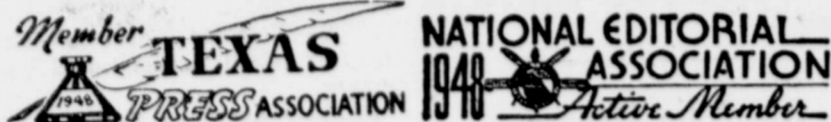

Dear Friends:

At this Stage of the Session of Congress one can predict just what will happen. There is always confusion and uncertainty just before adjournment, but it is worse this year than I have ever seen. The Republican leadership seems to have no idea as to what they want to accomplish, and therefore they are accomplishing very little of anything. In the State Legislature it is customary to fix a date sine die adjournment some weeks in advance. Of course, this fixed date is used by the large "interests" to kill legislation by delay. In Austin these "interests" generally want to kill legislation. In Washington they, and other special groups, generally want to pass legislation. Yesterday the Railroads were able to pass the Bulwinkle Bill over the President's veto, exempting the carriers from the provisions of the Anti-Trust Acts, as regards rate making.

This morning the House finally passed a draft bill. No one knows what this bill will look like when it is finally re-written by the Conference Committee. The House put many amendments on the bill. I voted for the amendment to reduce the term of service from 2 to 1 year, because I think it is better to take 200,000 boys each year and keep them only one year each than to take only 100,000 and make them serve twice as long. I also voted for the amendment to let the Army enlist 100,000 foreigners. These men would very largely be anti-Communist former Polish soldiers who served with us during the War, and who can't now go home. They are well trained veterans. They are good

soldiers. We must see that they are supported. They say they want the army job; and they could take the place of American boys who don't want the job. As I see it, this would help everybody and hurt no one.

I also offered an amendment myself, which would have required the Army to make up its mind within two years whether it wanted a boy or not. As the bill stands, it keeps the boys subject to call for seven years, during which time they could not have any security in the founding of a home, a business, or profession, or in taking a job. I think that if the Army doesn't take a boy between 19 and 21 he should be allowed to join the National Guard and be exempt from further service. This would be of real help to the boys, and it would strengthen the National Guard, which I think is just as important as any other part of our defense organization. My amendment was defeated.

I voted against the amendment to postpone the effective date of the bill till next year. If I did not think we needed this draft I would not vote for it at all. I think we need a larger Army now. I therefore voted for the bill.

Last night the Senate passed a new farm bill. It lowers all support prices. The House had previously passed a bill extending support prices approximately at present levels. This now goes to a Conference Committee I can only hope that the higher support prices will be retained as I am sure that sooner or later our farmers will need them.

Within the past few minutes the House has passed a so-called Housing Bill, which in my opinion is only intended for window dressing, and if effective will only relieve the tax burden of rich investors. As I see it, there are 3 elements in getting housing—material, labor and capital. No legislation is going to increase the supply of either material or labor. Legislation can provide credit to make available needed capital. The House has months ago sent a bill to the Senate for the extension of "Title Six", providing providing new F H A assistance. If the Senate will pass this legislation it will do all the present House Bill will, except that it will not create an unfair tax exemption. I, therefore, felt no good could come from voting for this bill.

It is always dangerous to predict as to the action of Congress, but it now seems clear that the Senate will refuse to act on either the Mundt-Uixon Communist Bill, or on the repeal of the Margarine tax. I am sorry these measures are being allowed to die. I think that it is probable and that the pay of Postal and other Federal workers will be increased before adjournment. As I see it, the present cost of living requires this, and I expect to support the Bill.

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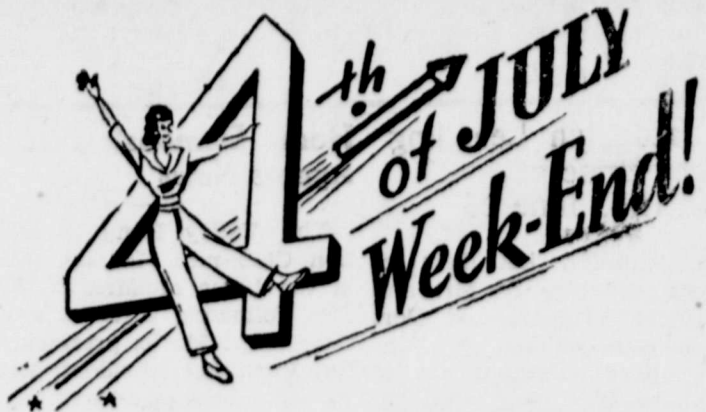

### Canning

3. Follow manufacturer's directions carefully in operating canner.
4. Know how each part of the canner works.
5. Wash canner thoroughly before storing it.
6. Do not use harsh scouring powder.
7. Keep openings to pet cock, pressure gauge, and safety valve clean.
8. Never immerse lid in water.
9. Leave room on all sides of jars or tin cans to permit free circulation of steam.
10. Never add cold water to a hot canner. Guard against sudden cooling that might cause it to warp.
11. Never pry cover loose. If it sticks, put canner back on range and heat a few minutes.
12. Be careful not to chip or nick sealing edges.
13. When using glass ars, never open pet cock until pressure gauge has reached zero.
14. Always release steam pressure slowly.
15. Store kettle stuffed with newspapers to absorb moisture and odors, and invert lid wrapped in paper on top of kettle.

### Careful Now!

Never release steam suddenly. Never remove lid until you have released steam.

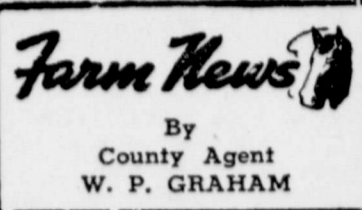
### ARNETT LADIES CLUB MEETS WITH MRS. CAMPBELL

The rain crop turned out better than was expected. Wheat yield in Central Texas was the best in several years.

### Corn and Grain Sorghums

As usual the much needed rain did not fall last week. Corn has suffered. A good rain will still help the yield. Grain sorghums need rain but corn will stand lack of moisture for some time.

### Cotton Damaged by Insects

Early cotton has received a big set back by lice and flea hoppers, and on many farms grasshoppers. Sure enough there are thousands of grasshoppers, and they will invade crops if don't have rain to green up the grass. Farmers are about to give up the fight against them. They are flying now and bait on the ground attracts very few. Spraying with Chlordane will give good control if enough is used. While grasshoppers were tiny one pound of technical Chlordane as a dust or spray gave a good kill. Now that hoppers are larger one and one-half pounds will be needed. Keep the rate constant regardless of water used. With one type of sprayer it may be 10 gallons per acre, and with another sprayer is might be 50 gallons but always use one and one-half pounds. One and one half ints of a 74% Chlordane furnishes the poundage.

### KITCHEN MEMO BY JEAN CLARKE

Oven-baked desserts can be cooked along with the roast to save time and fuel. *Banana-Coffee Souffle*, one of these, is nourishing and flavorful. Melt 2 *tblsp. butter* in a saucepan. Remove from heat and stir in 3 *tblsp. flour*. Gradually add 1/4 *cup strong coffee*, 1/4 *cup milk* and cook over low simmer flame stirring constantly until nicely smooth and thick. Combine 1/4 *cup sugar*, 4 *egg yolks*, gradually stirring these into cooked mixture. Add 3 *mashea medium-sized bananas*. Beat 4 *egg whites* until stiff but not dry. Fold into banana mixture. Pour into 1 1/2 *qt. souffle dish* which has been buttered on bottom only. Bake in slow gas oven (325°) 40 to 45 mins. Serves 6.

The most reliable buyer's guide to gas appliances for the home is the Seal of Approval of the American Gas Association Testing Laboratories. For example, nearly 600 tests and requirements must be met on a gas range before it can be produced and sold to the homemaker.

If your biscuits burn on the bottom and still remain rather pale on top, your baking sheet may be too large which tends to hold the heat from the burner to the bottom instead of radiating around the oven evenly. There should be at least one inch of space between the baking sheets and all four sides of the oven.

Hot butter and syrup makes a richer-tasting spread for waffles. Add 2 *tblsp. butter* to 1 *cup extra-sweet corn syrup*, heat until butter is melted, then serve hot.

As soon as baked potatoes are cooked, cut them criss-cross on the top to keep them fluffy. Add butter and serve at once.

**This Week in History**

June 20 to June 26

The first explorer whose landing on the mainland of North America had lasting consequences was John Cabot who touched the coast of Labrador on June 24, 1497. Previously, the Norse vikings had established North American colonies, but they were relatively unimportant. Cabot, an Italian, had been commissioned by King Henry VII of England, who wished to have a share in the New World discovered by the Spanish and Portuguese, to find a northwest passage to Asia which did not conflict with the claims of Spain and Portugal. On his voyages along the Atlantic Coast from Nova Scotia to the Carolinas, the British based their claim to North America—a claim that later was responsible for the formation of British colonies and, ultimately, the United States.

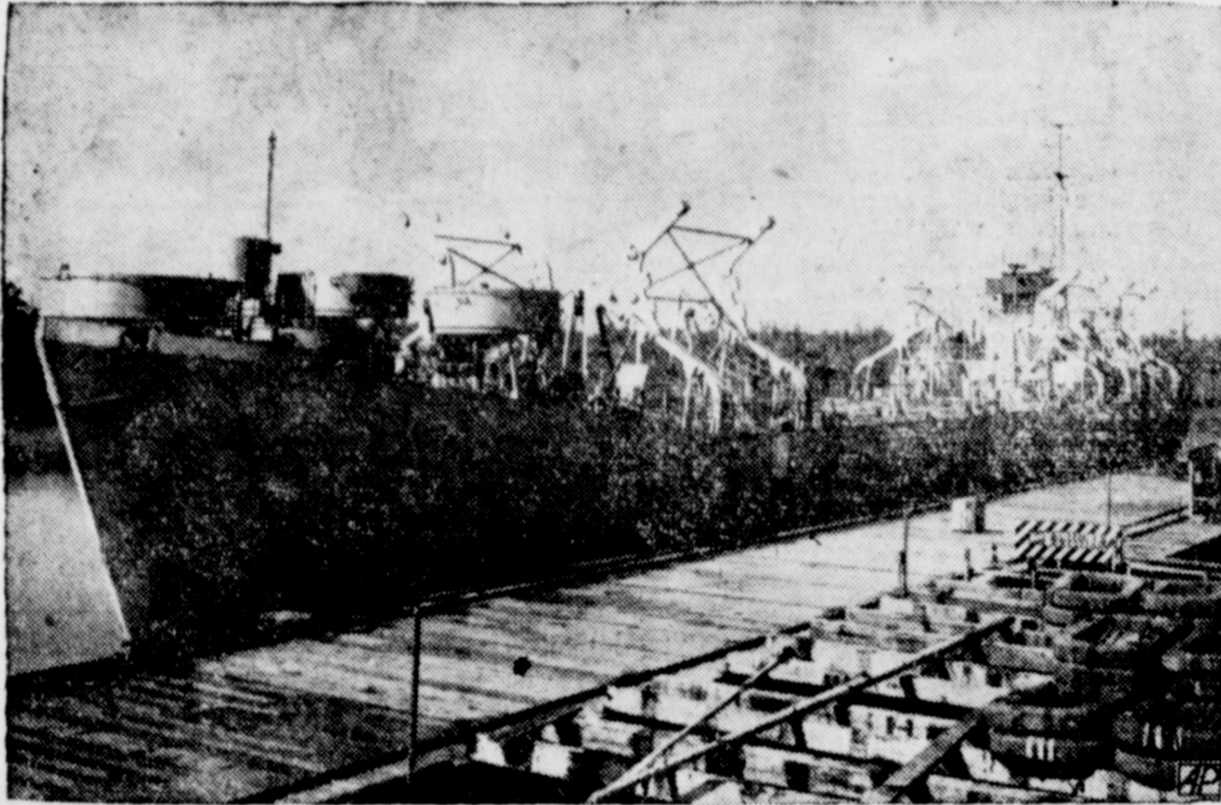

LST's (Landing Ship Tank), as the one above, a type of ship that landed American armor on many war-time beachheads, are now being converted by several large oil

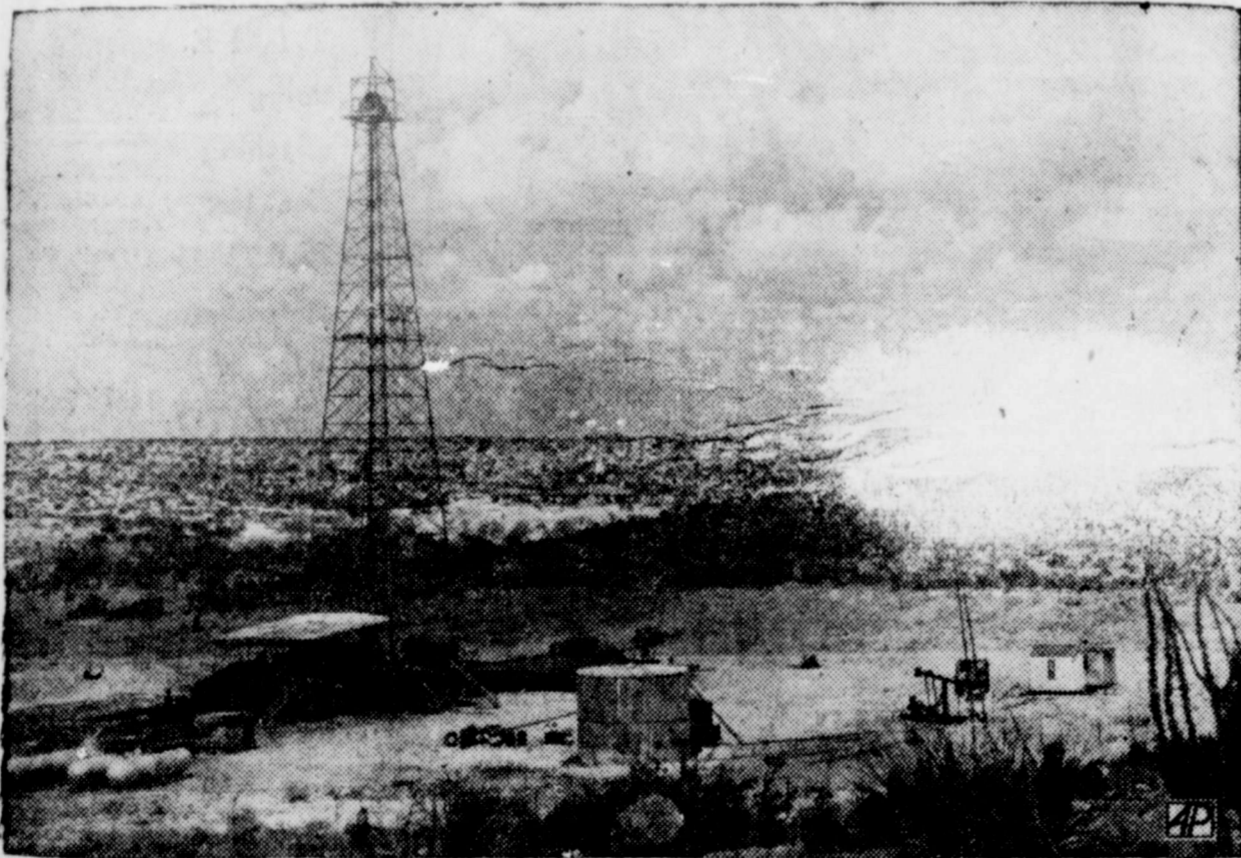

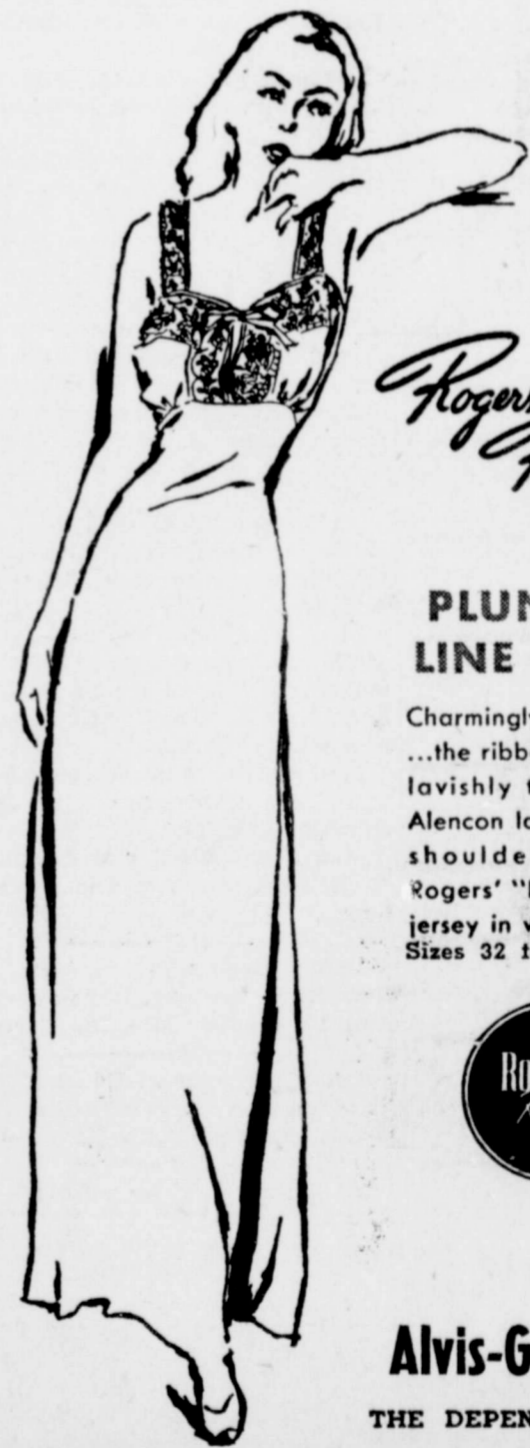
