Latest State Election Returns: UP To 12:57 Monday

Latest tabulation of the Texas Primary Election Saturday, showed Coke Stevenson and Lyndon Johnson have won places in the Democratic Runoff for the United States Senate nomination.

The count:
Stevenson 398,845; Johnson 331,637. Peddy 196,033.

Governor Jester won the nomination in the gubernatorial race with 521,168 votes; Evans 221,545; March 154,178.

Allen Shivers won the race for reelection as Lieutenant Governor with 666,072. Turner Walker, 216,662.

Sam Saburn and 16 other Texas Congressmen were renominated.

Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, Place 3. Jefferson Smith is leading W. St. John Garwood by 6118 votes.

All incumbent State officials held comfortable majorities.

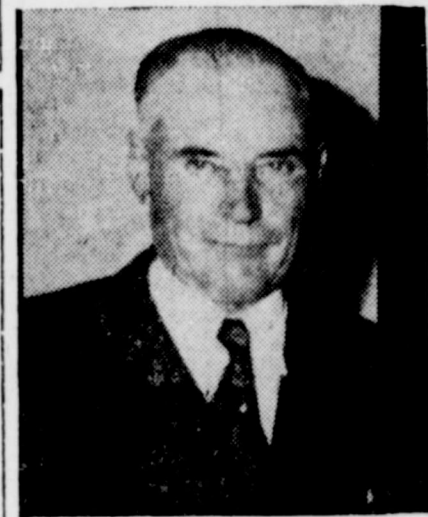

Milk Shortage Reported: Representative of Borden Company

W. E. Smith, Louisburg, Tenn., had a conference with County Agent W. P. Graham, Tuesday afternoon. Mr. Smith is the General Field Representative for the Borden Milk Company. Mr. Smith reports that some 90 farmers of Coryell County are selling milk on the butterfat basis to the local Borden plant. The present price is \$1.04 per pound butter fat. This is the highest price paid by Borden in 90 years.

Mr. Smith thinks we should have 500 farmers selling milk to their plant. There are several arguments in favor of this.

Gatesville Girl Awarded Davidson Scholarship To University of Texas

Miss Colleen Higgins, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John D. Higgins of this city, was among the thirty Texas High School Graduates to receive the Wilburn S. Davidson Scholarship to the University of Texas.

Miss Higgins was a 1948 graduate of Gatesville High School, an honor student in English; she was also cheer leader and literary editor of the Annual Staff.

Twenty-one boys and nine girls from various parts of Texas were selected for this award.

In the first place a dairy cow pays the biggest return of any animal on the farm.

In the second place there is a cash income over the entire year.

In the third place a few cows (up to 8 or 10) doesn't interfere too much with other farm operations.

Mr. J. R. Hodges, one of the best farmers in the Pancake community, milks six or seven cows the year around. His income from selling milk to the Borden Company is around \$200 per mo.

A farmer near Reisel, from six cows has sold \$1200 worth of milk in the first six months in 1948. This makes \$200 per cow.

Utilization of present pastures plus home raised feed for six or seven cows is the surest income a farmer can have.

There is a shortage of dairy cows, and the raising of Jersey heifers in connection with this program will add to the income.

Farmers are urged to give some thought to making dairying a part of their balanced farm program.

Mr. Smith thinks that milk will be the last of farm products to go down in price. He based this on the shortage of milk in the United States and the shortage of dairy cows, and particularly the shortage of replacement cows.

Farmers are using beef bulls with dairy cows to produce a calf that will sell as a butcher calf, and during the price at present, but when the price of beef cattle breaks this kind of calf will not bring as much money as a well bred heifer calf.

The Texas Poll

The Statewide Survey of Public Opinion

AUSTIN, Texas, July 22.—Unlike the nation as a whole, Texas has more men than women eligible to vote this year, a study by The Texas Poll reveals.

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The study, conducted as basis for The Texas Poll's scientific surveys of the voting public, shows men outnumber women by a ratio of 3 to 2 on the poll tax records in this state. Nationwide estimates of both the Democratic and the Republican parties show women outnumber men voters by a slight margin.

The Texas Poll Study also discloses:

1. Eligible voters in cities of over 50,000 population account for more than one-third of the Texas electorate. One-fourth live on the farms and ranches; the rest in small and medium size towns.

2. Five percent of the eligible voters are Negroes. The majority of these live in the big cities.

3. Proportionately more women than men are found among the young voters of the 21-29 age group.

The Texas Poll sampled the poll tax rolls of every county in the state in order to design its scientific cross section of the electorate. The results of this sampling, supplemented by official census estimates and returns from the poll's continuous surveys of the adult population, show this is how the Texas electorate is made up:

In making its pre-election surveys to measure strength of candidates, The Texas Poll breaks down its cross section into 75 or more assignments to interviewers in all parts of the state. Each interviewer receives a prepared questionnaire to be used in interviewing specified quotas of men and women voters, of various age groups and economic levels, who live in town and in the country.

The interviews conducted by the field reporters represent the opinions of a scientific cross section of the statewide electorate. A survey may be based on a cross section of 500 interviewers, 1,000 interviews, 1,500, or more. Each interview includes, among other things, a measure of the voter's likelihood of going to the polls. On the basis of the opinions of likely voters only, The Texas Poll makes its pre-election forecasts.

This year The Texas Poll published forecasts in the U. S. Senate race and the Governor's race. These forecasts were based on a cross section of 1,500 interviews conducted between Monday, July 19, and Friday, July 23.

In past years The Texas Poll has published ten forecasts in election contests. All of these were based on surveys conducted about five days before the election. On the average, the poll has missed the winner's standing by 3.2 percentage points, when compared with official election returns.

The poll's worst error in picking the winner was in 1946, when it underestimated the strength of gubernatorial candidate Beauford Jester in the first primary by 6.9 points. However, at various stages in that hot gubernatorial campaign, the poll had foretold Jester's increasing strength. In the runoff, the poll showed Jester with 63.0 per cent; the official returns showed him with 66.3 per cent. The poll's best featment was in 1946, too, when it said Allan Shivers had 56.6 per cent of the votes in the runoff for lieutenant-governor. The official returns show he actually polled 56.3 per cent.

The Texas Poll is financed by twenty-five newspapers which publish the results.

Texans in Washington

TEXANS IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, D. C. July 23. (AP)—Nothin' but gloom on the horizon, moan the good Texas Congressmen on hand early for the special session.

The South is being shoved around. The Republicans, short of a miracle, will win the presidential election. Turmoil and little else will come of this unusual election-year summer session of Congress. The world situation gets no better.

There may be optimism in the hearts of some of the Lone Star State delegation, but their views are held by most of the Texans around town when President Truman issued a proclamation convening Congress July 26.

"The Southerners have been kicked in the teeth by both political parties," declared Rep. Ed Gossett of Wichita Falls.

"They will continue to be kicked in the teeth until we either select independent electors as contemplated by the men who wrote the Constitution, or abolish the electoral college as proposed in amendment sponsored by myself and Senator Lodge (R-Mass.)"

"The platforms of both parties are cheap, hypocritical and appeal

to minority pressure groups in the big cities. Both parties continue to sacrifice principle for political expediency."

The Gossett-Lodge resolution, approved by both the House and Senate Judiciary committees, proposes a constitutional amendment which would divide the electoral votes of a state strictly in proportion to the popular vote. Under the change, a minority group would no longer have the power to swing an entire state electoral vote to one party or the other.

The Republican advocated the resolution in their platform, but the Democrats rejected Gossett's plea that the Philadelphia convention accept it as one of their planks.

Congressman Gene Worley of Shamrock, who generally supports the administration, expressed the viewpoint of the average when he said of the forthcoming special session:

"I don't think anybody will be disappointed—except the people. Both sides will try to make political capital of the situation."

If any good does come of it the session, he continued, it will be in pointing up the issues so the people may decide whose at fault.

"The Republicans had all the time they needed to carry out their platform," added Worley. "The fact that they didn't shows that they don't really want those planks enacted into law."

The civil rights racial fight will be the bitterest issue at the session, but there will be hot words also on the causes and possible cures of inflation. That the inflation problem will precipitate a division among Democrats just as will the Civil Rights issue is seen in the views of Congressman Gossett.

He says that if you freeze prices you also must freeze wages and ban strikes.

"It's a labor and production problem rather than a price control problem," he elaborated.

"We are suffering from labor monopoly on one hand and industrial monopoly on the other. We can never stop inflation short of collapse as long as industrial wage

increases and industrial prices increase continue to chase each other around a vicious circle of ever-spiraling wage and price raises.

"As long as wage increases continue in steel, coal, automotive supplies, electrical supplies, retail rates and wages, we will continue to have inflation. The only answer is to stabilize wages and prices and to increase production."

Around The Capital:

Scrap iron soon should be reaching this country from Germany "at a steady flow", according to word Rep. Lindley Beckworth received from the Commerce Department.

S. J. R. No. 2

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for a Board for apportioning the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment; providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation by the Governor; and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows: "Section 28. The Legislature shall, at its first regular session after the publication of each United States decennial census, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, agreeable to the provisions of Sections 25, 26, and 26-a of this Article. In the event the Legislature shall at any such first regular session following the publication of a United States decennial census, fail to make such apportionment, same shall be done by the Legislative Redistricting Board of Texas, which is hereby created, and shall be composed of five (5) members, as follows: The Lieutenant Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum. Said Board shall assemble in the City of Austin within ninety (90) days after the final adjournment of such regular session. The Board shall, within sixty (60) days after assembling, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, or into senatorial or representative districts, as the failure of action of such Legislature may make necessary. Such apportionment shall be in writing and signed by three (3) or more of the members of the Board duly acknowledged as the act and deed of such Board, and, when so executed and filed with the Secretary of State, shall have force and effect of law. Such apportionment shall become effective at the next succeeding statewide general election. The Supreme Court of Texas shall have jurisdiction to compel such Commission to perform its duties in accordance with the provisions of this section by writ of mandamus or other extraordinary writs conformable to the usages of law. The Legislature shall provide necessary funds for clerical and technical aid and for other expenses incidental to the work of the Board, and the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to receive per diem and travel expense during the Board's session in the same manner and amount as they would receive while attending a special session of the Legislature. This amendment shall become effective January 1, 1951."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "For the amendment to Section 28, Article III of the Constitution of Texas providing for a Board for apportionment of the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment."

Each voter at such election shall mark out one of such clauses on the ballot, leaving the clause expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of this state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article IV, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section to be known as Section 3a, so as to provide for succession to the office of Governor in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, or fails to qualify, before taking his oath of office as Governor; and providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended, by adding another Section to follow Section 3, and be designated Section 3a, to read as follows:

"Section 3a. If, at the time the Legislature shall canvass the election returns for the offices of Governor and Lieutenant Governor, the person receiving the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, has died, then the person having the highest number of votes for the office of Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until after the next general election. It is further provided that in the event the person with the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, shall become disabled, or fail to qualify, then the Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until a person has qualified for the office of Governor, or until after the next general election. Any succession to the Governorship not otherwise provided for in this Constitution, may be provided for by law; provided, however, that any person succeeding to the office of Governor shall be qualified as otherwise provided in this Constitution, and shall, during the entire term to which he may succeed, be under all restrictions and inhibitions imposed in this Constitution on the Governor."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the date provided by law in the month of November, A. D. 1948, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for gubernatorial succession in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, before qualifying and for such succession in other contingencies."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for gubernatorial succession in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, before qualifying and for such succession in other contingencies."

Each voter at such election shall mark out one of such clauses on the ballot, leaving the clause expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another Section to be designated as "Section 60" to authorize counties of this State to provide insurance for county employees; providing for the Governor's proclamation, and submission to the electorate.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the State Constitution be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another Section following Section 59, to be designated "Section 60" to read as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all county employees as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties of this State and for the payment of the costs, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees" and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees." Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

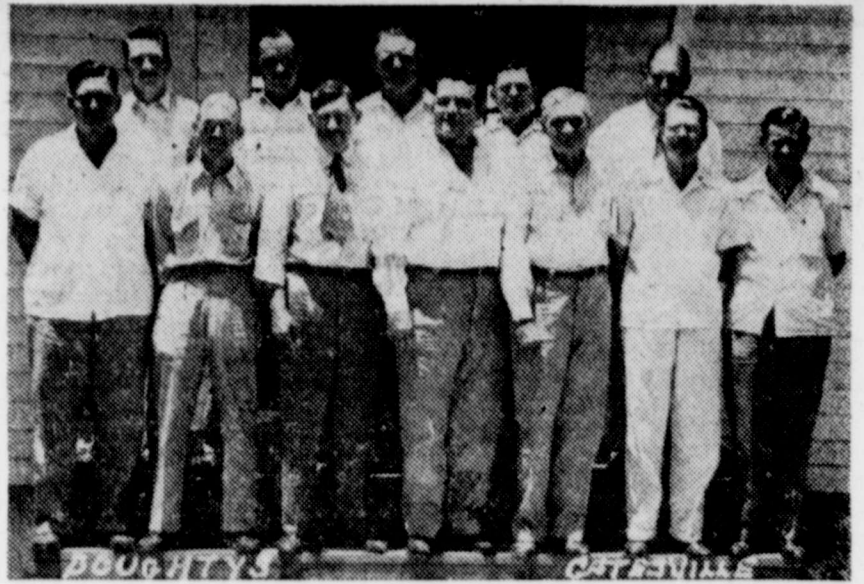

HELP YOUR REFRIGERATOR SERVE YOU BETTER



DEFROST

whenever frost reaches thickness of one-quarter inch

Thick frost retards coldmaking, makes your refrigerator run longer, increases operating cost. It should be removed whenever it becomes one-quarter of an inch thick. It is necessary to defrost more often in summer than in winter because of more moisture in the air and greater use of your refrigerator.

A Quick Method of Defrosting

Empty defrosting tray and turn control to "off." Remove ice trays and frozen foods from freezer. (If latter are wrapped in several thicknesses of paper and placed on refrigerator shelf, they won't thaw out in short time it takes to defrost.) Fill proper-sized pans with very hot water and place on shelves of freezer. Use fresh hot water as needed.

When frost has melted wash freezer with weak solution of baking soda and lukewarm water. Clean food compartment, wash thoroughly with baking soda solution and wipe dry. Empty drip pan, replace ice trays and frozen foods and start freezing. The entire operation should take only 20 to 30 minutes.

The Best Time of Day to Defrost

During the hot summer months it's best to defrost in the late evening just before bedtime, when the refrigerator has less work to do. If you defrost during the middle of the day, the refrigerator may run excessively when started up, because of the heat, frequent door openings and warm foods being placed in food compartment.

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
