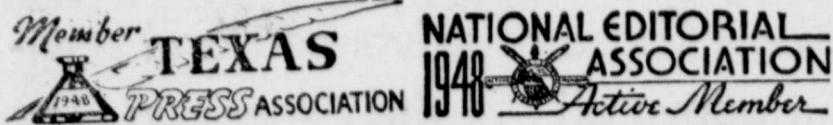

## Classification Important In Selling Cotton Says U. S. D. A.

The cotton branch of the United States Department of Agriculture,

Austin, reported that the first application for the free cotton classification and market news services received from Coryell county represented the farmers of the Frank B. Lam Gin Company, Oglesby, Texas.

Some of the benefits of the classing and market news services are to provide the farmer with the grade and staple length of each bale he produces; to aid him in selling his cotton on quality rather than on a hog-round basis; and to serve as a check on care used in picking and ginning, two important factors that determine the grade of cotton produced.

A green card certificate showing the grade and staple length is mailed to farmers for each bale classed. The classification, together with price information the farmer, shows him in black and white what his cotton should bring at the current market price. Agricultural leaders term cotton classing and the furnishing of timely market prices an important

Graham and submit their applications at an early date, as July 1 has been set as the goal date; however, applications received after that date and prior to August 1 will be considered for approval.

## What Is A Retail Merchant's Association? Something Good For You

A great many people look upon their local Retail Merchants' Association as an office where a 'BLACKLIST' is kept of those in the community who do not meet their obligations. Nothing could be farther from the actual facts. All records of the association are kept in full, both favorable and unfavorable accounts being recorded, together with all personal information available on each individual doing credit business in the community. Such information as name, marital status, dependents, estimated net worth, amount of salary or other income, character record, court records, and the manner in which accounts are paid. This information enables the credit manager or store owner to picture the person in his mind and come to an early decision on whether he desires to extend credit to the applicant on whom he may be making inquiry.

Any merchant doing business in this territory or anywhere else may obtain this information. Individuals furnishing a reasonable excuse for needing to know this information may also receive a credit report upon application to the association.

When you are shopping, look for the familiar placard showing that the merchant is a member of this organization, and insist he report your credit standing to the association, in order that your credit record may be what you wish it to be.

Other cities often call the local office for reports on local individuals shopping in their city. Keep your credit record in good order by paying all bills as they become due.

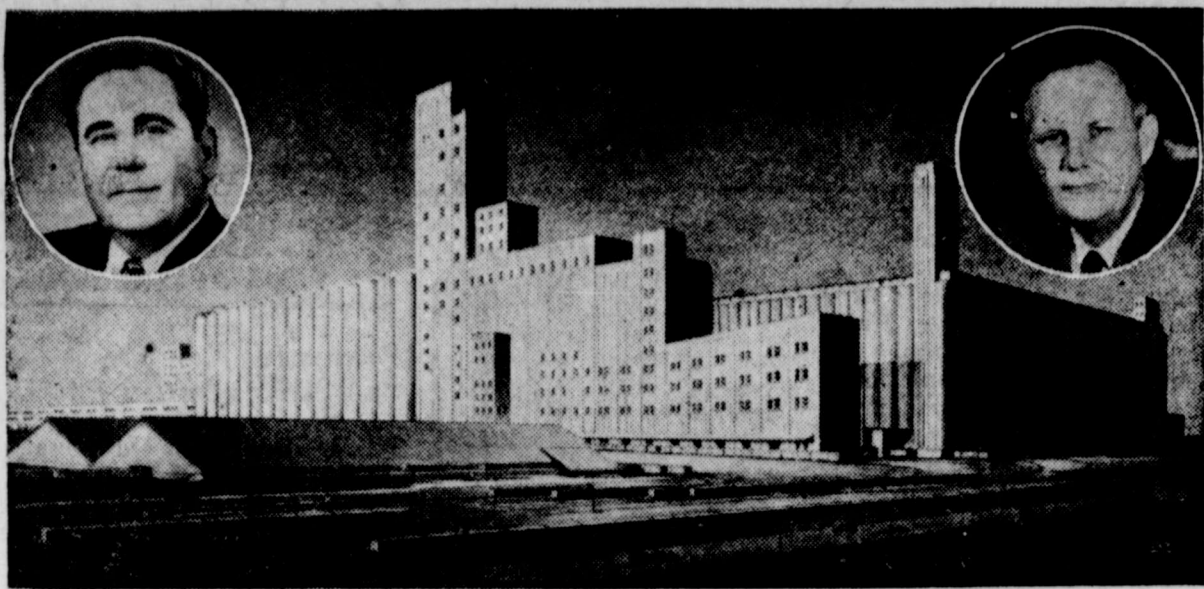

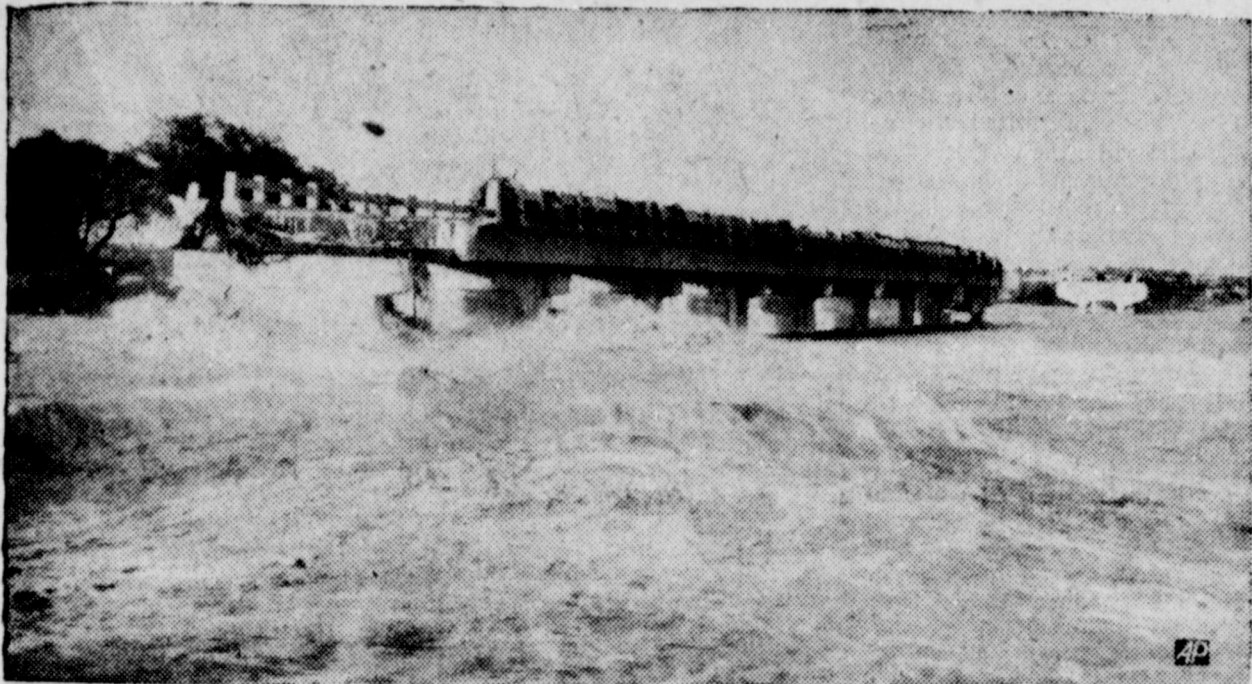

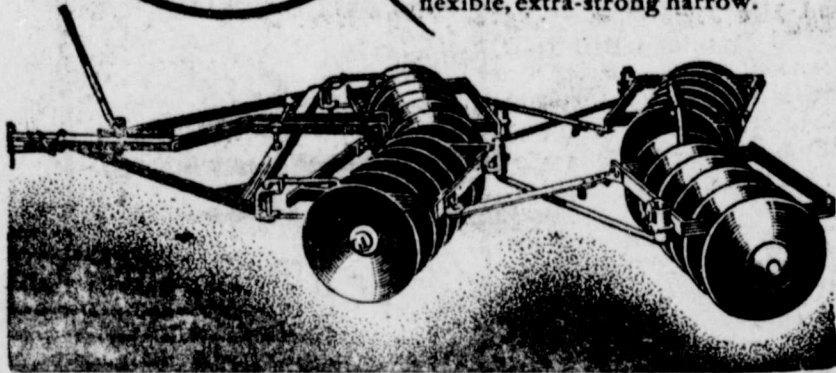

Stir in flour mixture a little at a time. Chill. Roll out batter. Cut in three inch strips. Join ends to make rings. Bake in ungreased cookie sheet in moderate oven—375 degrees. Bake 8 to 10 minutes.
