Murray Seeks Aid For Butane Users

Murray's appearance before the steel-use conference last week was in answer to an urgent invitation for Texas representation at the hearing sent to Gov. Jester by Sen. Kenneth Wherry, senate committee hairman.







Rise Stevens, famous "Carmen" of the Metropolitan Opera, says her career keeps her terribly busy, but she does not let it interfere with her duties as a mother and homemaker. She spends many hours n her kitchen making her favorite delight, Norwegian Ring Cookies, which she prepares like this:

Norwegian Ring Cookies



% cup of shortening 2 cups of sifted flour 1/2 cup of chopped almonds (makes 31/2 dozen rings)

6 tablespoons of sugar 1 teaspoonful of vanilla

Cut shortening into flour until mixture resembles coarse meal. Then stir in almonds. Beat eggs until light in separate bowl. Gradually beat in sugar and add vanilla. Stir in flour mixture a little at a time. Chill. Roll out batter. Cut in three fach strips. Join ends to make rings. Bake in ungreased cookie sheet in moderate oven-375 degrees. Bake 8 to 10 minutes.






