a reading room with open stocks, tables, and chairs, and a verticle file should be provided. A minimum of \$1,000 per year for the next three years to be spent for the replacement of old obsolete books for new fiction, biographies and reference, books and magazines. At least 20 periodicals and newspapers should be provided each year.

"2. Reduce teacher-pupil load to meet the State and Southern Association standards.

"3. Give teachers and administrators the required free time, and time for supervision.

"4. Additional clerical help to relieve superintendent and principals from routine details, reports and permanent records.

"5. Provide a fire proof vault for permanent records.

"6. Relieve superintendent of all teaching duties.

"7. Organize an in-service training program for all teachers. (This is required by the Southern Association.)

"8. Provide adequate buildings, equipment and suitable playground as soon as possible.

Further Recommendations

"We recommend that the elementary school be built on a new campus well removed from the present site with adequate space for a modern physical education program.

"The faculty is doing an excellent job under the present almost impossible conditions. Outstanding work was observed in a number of classrooms.

"The school spirit is excellent. "Teacher pupil cooperation was very evident.

"The administration has the support of the faculty in all phases of the school program.

"A good student activity program is evident.

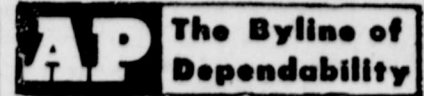

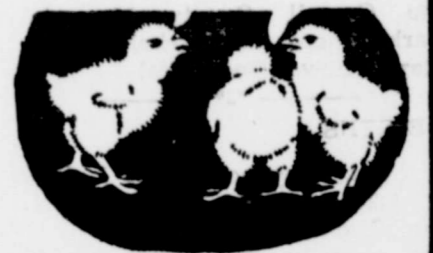

Trade Barriers

In years past many people looked upon the tariff as a domestic matter. Today most people recognize that the whole question of world trade is a vital matter of world wide importance. Most of us recognize that if we are to have a politically stable world we must have economic stability. If we are to have political freedom, we must have economic freedom. We cannot hope to have economic freedom throughout the world if we maintain and magnify trade barriers. On the domestic front these trade barriers often take the form of monopoly. On the International front the best understood trade barriers take the form of tariffs—actually there are many other trade barriers, such as quotas, currency regulations, etc.—but tariffs have become a

symbol, and as such they are of especial importance.

When the Republicans adopted the Smoot-Hawley Tariff they did so under a closed rule. They were unwilling twenty years ago to discuss the issue. This week they repeated that record. They denied any public hearings before the Committee which reported the reciprocal trade Act. They brought in a rule which made it impossible to amend their bill, and which limited discussion to two hours. They then passed a bill which in effect puts the United States back on the road to high protective tariffs. They did this in spite of the fact that many of their own leaders in the Senate and in the business world warned against it. We can only hope that the Senate will be more interested in restoring world trade, and in maintaining a market for our products than the Republicans of

All Washington was shocked at the disclosure of the shameful abuse of the "Voice of America" program by the broadcasting company which was employed to prepare and broadcast this program after it became aparent that the State Department was doing such a miserable ob. It was that a great commercial organization would, at least, give us programs that would reflect credit on our country. At the time this is written, no one has explained why this company should have seen fit to send out the insulting, unfair and prejudicial "stuff" which they broadcast to Latin America. I particularly resent the statement that "Texas was founded in sin", but surely no moron could believe that any of the statements could be calculated to increase respect for the United States.

Basically, I fear that our inability to get a wholesome, real American program springs from the attitude which so many people have to the effect that we should never use our place and power in the world to influence other people. I think this is a great mistake. I think we should use every honest means within our power to bet people on our side. I am proud of America, and I am proud of Texas. I like to "tell the world" about my State. In fact, I am about to conclude that the "Voice of America" will never be a success until we put a Texan in charge and include some real Texas bragging on the program.

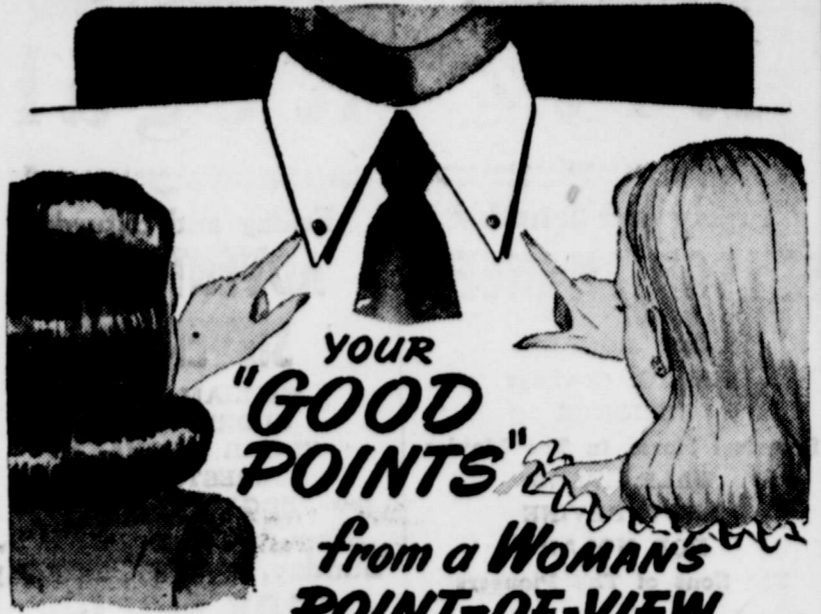

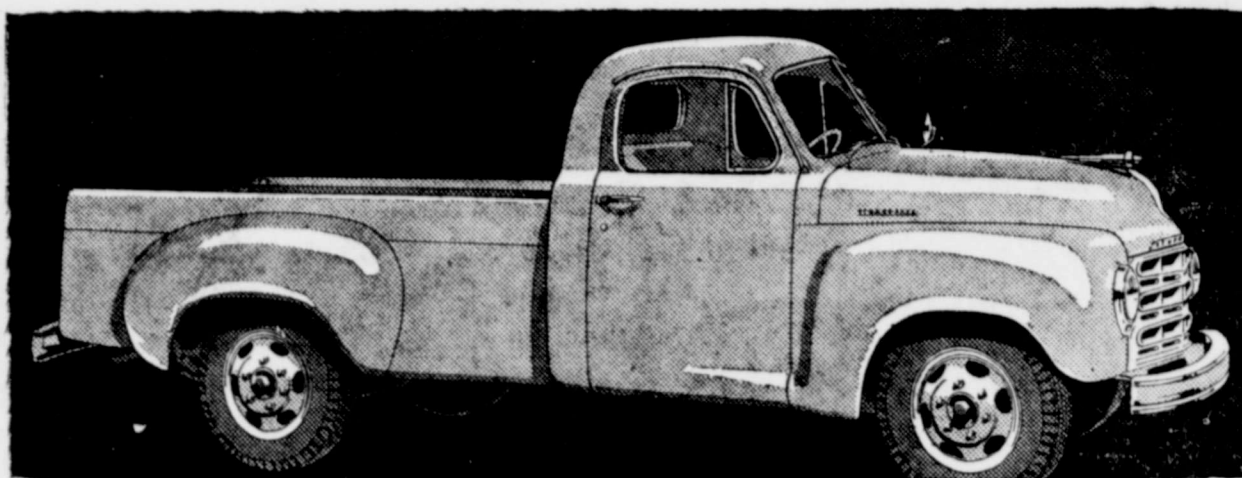

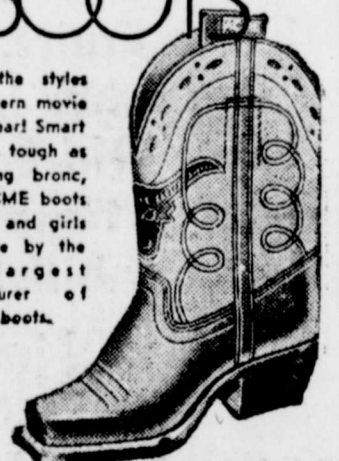
