School Board Member Writes About The "Divorce" Question

Dear Sir,
There is really only one issue at stake in the coming election to decide the fate of the local school system. That is: Are we to be content with a second rate educational system for our children, or shall we take advantage of better facilities and methods now available? We have been making our children go to school in inadequate, unsafe, even unsanitary, buildings long enough. In past years, the city administration in their zeal to construct school buildings at a ridiculously cheap figure have sacrificed quality of materials and workmanship, until after only a relatively short period of time the buildings must now have major repairs. We have stunted ourselves on library facilities until we had to be warned by the State Department of Education that we may be dropped from the accredited school list.

Why have our school affairs gotten into such a bad shape? Because it is impossible to make the improvements necessary without money. It is impossible to get the money without taxes, and it is equally impossible to raise enough tax money to do the job without a divorce of city and school administration.

Separation is favored by all of the City Council and School Board. In a joint meeting with trustees of school districts who may be affected outside the city limits, it was indicated that those good people are willing to bear their part of the load. It is highly possible that when all of these districts are combined with ours, the tax increase will be nominal, and will be offset by a school system of which we can all be justly proud.

Let's all vote for a better education for our children, and in so doing give them all of the advantages which are rightfully theirs.

Mayor Orders Immediate Cleanup Thruout City
Mayor Kermit R. Jones has ordered all City employees on a "clean up tour of the city."

This will include mowing all grass in alleys, vacant lots, cleaning up private premises, ditches, emptying all water in cans, or stagnant water in ditches. All this, and also cow lots, pig stys, horse lots and any other places where animals are kept will be DDT'd.

Warning For All Animals

Warning has also been issued, that if your stock is grazing on these vacant lots, alleys, ditches, etc., get them out, because DDT will kill the animals, and these places are going to be DDT'd!

In addition, all garbage disposal or storage containers MUST be of the covered variety that dogs and other prowlers cannot get the lids off. And, too, there'll be extra garbage collections, and private individuals are urged to clean up their own premises. The top to your garbage can is a MUST, and if not observed, stiff penalties are promised.

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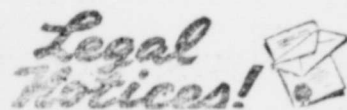
Three Gatesville Men Named Officers In Cen-Tex Fox Hunters

Way to Socialism

When President Charles Seymour of Yale University declared recently that his university wants no part of federal grants for educational purposes, it seemed to me high time that educators in general should wake up to the dangers inherent in federal aid to education. The public, too, seems entirely too complacent regarding this "let-Washington-do-it" attitude, an attitude far too many educators have been fooled into accepting.

It was President Seymour's idea that direct federal grants to his institution would "imperil the independence of the university." Indeed, sooner or later they would. Public school educators could tear a leaf out of President Seymour's notebook. If federal aid would bring interference and control at Yale, so also would federal grants to public education bring control by Washington over local educational functions.

Pocketbook Power

As far as I know, nobody has ever argued that control over the finances of an undertaking fails to bring with it full control of that project. Surely where the pocketbook is, there goes the authority. None of those arguing for federal aid will admit they would welcome federal control of education. Everybody wants to avoid federal control (except the Communists).

Yet, it amazes me that folks would accept measures that lead to control, as surely as dawn precedes day. We work hard and spend tax money, to promote decentralization, local responsibility, and local self-government in Germany. We still believe that Hitler and his Nazis built a dictatorship by concentrating power into hands that no one dared oppose.

Local Rights

Why then, should America ever take a step in the same direction? Federal aid to public education is socialized education. All the dangers attendant to the centralized government would be magnified under any plan that would permit federal control of the education of children. Must America go in the same direction that Czechoslovakia has gone? Freedom of the local community in educational affairs must be maintained.

No sane educator or good citizen would argue against more and better education. Everybody agrees on the necessity for improving our schools constantly. Not only the children, but the nation as a whole suffers when we neglect to provide funds for school buildings and equipment. Our public school teachers need better pay and better training. Although we have already made the best record of any nation, in the realm of education, we can do still better.

On the Alert

The answer to this problem is: educate the adults. Educate the grown folks to have the same appreciation for good education that they have for good highways, and you will find splendid schools in every place. State finances are greatly improved. Our states can, and will, spend more and more for education. Why run to a federal government already in debt hundreds of billions of dollars?

Federal aid to schools in this nation is neither necessary nor desirable. Yet, federal aid, which is a strong step toward socialization, has received strong support in educational circles. I feel grateful that Congress, so far, has passed none of the several bills that have been submitted. Every informed citizen should keep alert to the danger of federal aid to education.

Associate Justice Has Visited 89 Counties: Stays on The Job

For a "weekend campaigner", Associate Justice James P. Hart, of the Texas Supreme Court has been covering a lot of ground the last three months.

Running for his first State Office and his first elective term on the Supreme Court, Judge Hart has campaigned in more than 85 counties and made speeches in some 25 Texas cities.

Meanwhile he has attended every formal session of the Supreme Court, when arguments are heard and decisions handed down, since his appointment to the bench last October.

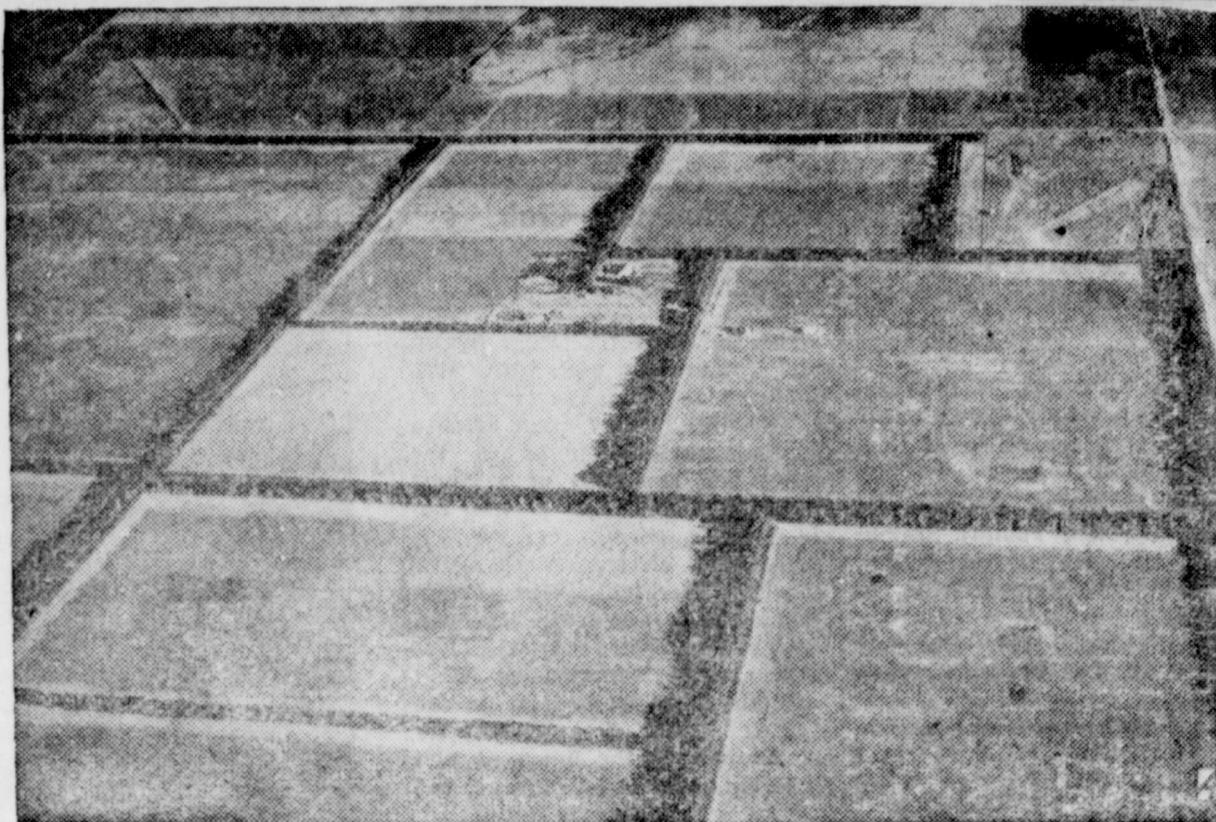

Dear Friends:

The largest peace-time appropriation in our nation's history passed the House this week with practically no opposition. The Army and Air Force Bill, providing \$6,500,000,000 was passed by a vote of 348 to 2. The two 'No' votes were those of the two American-Labor Party Congressmen, Isacson and Marcantonio. The Navy Bill, involving \$3,200,000,000 was passed without a roll call. I, of course, voted for both bills. I believe that we have no right to be so weak as to invite attack. We cannot buy security but if we refuse to make preparations some where in line with Russia's, we would certainly invite disaster. General Bradley has stated that the Russians are supposed to have an armed force of 4,000,000 men and 14,000 planes. The Secretary of the Navy has disclosed that Russia probably now has five times as many submarines as Germany had at the beginning of the war. It seems perfectly clear that Russia has no use for such forces if her intentions are peaceful. Apparently the only way to deter Russia from using her force is to convince her that she cannot win

any more cheap conquests. As this is being written the House is considering an appropriation bill to implement the European aid program. The bill cuts the amount of aid provided by about 25 percent. It does this in the main by extending the time during which the appropriation shall be spent. If it is passed as the Republican controlled Committee has presented it, it will brand the United States as untrustworthy, and will undoubtedly greatly injure our prestige throughout the world. I have been very critical of the vacillation of our State Department. I have felt that we weakened our country by our lack of any consistent foreign policy. I now feel that should this bill pass, the Legislative Branch will be just as guilty of lack of consistency. The action of the House will probably be taken too late tonight to report in this letter, which must be in the mail by seven o'clock, but I expect to vote to carry out our commitments in full. I believe that it is just as important that my country make good on its promises as it is that I as an individual do so. After obligations are incurred, I think it is too late to

discuss the question of whether or not they should have been incurred. Yet, Mr. Tabor, the Republican Chairman of the Appropriations Committee, says we should not have promised to extend so much aid. I disagree with his conclusion. It is perfectly clear that our program has just begun to pay dividends in the way of greatly increased European production, and stronger democratic governments in Western Europe. This is what we want, but we will get recovery only in proportion to what we put into it.

Early today we had a typical example of "end of the Session" tactics. The Senate had added substantially to the sums provided by the House for Soil Conservation payments, school lunches, and for REA administrative purposes. The Republican Leadership does not want these increases to stand, but they do not want to be on record as voting against them. They, therefore, brought in a rule which made it impossible for us to have a vote on the question of accepting the Senate amendments. By a straight Party vote, they sent the Agriculture Appropriation Bill to a "Conference Committee", where they expect to kill these items without letting the public find out who opposed them. I can only hope they fail both in their attempt to confuse the public and to control the Conference Committee.

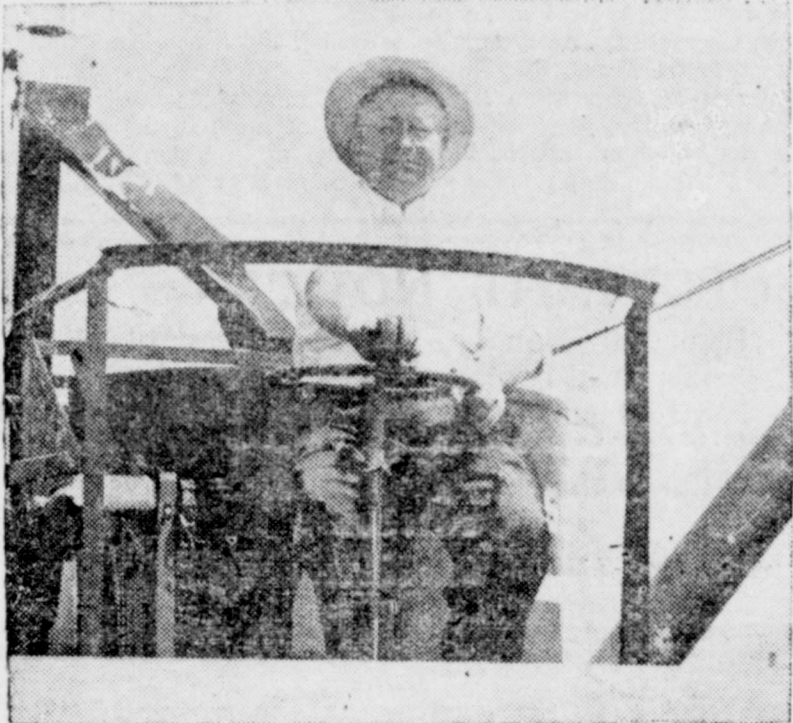

She was married to J. F. Kitchens, and was a member of the Methodist church.

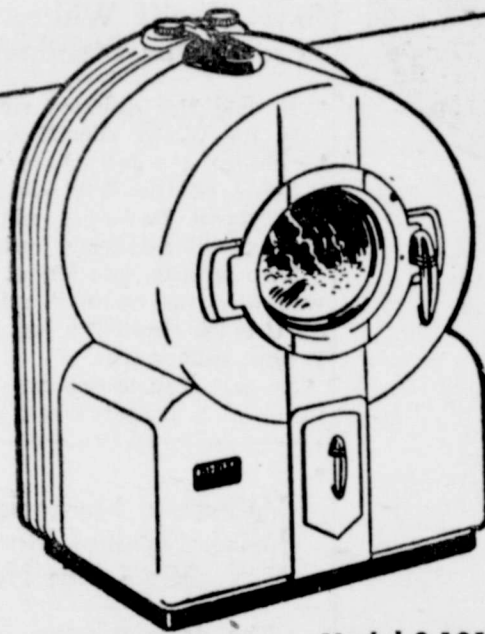

east on U S 84, and a lady from Hamilton, Mrs O. B. A. Rickoy, and the driver was Robert A. Emmett, also from Hamilton.

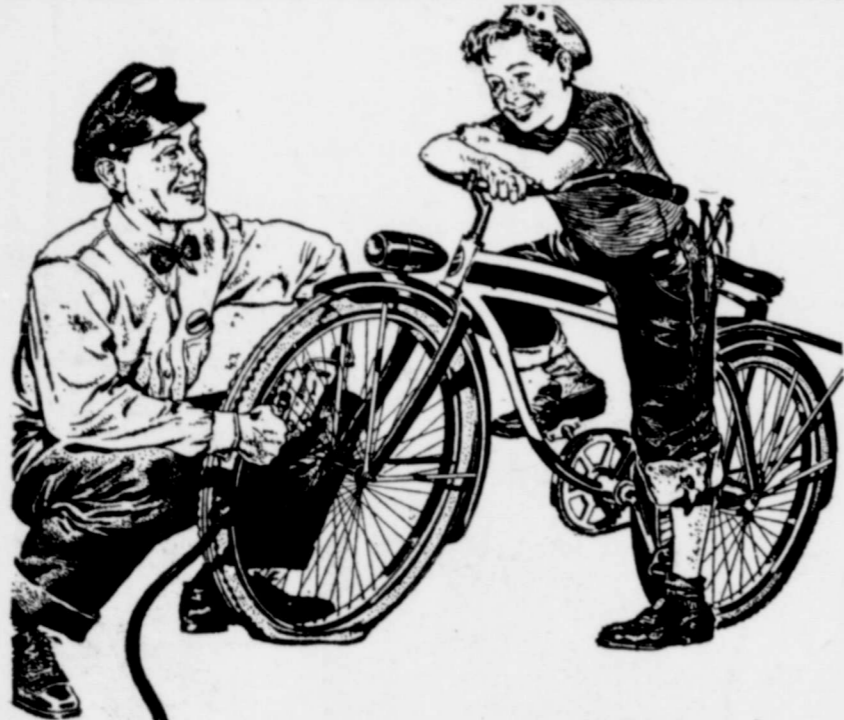
