**C. E. Gandy Writes
His Opinoin On Our
School Situation**

Gatesville people have always approached problems that are vital and of importance to us all with sober intelligent thought, and then, and then only, have taken the necessary steps for their solution.

That the school is now ailing in several ways, I think we will all agree and the recent report from the State Supervisor clearly states some conditions that must be corrected. But before we take any drastic steps and make some permanent, fundamental, radical changes, let us be reasonably certain that we have properly diagnosed and case and know for certain the underlying causes which have brought about these present deplorable conditions.

The school—our school—is by far the largest business institution in the community; The annual budget is around 120,000 dollars. It is not a money producing business. It is solely a money spending agency. Slightly more than ten percent of the total expenditures is received from local taxation, the balance of course is returned from the State Capital, that being some of the moneys that we pay into the State Treasury through State Taxes, so it is easy to see that any change made in our local tax rate for school purposes, would only be a dribble as compared with the total spent. Assuming that more money is necessary, would it not be reasonable able that we put forth some effort to acquire more money from the sources which are now supplying almost eighty percent of the available funds? rather than to double local taxation?

This is not the first time that we have faced an unfavorable report, with some MUSTS attached. Shortly after World War I this occurred, then some important changes were made at the suggestion of those in authority, some of these men have passed away,

**SANTA POSE CRIPPLES
U. S. ACTION IN GREECE**

ATHENS, Greece.—With the sporadic gunfire of guerrilla warfare blasting away in the hills 80 miles to the north, Athens still is writhing in the chaos of an unsolved political crisis that was brought on by the failure of the American government to lay down a clearly defined policy with regard to its objectives in Greece.

The Americans have not been definite and specific at what we want done.

All the politicians, except the Communists, want to please the Americans, and especially do they want and insist on helping the Americans spend the money we are loaning to Greece.

Each of the leaders of the five parties put his own interpretation "what the Americans want" and began to act accordingly.

As a result of this confusion of plans and the inevitable conflict of personal ambitions, the coalition

government fell. It was the last thing American missions wanted. A serious crisis, which has not yet been solved, played directly into the hands of Moscow-dominated Communist Party. It gave real "aid and comfort" to the guerrillas. They stepped up their activity in the hills and plastered Athens and other Greek towns with posters denouncing "Quisling Griswald". The people were urged to rise up against the "imperialistic Yankees" and drive them out of Greece. The crisis has been a field day for the Soviets and the Greek Communists and the end is not yet in sight.

A bizarre touch to all the confusion was added when the 73,000 civil service workers in Greece announced they would go on strike for 100 per cent increase in wages if their demands are not met by 3 a.m. Thursday. One Athens newspaper said: "Let them strike. We have three times as many federal employes as we need any how."

While the politicians of Athens quarrel and bicker over the premiership and its quick access to the American gravy train, Tito's boys from Yugoslavia and Bulgarian are helping Gen. Marco, the guerrilla chieftain, get set in northern Greece. Gen. Marco is the typical Communist officer. He was discontented tobacco worker, a shiftless, incompetent waiter, waiter and finally an ordinary street peddler. He joined the Communist Party, went to jail several times and eventually wound up in Moscow where he was trained to be a Communist guerrilla leader.

Last week this one time Athens waiter announced the establishment of an independent "constitutional government" for Greece with headquarters in Florin it is dedicated to the "liberation of Greece from Yankee Imperialism." ? ? ? ?

Gen. Marco has approximately "30,000 Guerilla troops scattered throughout northern Greece and is strong enough in the mountains around Florin to hold his own against the regular Greek forces.

The obvious plan is for Tito's Yugoslavian government to recognize Gen. Marco's government the "constitutional" representatives of Greece, thereby giving Yugoslavia, Bulgaria, Albania and other Russia to filter basis for carrying on diplomatic relations with Gen. Marco's alleged Greek government. This will enable Russia to filter supplies, personnel and espionage forces out of Russia through Yugoslavia into northern Greece without committing an open overt act of unfriendly conduct.

The regular Greek army has a present strength of 180,000 men. If it were used properly in a guerrilla counter-offensive it could probably put down the Communist uprising in about three weeks. But the army, like everything else in Greece, is being run by the Athens politicians for their own political and financial advantage. The army is divided into small detachments of 500 to 1000 men each with orders from the politicians to guard or defend some certain town or village in central

or northern Greece. The army is being used exclusively to defend the towns from guerrillas out of the Greek Mountains and back into Albania and Yugoslavia from whence comes their supplies and arms.

The American army officers who are here as observers insist that the Greek army must be organized into a counter-guerrilla offensive, but so far the politicians have been strong enough to take care of their own personal town interests and there is no Greek army offensive against the guerrillas worth mentioning.

The plain truth is the Greek people don't have any clear idea why we are here than does the average American, so nebulous has been our explanation of our objectives in Greece.

But the Greeks never look a gift horse in the mouth. They cleaned up the hundred of thousand of dollars on manipulations of UNR shipments into Greece. Some newspapermen here estimated UNRA graft ran into the millions. So now the Greek politicians, importers and bankers are rubbing their hands in glee over the prospects of another bonanza from America.

They will agree to almost anything we ask just so they can get their hands on the money. The Greeks are traditionally traders. Their dealings are not immoral, they are simply unmoral. They cannot resist the temptation to take the honest Americans for a financial buggy ride even though while they bicker for position at the trough they are in real danger of being completely wiped out by the Soviet horde which is poised and waiting to surge down from the north.

They are so obsessed by their zeal to outtrade us they don't stop to realize that the Soviets would confiscate everything these Athenians have and put them to work in forced labor camps. That would literally kill the great majority of them because they never have done any actual physical work in their lives.

"The people of both America and Greece should be told frankly and in words everybody can understand just what the United States is doing in Greece, Turkey and the Near east and why", a man high in the American establishment here told me.

"Why not be frank with the people of both countries" he asked "Why don't we come right out and admit we are doing everything in our power to stop the Russians from seizing control of the Mediterranean, the Suez Canal and the oil fields of Arabia and the Near East countries.

"The Greek people generally have the idea we are launching another Santa Claus UNRA party. "That is pure bunk.

"We are trying to save our own necks as well as those of some other countries. It is national defense and national self-interest. We either check the Russians here while there is time to build up the economy of potential allies or we meet them alone after they have crushed resistance throughout Europe.

"The Russians don't want war. They are not prepared for it. They have no production to support a war. They think they can conquer Europe and the Near East without a war because they believe we will grow tired worrying with such annoying things as this Greek crisis and go home. And I say the American people ought to know we simply cannot pull out. Our one chance to check the Russians lies in the program that has been proposed but never explained to the American people.

"For instance, how many Americans know that in event of trouble with Russia—which by the way is almost inevitable—we would be sunk without free access to the oil reserves of the Near East? This program isn't international relief or Yankee imperialism. It is realistic national defense and the sooner Americans realize it the better."

At that time they did not undertake to divorce the city and school, but they slowly met the conditions and the necessity of improving the school plant and other necessary improvements until we reached near a perfect condition as evidenced by State Supervisors report dated May 27, 1938, that report was copied in the Messenger of May 28th, 1948 as an item of ten years ago happenings. It is evident that these bad conditions come in cycles.

The recent State Supervisors report which has been so well advertised and for which we are all so much ashamed, is likely in most instances, to represent a true picture of existing conditions.

People with school experience, especially, and all thinking people should strive to with heads up, the best foot forward to sell the idea that we are putting out a good product, and I believe we are, even though the plant needs improvement.

If the recent report is a true picture in its entirety, I am humble and ashamed, if it is not, I highly resent the accusing finger being pointed at the efforts of our faculty and the past accomplishments of the student body, and the intimidation that we are drifting to a low standard of citizenship.

After the separation these moves will likely follow: A political campaign for the election of trustees, a large bond issue, a building program, enlarged school district with new and untried leadership in this form of school government to direct it.

I am giving this statement to the press, because any number of my friends have asked me for my opinion, and after thoroughly investigating the matter, and with

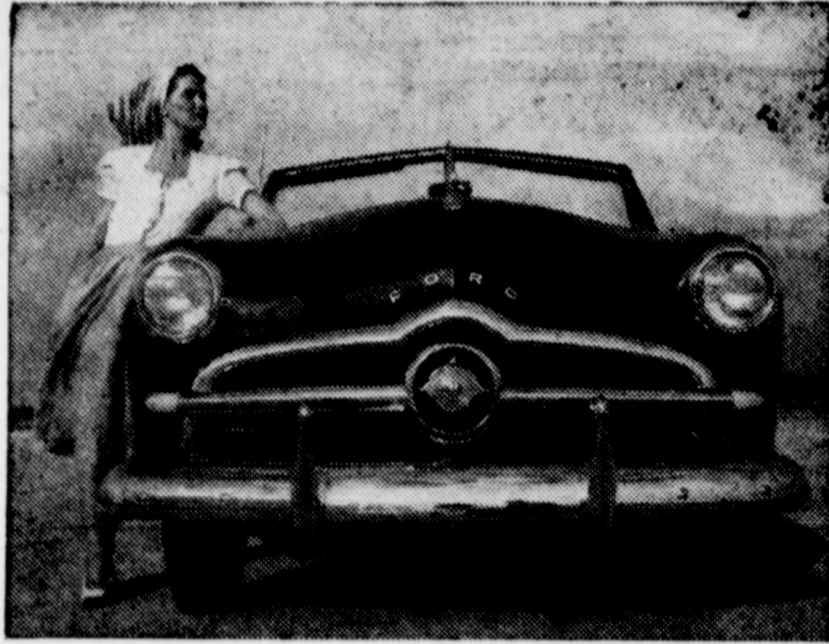

mutual gambling legal in Texas, but we defeated it.

The "Right to Work" law is now in effect—passed over the bitter opposition of the strongest labor unions in the country. This law eliminates the closed shop and gives a man the right to work without cow-towing to some labor boss.

These are a few of the many dozens of laws and resolutions passed or defeated last session. My record on each of these is completely an open book, and I hope you will ask about them.

We've tried to run your government as you would have us run your business or your farm. We have rebuilt new roads, raised the pension to the legal limit, provided for veterans schools, established a new pay level for teachers and still there has been no overspending. Your state treasury is still sound and has a surplus.

With this done and still more step-by-step progress to be made next January, I respectfully ask you for a second term in the Legislature.

Rosemary is here beside me as I write this. She is still a fine team-mate. She does most of my worrying for me. It just frightens her to death when I have to make a speech somewhere. And she keeps right after me for fear I'll vote wrong on some bill.
