Massingill was a son of Mr. and Mrs. J. I. Massingill of Pottsville.

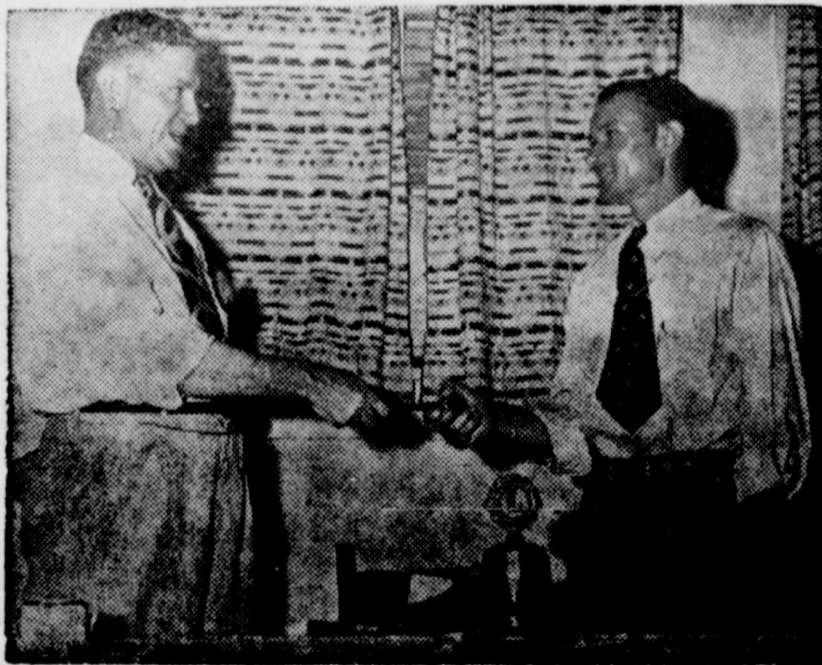

#### McDonald, Stanford, Massingill, Tubbs, Due "Home" Shortly

Four more boys are coming home to this territory, or community. They are: Captain Norman E. (Bob) McDonald, Rt. 2, Gatesville; T/5 James P. Tubbs, Coryell City; Sgt. Vernon A. Stanford, Evant Star Rt., Evant; Pvt. Willis D. Massingill, Rt. 1, Hamilton.

The remains of these men are among the 5,734 Americans who will arrive soon at the New York



Port of Embarkation, on the U. S. Army Transport, Lawrence Victory. Of this number, 260 are Texans. All originally were interred in temporary military cemeteries in France, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom.

Captain McDonald, pictured here, is a son of Mrs. Jacob C. McDonald of Rt 2, and was killed by a Robot bomb in England. He was graduated from Jonesboro high school in '38 and attended JTAC and received his wings as a pursuit pilot at Mather Field, California, and had been in the states 18 months before going overseas. Overseas he was with an VIII Air Force Fighter Station in England, and an Oak Leaf Cluster had been added to his Air Medal "for exceptionally meritorious service in aerial flight over enemy occupied Continental Europe". He was a member of the well-known Mustang group which destroyed over 500 enemy aircraft. He trained at Abilene and Moffet Field, California.

T/5 James P. Tubbs was in the U. S. Army, and is a son of Joseph A. Tubbs of Coryell City. We have none of his army record.

Pvt. Willis D. Massingill, also was in the Army, and his nearest of kin is listed as Roy G. Massingill, Rt. 1, Hamilton, and probably has relatives in Evant.

Sgt. Vernon A. Stanford, was in the USAF, and his nearest of kin is listed as Jack Stanford, of Evant Star Rte., Evant.

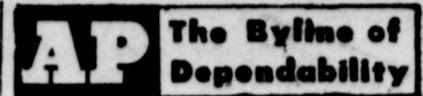

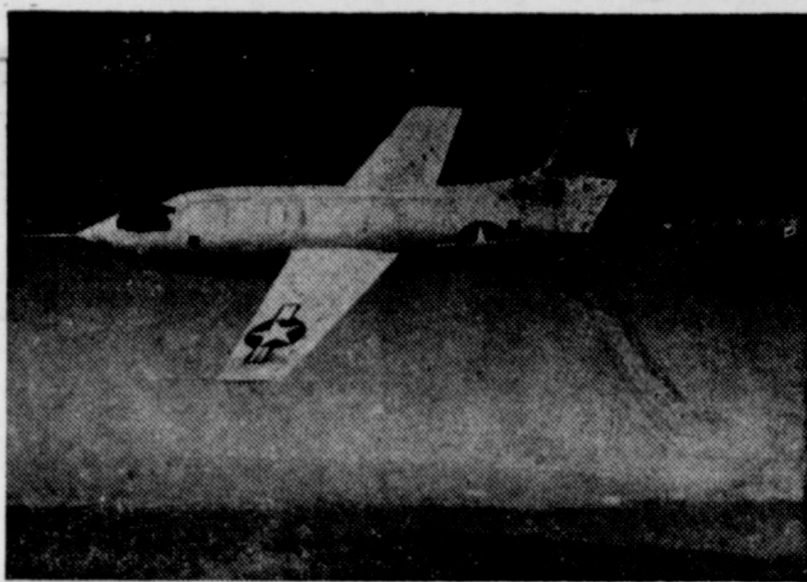

**U. S. WINNING ATHENS BATTLE BY FRANKNESS**

ATHENS, Greece. — By laying their cards face up on the table and saying exactly what they want and why they want it Americans finally are winning the battle of Athens. Greece is going to have a government fairly representative of all political parties, Communists excepted. And the Greek

themselves, not the Americans, are selecting the government heads and will be responsible for administration of government affairs.

It took some firm statements and tough words on the part of Loy Henderson, American State Department observer in Athens; Dwight Griswold, head of the American Mission in Greece, and Lincoln McVeagh, United States ambassador, to convince Greece politicians that the United States would not select a premier or set up a temporary dictator.

Business and financial interests in Greece for days have been urging the Americans to name a dictator for Greece until its acute troubles could be ironed out. This they resolutely refused to do. But they did do what they should have done two weeks ago. They bluntly told Greek political leaders to organize without further delay a government representative of a majority of the people and get down to the hard work of repulsing the guerrillas.

The Greeks were told that the United States would not hold up the unloading of all shipments, except food, and generally "sit tight" until a stable government was formed. The politicians decided the Americans were not bluffing. The net result of this frank talk in tough words is that Greece will have a government through which we can implement our aid to Greece.

During the last two days I have talked at length with Henderson, Griswold and MacVeagh. Each of them has been leaning over backward to avoid any statement or act that could be construed as dictatorial pressure on Greece. Their policy has been the exact opposite of the bluff and bully tactics of the Russians, whose pet technique is to set up an alleged "people's leader" as dictator who takes orders from the Kremlin. This was their strategy in Yugoslavia, Rumania and Bulgaria.

Politicians of the Balkan and Near East countries have been conditioned for so many many years to taking orders from foreign powers that the Greeks naturally expected the Americans to set up a government and then be responsible for its conduct. When we refused to do this they began to quarrel among themselves over who should run the show and, as they also hoped, who should spend the money.

They forgot that a guerrilla army was knocking at their door. It took harsh words and fine team play on the part of Henderson, Griswold and MacVeagh to bring them to their senses.

Incidentally, the reports broadcast and published in America that Griswold would resign because of a rift between him and MacVeagh are completely without foundation. There has been some overlapping of authority and responsibility, but no tension or "incidents" have developed. The rumor was started by a Communist newspaper here, picked up and broadcast as "authoritative" in America and sent back here as a "confirmed report". That is a typical example of the ever-busy Russian propaganda machine which strives to stir up dissension, misunderstanding and confusion in American public opinion. And we are doing so very, very little to combat it, either here or at home.

most above everything else right now is an information service that will debunk the Soviet dictatorship as a 'progressive government,' a State Department official told me, "and expose the Stalin regime as the cruel, ruthless dictatorship it really is. It is a government dependent solely on slave labor. There is nothing free or fine about it. No government of any nation in our time has been so brutally reactionary. With all our faults the American system is Utopian liberalism compared to the liberalism of the Soviet dictatorship."

Whether the new Greek Government can or will move prompt enough to put down the guerrillas is still an unanswered question. With Tito's help the guerrillas could take Salonika in a few hours and could dominate northern Greece.

Evidently Russia doesn't want to gamble on a showdown right now else the Soviets would have taken advantage of the Greek crisis and urged Tito to move in while there was no effective resistance. Time, which was running against the Greeks last week, is now running in their favor. The Greeks are past masters of mountain artillery, mules and other equipment were stolen by the Bulgarians and Yugoslavs. But new equipment and thousands of mules are enroute to the Greek ports. Within a few weeks the Greek army will have all the equipment and supplies it needs.

The political battle of Athens has been won. Now it is up to the Greeks to get their army re-equipped and into the mountains where only a vigorous counter-offensive of guerrilla tactics will free Greece from the menace of the Russian inspired revolutionary bands that are terrorizing this harassed little nation.

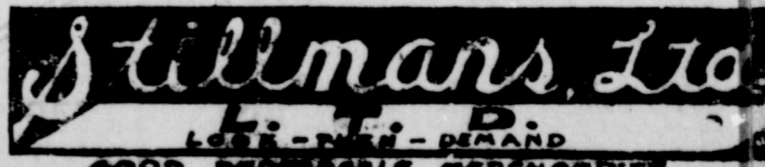

Dear Friends:  
 It is good to be home. The House adjourned last Sunday at about 7:00 a. m. after a twenty-one hour session. After a few hours of rest Mrs. Poage and I started to Texas. We drove into Waco just after noon Wednesday. Miss Heath had the office open here, and Mr. Sharp and Miss Graves will keep things open in Washington. We want our friends to feel free to call on us at either office, but generally it will speed things up if you will write direct to Washington.

I expect to try to spend each Monday in the Waco Office. I plan to be available on the second floor of the Post Office Building at Temple on each Wednesday. The other days of the week I expect to visit over the District without any schedule. I hope this arrangement will make it possible or anyone who has business with me to locate me with the least possible trouble. I think it will save some of my friends a long trip to Waco.  
 I have a number of engagements and will doubtless make more. I am now scheduled to speak at West on the afternoon of July 4,

and at Mart that night. I will speak in Belton on the night of July 5th and will attend the celebration in connection with the Marlin hospital on July 19 and the Membership meeting of the Belfalls Electric Cooperative at Rosebud on July 22. I am also scheduled to attend the Statewide Water Conference in Waco on July 8th and the Soil Conservation Rally at McKinney on July 1st. I also want to attend as many political rallies as possible. The people were kind to me, and I have no opponent, but I do want to get around and express my appreciation of this consideration. I think it is a fine compliment, and I am sincerely grateful to the people of our district.

The last week of the Session was at times hectic and in some cases those of us on the Democratic side felt that the majority was rather ruthless. For instance, most of the bills that were considered the last week were brought up "under suspension". That device makes it impossible for the opposition to have more than 20 minutes to criticize a bill, and even more important, it eliminates any amendments. The Republicans used these tactics more than I have ever seen them used. I think they were afraid to subject most of their major bills to the white light of free and open discussion and amendments, and yet they were afraid not to pass something on a number of subjects.

In spite of all its shortcomings, I think this 80th Congress did not wind up as either the worst or even the second worst Congress. Certainly in the field of world affairs this Congress established a very constructive record. In approving and implementing the plan of the Marshall Plan it provided generous aid for the economic recovery of all nations willing to undertake mutual self-help and to stand for free institutions. By the Vandenberg Resolution it in effect reaffirmed this Nation's willingness to assist any country threatened by unprovoked aggression.

By its support of the United Nations it has given new evidence of America's determination to work with all the Nations of the world in a mutual effort to prevent war, but recognizing that some people may misinterpret our efforts toward peace, this Congress has backed up our promises to help maintain freedom in the world by appropriating the money and providing for the drafting of men needed to modernize and strengthen our air, land and sea forces.

The Tonic Energy Commission and the Reciprocal Trade Agreements were extended for limited periods. I feel that in each instance the Republicans should have been willing to make extensions on a much broader basis, but all in all, I think that the record of this Congress on world affairs is very good.

The domestic program involved more partisan fights, and I feel is not so good. I cannot take the space to discuss the domestic program, but I should call attention to the passage of the Taft-Hartley Labor Management Act, the reduction of taxes, the increase of Federal salaries, and the limited extension of the farm support program.

Since it is not anticipated that Congress will be in session for sometime, this will be the last of these reports until the new session. In the meantime, I want to thank the publishers who have presented them to you and to convey my good wishes to every reader of this paper.

**New Light on Profit**  
 Some industrial leaders nowadays refer to that old joker item, "profit," in a new way. Annual reports of corporations are beginning to list profit more properly as that part of the sales dollar spent for "use of the tools." This is an understandable way to designate whatever money is paid to stockholders or kept in the business for reinvestment or expansion.

If American workers have good tools they turn out good products at reasonable prices. Without good tools the picture would be different. We do have good tools and good plants, better than any other nation. But these things did not come by accident. These tools have accumulated because all of us have been free to save and invest. We have put savings into tools of production. These things are our capital.

**Capital at Work**  
 A hundred years ago each workman had only \$500 invested for his use in the form of tools. Today more than 11 times this amount, or about \$6,000 worth of tools, is back of the average American workman in his productive efforts. In terms of purchasing power, our average workman's wages have increased about five fold, even though he works only half as many hours as he did then.

Tools, then are important to all of us. Where do they come from? The price of these better tools (sometimes they're expensive tools) has come from people able to save from their incomes a little surplus to invest. Most of these folks today are in the income bracket of \$5,000 or over. But through life insurance and bank savings, nearly everybody in America participates in these purchases of tools.

**Danger Signs**  
 Obviously, we have a high standard of living partly because of the labor-saving tools we have accumulated. That is fine. But we must not forget that it is possible for America to have such national policies that tool investments are not forthcoming. In fact, during 1930 to 1940 when our account in tools (capital) slipped downward 19.4 per cent, we found that our economy went backward rather than forward.

Looking at the record, we see that most of our tools were accumulated in the generation prior to 1929. From 1920 to 1930 new capital flowed to industry at the average rate of 6 billion dollars a year. But the years from 1933 to 1945 were dangerous years. During that period a yearly average of less than half a billion dollars went into tools for our workers to use.

**Tools or Taxes?**  
 What was the trouble? One trouble was that government had entered the picture and had begun to siphon funds away from the capital market. Tool money was turned into taxes. New tools became scarce. People were afraid to invest. Even after the government had spent its part of the savings taken in taxation, depression remained and millions were still unemployed. We needed money turned to tools and incentive, not to taxes.

Unsound taxation policies must not be allowed to get in the way of good tools and incentive investments. Today our corporations are retaining smaller profits that may be turned into tools. In 1946, though it was the best year on record, manufacturing establishments averaged only 5 cents profit (use of tools) out of the sales dollar. The corporation average was less than that. We must not forget the importance of tools. We need profit, for profit means tools.
