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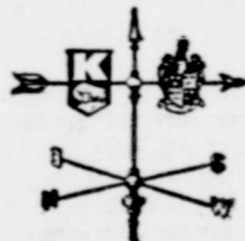

**Home Demonstration Council Organized in Coryell County Saturday**

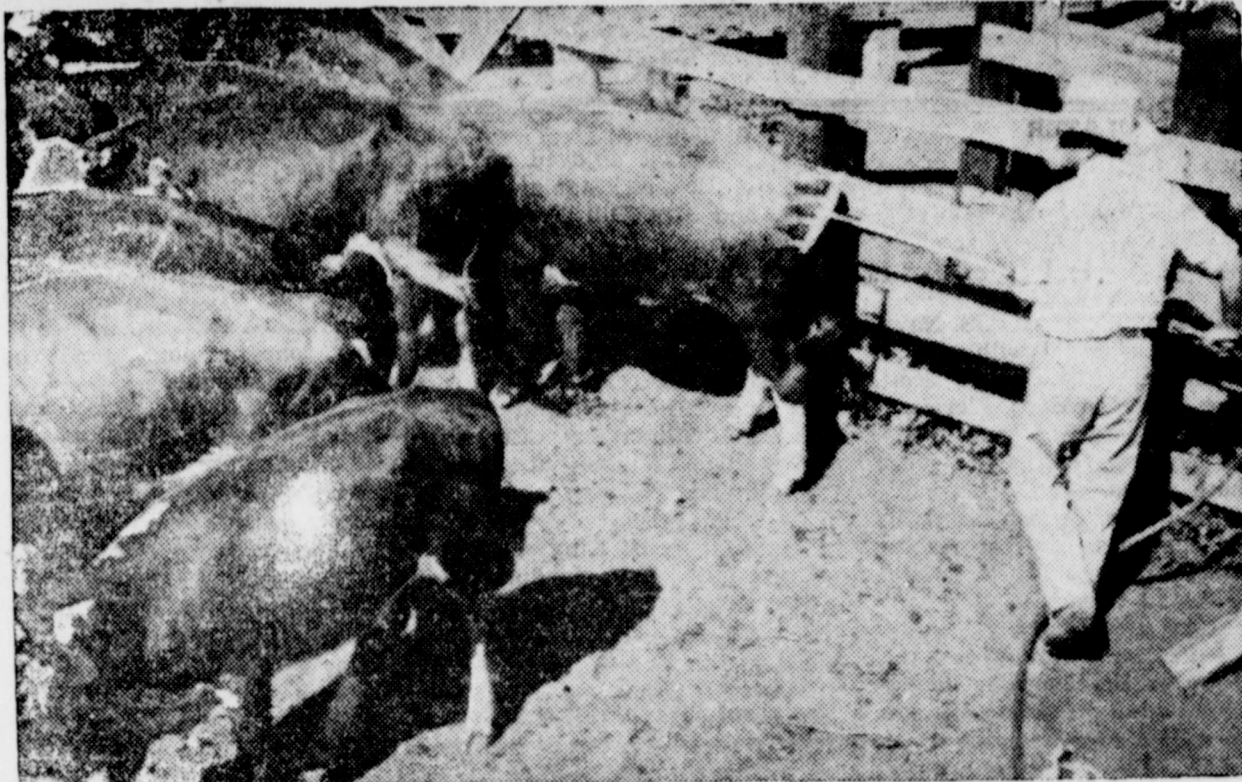

**ACA Vice-Chairman Says Farmers Will Be Helped on Soil Problem**

Soil erosion is one of the Nation's greatest problems today, states Frank Blair, vice-chairman of the county ACA committee. The PMA is offering farmers assistance for carrying out erosion control practices of terraces, diversion terraces, drainage ditches, winter legume cover crops, and phosphate to promote growth of these winter legumes.

Since July 1st the ACA office has issued prior approvals and purchase orders covering 285 tons of 20% superphosphate to be used on winter legumes this fall. This amount was divided among about 140 farmers. The PMA pays \$18.86 of the total cost of \$30.50 per ton, leaving \$11.70 which the farmer must pay. Any farmer who plans to use phosphate with his winter legumes this fall should contact the ACA office at his earliest convenience for an approval purchase order on the phosphate.

Blair went on to say that farmers who plan to terrace should not request an approval or purchase order until after his lines have been run and he has made a definite trade with the contractor to build them.

Frank E. Jones and Reinhold A. Hempel of the Harmon and Copperas Cove communities, respectively, have both been issued prior approvals and purchase orders for phosphate during the past few days. Mr. Jones plans to use his phosphate under vetch, while Mr. Hempel intends to phosphate his clover and winter peas. These men have used phosphate with legumes in previous

years and both state they were well pleased with the results. They state that in addition to holding the soil during the winter months, when our rainfall is heaviest, that yields of subsequent crops were increased.

Frank M. McCutcheon, whose farm is in South Gatesville ACA community, reports that he has completed a drainage ditch, diversion terraces and 2,400 feet of standard terraces. Mr. McCutcheon said that he had always been opposed to terraces, but had come to the conclusion that unless he sodded his farm or sold it that he would have to terrace.

During the past week the ACA field officer has checked terraces, diversion terraces and/or drainage ditches built under the PMA program on the farms of R. E. Stoddard, A. D. Gartman, J. E. Woodson, F. M. McCutchen, and J. B. Foster. These are only a few of our farmers who are doing their bit to stop erosion, which, if let go, becomes more expensive to correct with each passing year.

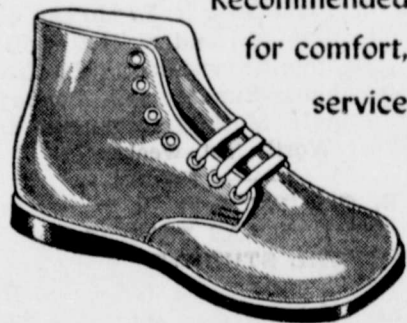

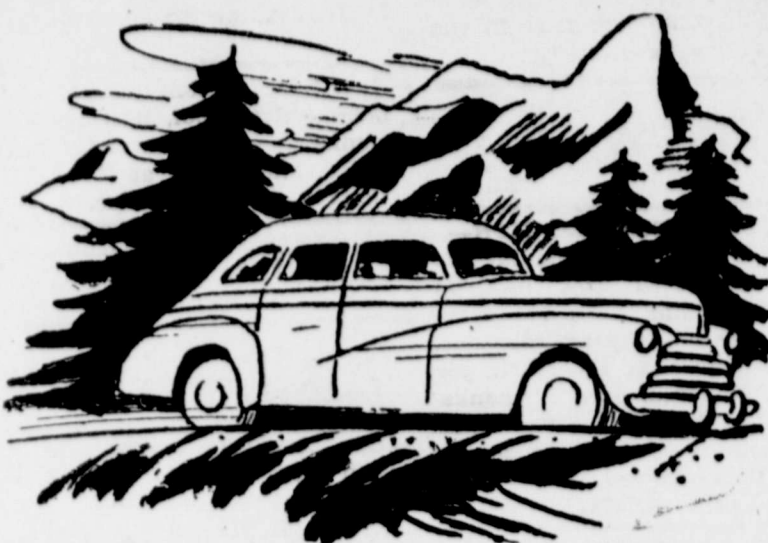

**VOTE IN U. N. SHAKES EGYPT'S FAITH IN U. S.**

CAIRO, Egypt.—In the eyes of the Near East, America's traditional reputation for fair play has been directly challenged by United States Department action in the Anglo-Egyptian dispute. For many, many years America was tops with the Egyptians because they believed in the sincerity of our aggressors and to champion the cause of self-determination of all people. That was before the United States delegate voted with Britain against Egypt in the Security Council.

"Now the Egyptians hate you as much as they do us, old boy", a Britisher said to me with unconcealed glee.

It isn't quite that bad, but the Egyptians were stunned and dis-

appointed when it was announced over the radio here that Egypt had lost her case before the council by a single vote and that the United States had sided with Britain.

Of course there are two sides to the question and the ambitions of Egyptian political leaders are playing a stimulating part in the controversy, but it seems to an inquiring reporter who is not too well versed in the technique of international poker that both the Americans and British are playing their Near East cards straight into the hands of the Russians.

We are supposed to be out here making friends and influencing people to believe in democracy. Specifically, both the British and Americans are trying to keep Russia from stealing Arabian oil. And yet we deliberately alienate Egypt which is the center and heart of the Arab world.

When it came to the vote in the Security Council, however, the U. S. Department was on the spot. Our interests are mutual with Britain in the Near East. Britain made a treaty with Egypt in 1936, to run 20 years, which provided for Egyptian independence but with the right of British to maintain as many as 20,000 troops along the Suez Canal border. To have voted against Britain under these circumstances would have had the effect of giving the Security Council the right to pass judgment on all treaties between nations. Also it would have ignored the unofficial but nevertheless British troops stay on in the Canal Zone, in Palestine and in Greece. As between Britain and the United States there was only one thing for us to do and we did it. We voted with Britain. It was an unfortunate incident. We should have helped the British work out a satisfactory settlement of the dispute without a showdown in the Security Council. As a result of our vote confidence in the sincerity of America's international objectives has been badly shaken.

The Egyptians claim the treaty of 1936 was illegally obtained. They say it was negotiated by Britain when she had control of the Egyptian government and had a large force of British troops in Egypt. They point out with telling logic that when the French were in similar hot water in Lebanon and British sided with the Syrians and demanded that the French get all their troops out of both Lebanon and Syria.

"If two small countries like Lebanon and Syria can have independence with not a single foreign soldier on their soil, why isn't Egypt, with her stronger and greater population, entirely capable of managing her government without the presence of British troops?" a Cairo publisher asked me.

"We remember and appreciate the protection the British gave us in the last war when they kept the Nazis from seizing Egypt. But Britain has had a good thing here in trade and commerce. She never gave much back except military protection. In 60 years built a school or a hospital for Egyptian children. Our modern city of Cairo (and it is a beautiful city) has been built largely with Egyptian money and Egyptian enterprises. We are able to run our affairs. Do you believe there is any really great difference between London and Cairo?"

"Also we are deeply disappointed and mystified about America", he continued. "You voluntarily get out of the Philippines. You announce an independence and announce an international policy of support for small nations in their yearnings to have independence and self-determination. You offer financial aid to Greece and Turkey. We think America is wonderful. Then when we ask you to send us military experts to train our young army and solicit a loan you turn us down flat. On top of that you vote with the British against us on the question of getting their troops off of our Egyptian soil and protecting our source of Nile River water in the Audan. What kind of a foreign policy is that, and I ask you now? Is it any wonder that some of

our impulsive leaders orr threaten to invite the Russians to send a military mission Egypt? of course we won't do it. We dislike and distrust the Russians even more than you do."

That is probably as true at the present time in Egypt. The Russians have not been able to get the door open, much less get their foot in it. The Egyptian government has refused to negotiate a commercial agreement with the Soviets who wanted to exchange oil for cotton textiles. But isn't necessarily true in other Arab states. New schools are being established. Thousands upon thousands of books are being translated and printed in Arabic. More than 4,000 students from the Arab states are studying this year in England America and the Scandinavian countries. There is a modern hospital in almost every Moslem city of any size in the Near East. The Arab League is beginning to take definite form and substantial substance. There are some 40,000,000 Moslems in the Near East, of whom about 17,000,000 live in Egypt. The birth rate is increasing more rapidly than that of any Christian group. There recently has come into active existence an organization known as the Moslem Brotherhood. It is made up of young, aggressive Moslems whose leaders are intelligent and know what they want. They are giving the Arab color and glamour. Their great weakness also constitutes a great appeal for the restless illiterates among the Moslem young. Their thesis is that if you are not a Moslem you are something of a dog.

All in all, the Arab states are awake. They are building Arab unity. They think they are going places internationally. And they may be. Egypt is the center center of the Arab League. It is the heart of Islam. Its leaders will guide the destiny of whatever the Arab League turns out to be. They of the Arab League. It is a naturally anti-Communist church. Until now they have been great admirers of America. It would be disastrous to our new venture into international evangelism on behalf of democracy and freedom to lose the good will and confidence of these Arab states. It isn't too late to regain the respect and esteem we once had here, but, as in so many other parts of the world, time is running in favor of the Russian Soviets instead of to us.

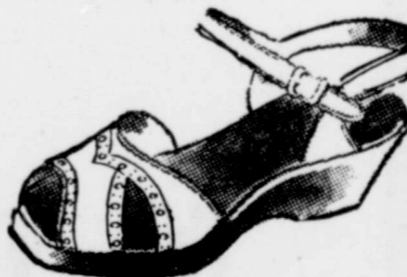
