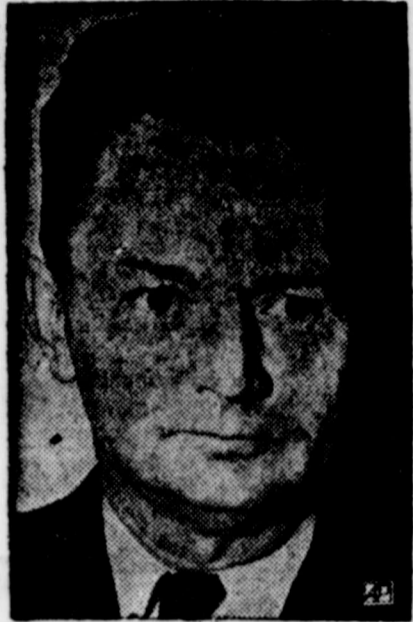

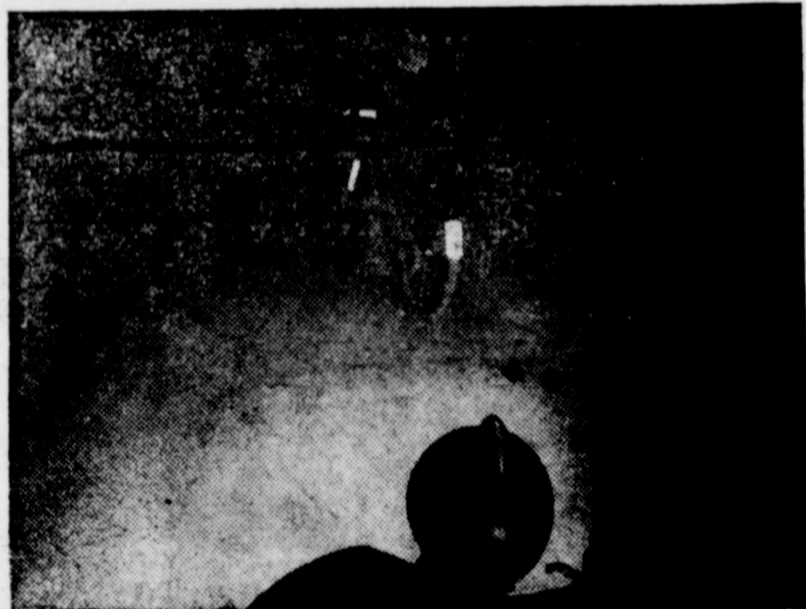

MADRID.—During the civil war the Russian ambassador to Spain was in direct charge of the Republican forces. They took orders from him and his orders came from Moscow. Then when the Communists came to power Spain had the fourth largest gold reserve in the world.

The Communists used it in fighting the civil war and, when they realized they were being defeated by Franco, they stole what was left and sent it to Moscow and Mexico City. The Communist government-in exile operated from Mexico on this stolen Spanish gold until recently, when the Mexican government decided to "freeze" it pending further consideration.

By the time Franco had consolidated his victory and established order, World War II broke out. The Russians had been his bitter enemies. Hitler and Mussolini had sent him arms and food. It was natural that he should side with the Axis, but Franco, whatever else may be said of him, is a patriotic Spaniard.

He knows only two allegiances—his church and his country. He was denounced as a silent Axis partner in all Allied countries. There is no doubt where his sympathies were, but his loyalty was to Spain. The facts prove that he deliberately double-crossed Hitler into believing that he would help the Axis if need be and kept the Allies out of Spain by promising to keep the Nazis out, too.

He played both sides against the middle and maintained about as much neutrality as a nation torn by civil war could achieve. "Switzerland and Sweden maintained their neutrality, why not give Spain the same privilege?" is a question frequently asked by Spanish people.

Today, Franco has absolute power over Spain. There is order. Law is by decree. The people are tired unto exhaustion by civil war. Practically every family in Spain lost one or more members during the bloody years. They want no more of it. Especially they want no more of the "red" Communists.

Even the workers in labor unions who supported the Communists so enthusiastically at first are disillusioned about the "great benefits of soviet friendship." The Spanish people had a full test of Soviet friendship, and Soviet domination and they found it worse than anything that has happened in Spain since the days of

the Inquisition. Under Franco there is no freedom of speech, or press, or of assembly without censorship.

His captains and generals are mostly a corrupt lot who are getting rich in black market "concessions". Franco overlooks these "operations" as part of the price of loyalty and reward. Personally Franco is honest. His private life is above reproach. He is no playboy. He has no mistress. He is devoted to his wife and daughter and to the Catholic church. During the last two years he has instituted many reforms beneficial to the working people. His social security program is one of the fairest in all Europe. He has worked out a land reform and agricultural program that have been highly praised by officials of the American Farm Bureau. He is rebuilding University City, so badly damaged by the war. Education is being encouraged. Agriculture and mining are being modernized. The libraries are being restocked with books. Practically every library in Madrid was stripped of books which were used by both sides as lining for the trenches during the war. Franco is a dictatorial despot, but his country is at peace and its people are at work.

During my stay in Madrid I have talked with people of all classes. Their opinions on Spain's problems and needs vary in sharp degree. But on the question of Franco there is general agreement that he is the best possible answer to Spain's immediate situation. They are afraid to think about what would happen if he should resign, die or be assassinated. Even a liberal socialist leader expressed hope that Franco would live for ten years.

"But what would happen if Franco drops out of the picture?" I asked every person with whom I talked. Invariably their answers were to this effect: "Franco won't quit. He will retain power until he dies. That's probably best. But if he should resign or die the captains general would set up a military dictatorship and most likely that would call back the King as the least objectionable solution. The majority of people don't want a monarchy again. But they are in mortal fear of any further attempts at republican government, so they would accept the King as the best plan to continue peace within Spain. Maybe the King could do it. We don't know. We hope Franco doesn't die now."

"The Spanish people cannot understand why they are being punished by world public opinion," the editor of one of Spain's largest newspaper's said to me, "I don't like Franco's dictatorship any more than I like Tito's," he continued, "but somehow in the United Nations it seems to be regarded as a crime that Franco saved Spain and possibly Europe from Soviet dictatorship."

"How can you Americans denounce Franco of Spain and Salazar or Portugal and then vote to take Tito of Yugoslavia into the United Nations while voting to keep us out? There is nothing in

Spain or Portugal today half so vicious as Tito's boldly regime. How can you help Turkey with its dictatorship and refuse to help Spain, which stopped the Reds in their first attempt to seize Europe? We belong in the Western World. We belong in the United Nations.

"We need help from America to get our railroads and highways and fertilizer plants rebuilt. They were practically demolished during the civil war. What crimes have we committed against the peace of the world? What threat are we to world security? The bloody Russians always are poking the finger of scorn at us, but we alone have defeated them up to now. All we want is a chance to rebuild our country so there will be more food and more work and more security for the people.

"The Russians want to keep us down because in poverty and turmoil and distress they get in their evil work. If you helped Greece and Turkey, why not help us? We stand in the way of Russian penetration to Gibraltar. We have tried Soviet Communism and found it to be a bloody mess. Spain is the world's best example of what happens to a country under Soviet domination. Give us a chance to rebuild our economy so the Reds never will have another chance to come back here."

S. J. R. No. 2
A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for a Board for apportioning the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment; providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation by the Governor; and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows: "Section 28. The Legislature shall, at its first regular session after the publication of each United States decennial census,

apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, agreeable to the provisions of Sections 25, 26, and 26-a of this Article. In the event the Legislature shall at any such first regular session following the publication of a United States decennial census, fail to make such apportionment, same shall be done by the Legislative Redistricting Board of Texas, which is hereby created, and shall be composed of five (5) members, as follows: The Lieutenant Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum. Said Board shall assemble in the City of Austin within ninety (90) days after the final adjournment of such regular session. The Board shall, within sixty (60) days after assembling, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, or into senatorial or

representative districts, as the failure of action of such Legislature may make necessary. Such apportionment shall be in writing and signed by three (3) or more of the members of the Board duly acknowledged as the act and deed of such Board, and, when so executed and filed with the Secretary of State, shall have force and effect of law. Such apportionment shall become effective at the next succeeding statewide general election. The Supreme Court of Texas shall have jurisdiction to compel such Commission to perform its duties in accordance with the provisions of this section by writ of mandamus or other extraordinary writs conformable to the usages of law. The Legislature shall provide necessary funds for clerical and technical aid and for other expenses incidental to the work of the Board, and the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to receive per diem and travel expense during the Board's session in the same manner and amount as they would receive while attending a special session of the Legislature. This amendment shall become effective January 1, 1951."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the amendment to Section 28, Article III of the Constitution

of Texas providing for a Board for apportionment of the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment.

"Against the amendment to Section 28, Article III of the Constitution of Texas providing for a Board for apportionment of the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment."

Each voter at such election shall mark out one of such clauses on the ballot, leaving the clause expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of this state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article IV, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section to be known as Section 3a, so as to provide for succession to the office of Governor in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, or fails to qualify, before taking his oath of office as Governor; and providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended, by adding another Section to follow Section 3, and be designated Section 3a, to read as follows:

"Section 3a. If, at the time the Legislature shall canvass the election returns for the offices of Governor and Lieutenant Governor, the person receiving the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, has died, then the person having the highest number of votes for the office of Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until after the next general election. It is further provided that in the event the person with the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, shall become disabled, or fail to qualify, then the Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until a person has qualified for the office of Governor, or until after the next general election. Any succession to the Governorship not otherwise provided for in this Constitution, may be provided for by law; provided, however, that any person succeeding to the office of Governor shall be qualified as otherwise provided in this Constitution, and shall, during the entire term to which he may succeed, be under all restrictions and inhibitions imposed in this Constitution on the Governor."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the date provided by law in the month of November, A. D. 1948, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for gubernatorial succession in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, before qualifying and for such succession in other contingencies."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for gubernatorial succession in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, before qualifying and for such succession in other contingencies."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another Section to be designated as "Section 60" to authorize counties of this State to provide insurance for county employees; providing for the Governor's proclamation, and submission to the electorate.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the State Constitution be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another Section following Section 59, to be designated "Section 60" to read as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all county employees as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties of this State and for the payment of the costs, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees" and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees." Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

We believe that if every eligible voter in Texas had been interviewed, the results would not have varied more than 4 percentage points, plus or minus, from the results presented above.

Every two years, The Texas Poll undertakes to test the accuracy of its system by making a forecast in one or more primary election contests. These forecasts are based on surveys conducted immediately preceding the election. In ten such predictions, The Texas Poll has missed the winner on the average by less than 3.5 percentage points. Its misses have ranged from a high of 6.9 points to a low of 0.3.

The Texas Poll will make forecasts this year in two election contests: the race for U. S. Senator and the race for Governor. Its predictions will be published in this newspaper on the day before the election.



TEEN TALK:

Beach parties are in full swing and young people everywhere cart a basket of goodies to a lake or beach, sit around a glowing fire, sing and play games.

With the advent of frozen foods, fare for these parties has changed considerably within the last few years. You don't have to depend on hot dogs and hamburgers (always succulent in a pinch, however) when you can get frozen chicken a la king, beans and French fried potatoes which can be heated in pans on a grate over an open fire.

Spanish rice can be made at home and reheated at the picnic scene by adding another can of tomatoes. Some people bring chickens which they broil on a spit. (easy to make by setting up two forkshaped sticks, and using a metal skewer with a handle to turn the chicken). If beach parties are frequent, inexpensive contraptions of this sort can be found at local departments and hardware stores.

A delicious variation of iced tea can be made by mixing orange juice and lemon or lime and adding to the tea. It can be kept cold in thermos jugs.

Bring a portable radio or phonograph and get the crowd to sing. If a porch party is in order, a buffet usually is the best bet with cold cuts hot dogs and macaroni salad a mainstay. The salad can be cooked, cooled and the mayonnaise, green pepper and celery added long before the crowd arrives. You can make buckets of it for pittance.

A teen-ager who really wants to be a hit with her crowd can entertain her friends with her own improvised soda fountain. Before the crowd arrives she can whip up the trimmings for the sodas and sundaes. syrup can be made out of chocolate, vanilla or strawberry instant frosting. Just add hot tap water and stir to achieve creamy smooth fudge or fresh strawberry sauce which can be used as a topping for the ice cream or base for sodas.

Chopped fruit or jelly can be added to vanilla instant frosting to make a dozen delicious soda fountain specials. A bowl of chopped nuts and cherries can be set on your "soda fountain" and added to your home-made concoctions to give a professional look to the treats.

Fashion-conscious damsels have set themselves on the gold standard. The shiny gold bug has gone to the feet, waist and over the arm with shoes, belts and bags being made of glowing gold kid. It is a peculiar fad and no matter how you slice it, too much old worn in the daytime looks silly. A bit of gold can compliment a bright, white dress, perhaps like nothing else can—but when you see young people laden down with gold which only yesterday was part of mother's formal attire, they look as if they are dressed up for Hallowe'en.

School Funds Swelled \$50,000,000 This Year By Public Land Sales

Bascom Giles, Commissioner of the General Land Office, said today that the proceeds from the July School Land Sale helped swell the permanent education funds to \$50,000,000.00 for the fiscal year.

This tremendous flood of money into these funds exceeds by five times the largest amount heretofore received for a similar period of operation by any former commissioner, Giles said.

Coke Stevenson Has Talked Personally With 250,000 Texans

Coke Stevenson this week is ending his first primary campaign for the United States Senate on the same note he struck when he announced his candidacy of January 1.

The former Governor said, in announcing, that he would offer no political platform because of his belief that "political promises are not worth much of anything". He has campaigned in a light automobile, which does not even bear so much as a windshield sticker or a placard. He has made no stump speeches.

"I've made a great many talks before organizations which extend me an invitation," said Stevenson. "Besides the people I've addressed at such meetings, I estimate that I have talked personally with 250,000 Texas men and women since I announced for the Senate".

Stevenson has a theory that a candidate for office can learn more by listening to the people than by "lecturing them or trying to tell them what they ought to think and do."

His campaign methods apparently have been effective. Three successive statewide polls of public opinion have shown Stevenson in the lead in the United States Senate race. He predicts that he will get a majority of the votes on Saturday and that no runoff will be necessary.

McGregor Rodeo Gang Due In Gatesville Friday, July 23d

The McGregor Rodeo boosters will be in Gatesville Friday afternoon, July 23d, at 3:15, along with Clyde Chesser and his Texas Village Boys, doing the pickin' and fiddlin'. The McGregor Rodeo is scheduled for July 29, 30 and 31.

The higher education fund and the public school permanent fund have now reached a total of \$215,000,000.00.

The Land Office added an additional \$1,133,184 resulting from the sale of 210,00 acres located in 68 counties. Only 30 tracts totaling 15,000 acres located in Presidio, Reeves and El Paso counties failed to receive bids. The amount bid per acre doubled that for any previous sale.

Commissioner Giles pointed out, by way of contrast, that when Texas made its bid to enter the Union, it unsuccessfully offered its entire public domain to the Federal Government for \$13,000,000. Now a small fraction of those same lands are bringing in over \$14,000,000.00 annually from oil and gas royalties alone for public education.

Judge John A. Rawlins Candidate, Associate Justice Supreme Court

Judge John A. Rawlins of Dallas, candidate for Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas, has a life history like an Horatio Alger story. He was born 53 years ago on a farm near Lancaster. His father was the son of a Christian minister.

Judge Rawlins was named for his two grandfathers, John Rawlins and Allen Holloman. His grandfather, John M. Rawlins, was a cousin of Gen. John A. Rawlins, who was chief of staff for Gen. U. S. Grant, and later became secretary of war. Which accounts for the fact that one of Uncle Sam's battleships bears the name of John A. Rawlins.

Judge Rawlins was salutatorian of his Lancaster High School graduating class, went to TCU on a scholarship, earned a B. A. Degree. Two years later, he entered Texas University, where he worked his way through law school. While at the university he was president of the glee club, manager of the band, and sang in Chautauqua, a choral group.

Before his degree was conferred, Judge Rawlins went overseas as a private in the 37th Combat Infantry, and was in Belgium when the first World War ended. He returned to Texas and entered law practice in 1919, his degree having been conferred "en absentia."

Judge Rawlins first entered politics in 1924, when he was elected florial representative in the State Legislature from Dallas, Rockwall and Kaufman counties. During his second term in the legislature, he was chairman of the judiciary committee of the house.

In 1928, Judge Rawlins was appointed judge of County Court at Law No. 2, and served for over seven years. He was then elected to the 116th district court, a post he has held for 14 years.

Active in civic affairs, Judge Rawlins has been president of the District and Appellate Judges Association, and chairman of the board of directors of the State Bar. He declined re-election as president of the Ex-Student's Association of TCU to become a candidate for the Supreme Court Bench. Judge Rawlins has three children John Jr. 20, Billy 15, and Mary Jane, 12. His wife is the former Miss Virginia Holt of Waco.

Hart, opponent of Judge Rawlins, was one of the attorneys for the labor unions in their unsuccessful and ill-advised attempt to enjoin the State Officials from enforcing the Texas law regulating labor unions, which was passed with the view of protecting public interest.

★ The Appellate Court, in upholding the law forbidding the unions from collecting work permit fees from non-union employees, reorganized the policy expressed by the Legislature in the preamble to the Act: "The right to work is the right to live."

★ Judge John Rawlins is under no obligation to either labor or capital. He is now completing 20 years of service as a State Trial Judge. He is a family man, a World War veteran, and a church worker. He has the endorsement of the Dallas Bar Association and is interested only in administering the law fairly and impartially in the interest of the public at large. He is a graduate of Texas University and Texas Christian University.
