"I have met some real nice boys here. At first, I didn't know anyone and got lonesome, but now I have lots of friends and am doing fine.

"I didn't get governor or lt. governor, but I did ge on the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission, and I think I will get two more positions.

"I will be home Saturday. They

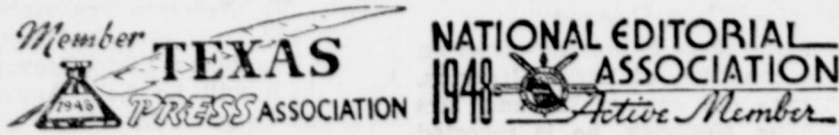

## Text of Grand Jury Report Of Monday: 17 True Bills Returned

"To the Hon. R. B. Cross, District Judge:  
"We, the Grand Jurors for the June, 1948 term of District Court of Coryell County report as follows:  
"We have been in session six days and have examined 71 witnesses. We have returned 17 True

Bills of Indictment, two of which are misdemeanors.

"Much of our time has been spent in investigating theft of cattle. We ask that stockmen firebrand wherever possible and that every citizen cooperate fully with the authorities on these offenses, as it takes everybody working together to properly enforce any law. We have also had occasion to work on drunk driving and related offenses. The prompt enforcement of this law will prevent tragedies which have occurred within our county in the past.

"A number of citizens have suffered loss from worthless checks. We ask that the public require positive identification before cashing checks for strangers, as this is the confidence type of crook who has a salestalk to persuade his victim that the check is good.  
"Although we fully recognize the right of stockmen to protect their stock from marauding dogs, we ask that extreme care be exercised in placing of poison. It is a serious violation to place poison where it can be taken by human or other animals than dogs, and it should not be distributed in public places or on premises other than that of the owner.

"We wish to thank our officials and the bailiffs as well as citizens who appeared as witnesses for their assistance. We further thank Your Honor for the charge to this jury. We have inspected the jail and find it well kept and in good condition. Having completed our labors, we ask that we be recessed subject to call.

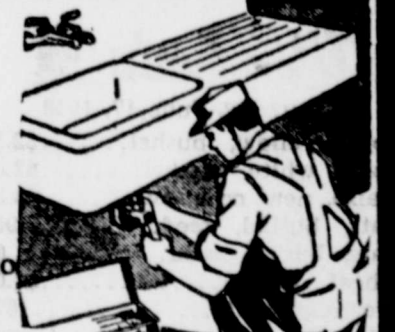
