## Saint Jo Masons To Honor Gatesville Citizen Monday Eve.

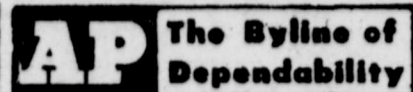

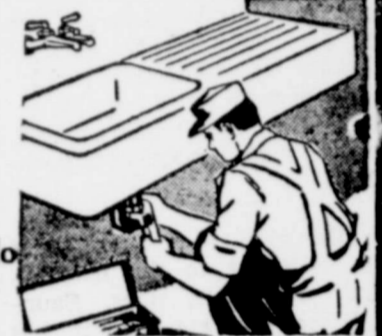

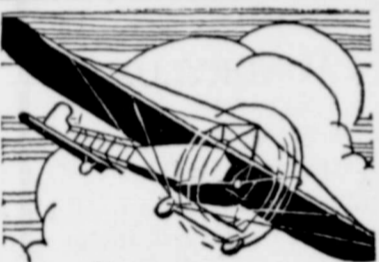

## This Week in History

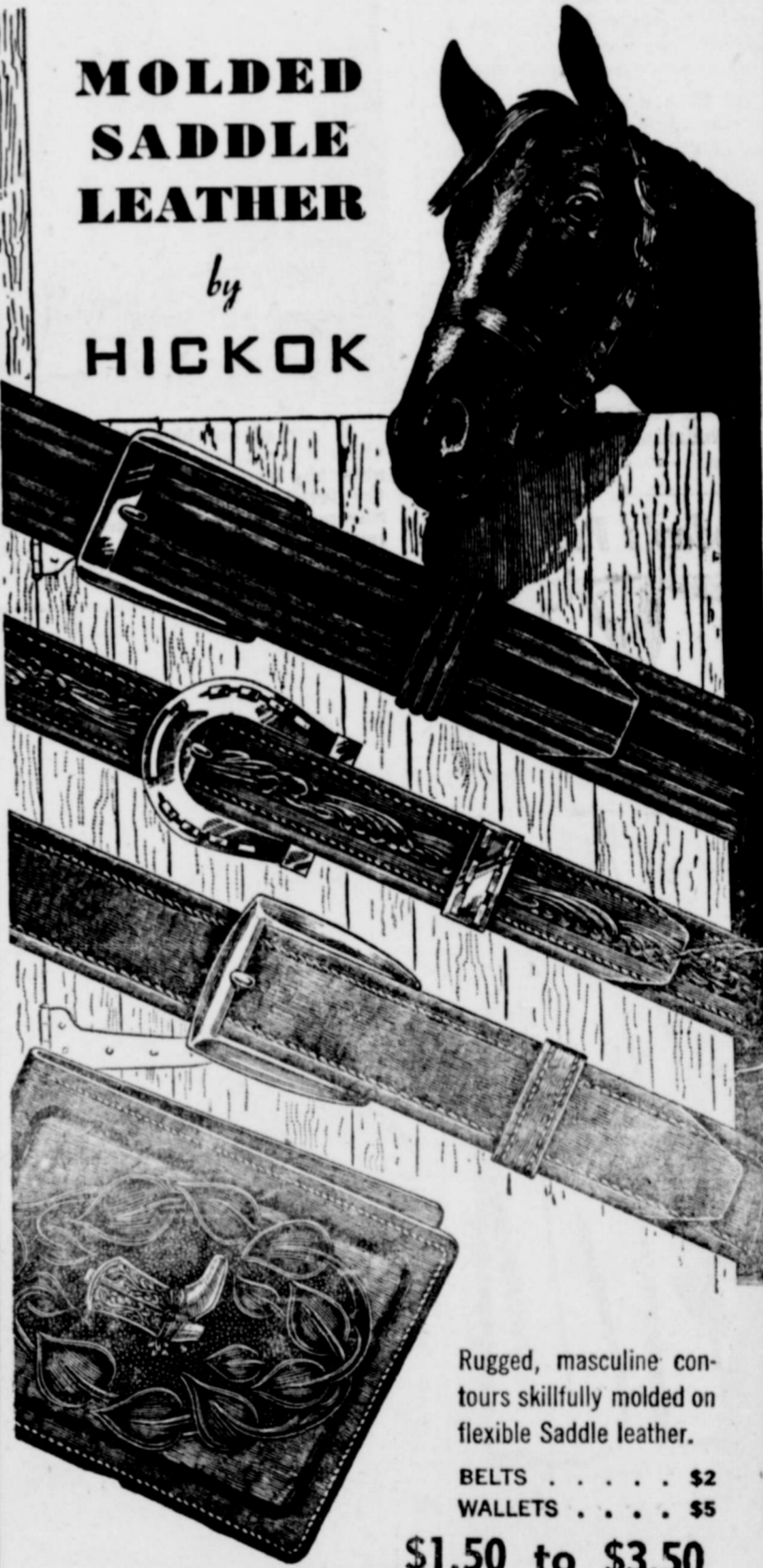
AUGUST 1 to AUGUST 7

Seventy-five years ago this week—August 1—the world's first cable car jerked up steep Clay Street in San Francisco. This ingenious vehicle was the invention of A. S. Halladie of that city. Beneath the surface of the street, and between two car tracks, moved a heavy steel rope, powered by an engine in a distant building. The motorman of the car dropped a grip bar through a slot in the street. As the bar gripped the moving cable the cable car was pulled along. Horse-drawn public carriers became a thing of the past as American cities began installing cable car systems. Here was the first step in mechanizing urban transportation on city streets and to A. S. 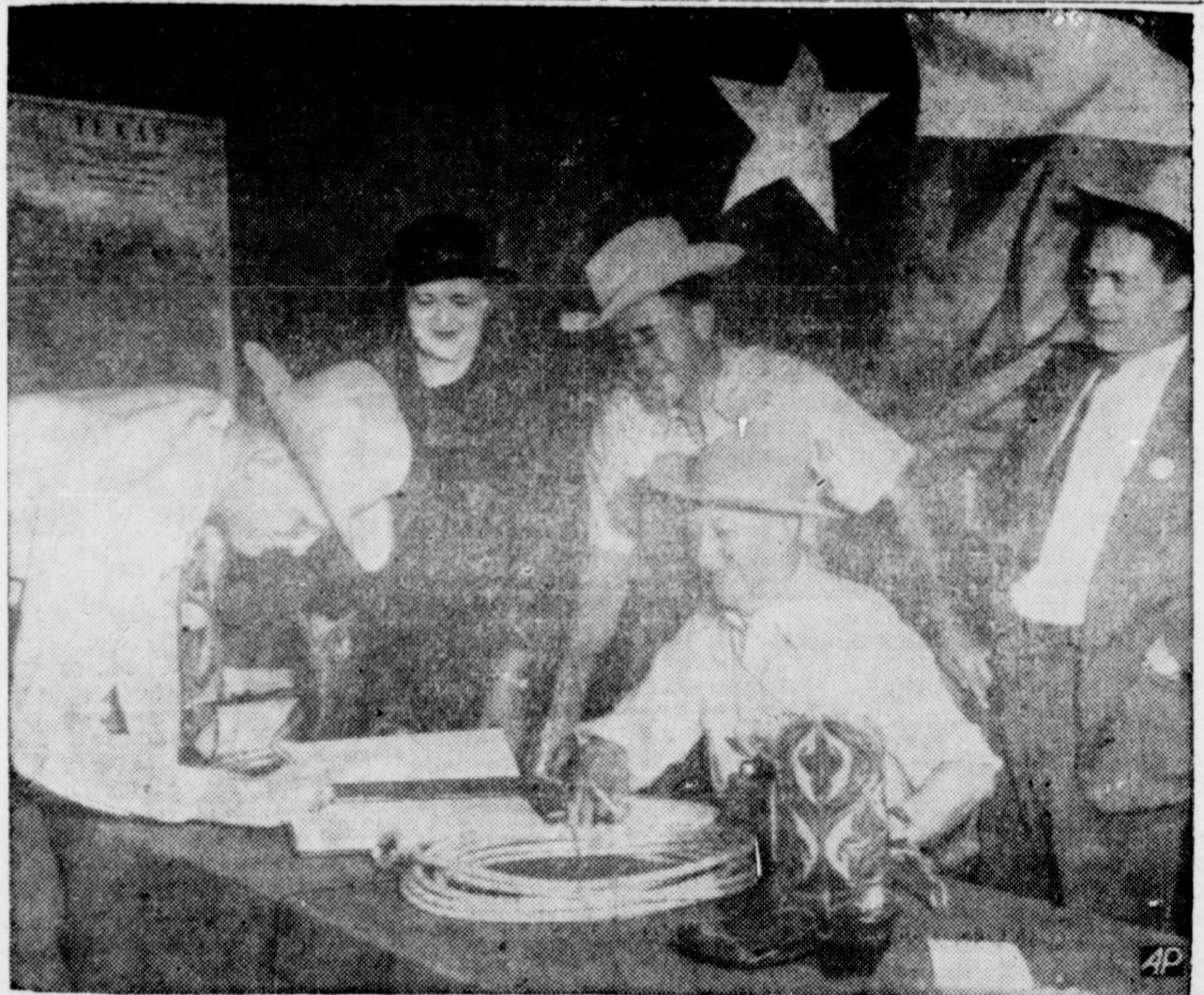

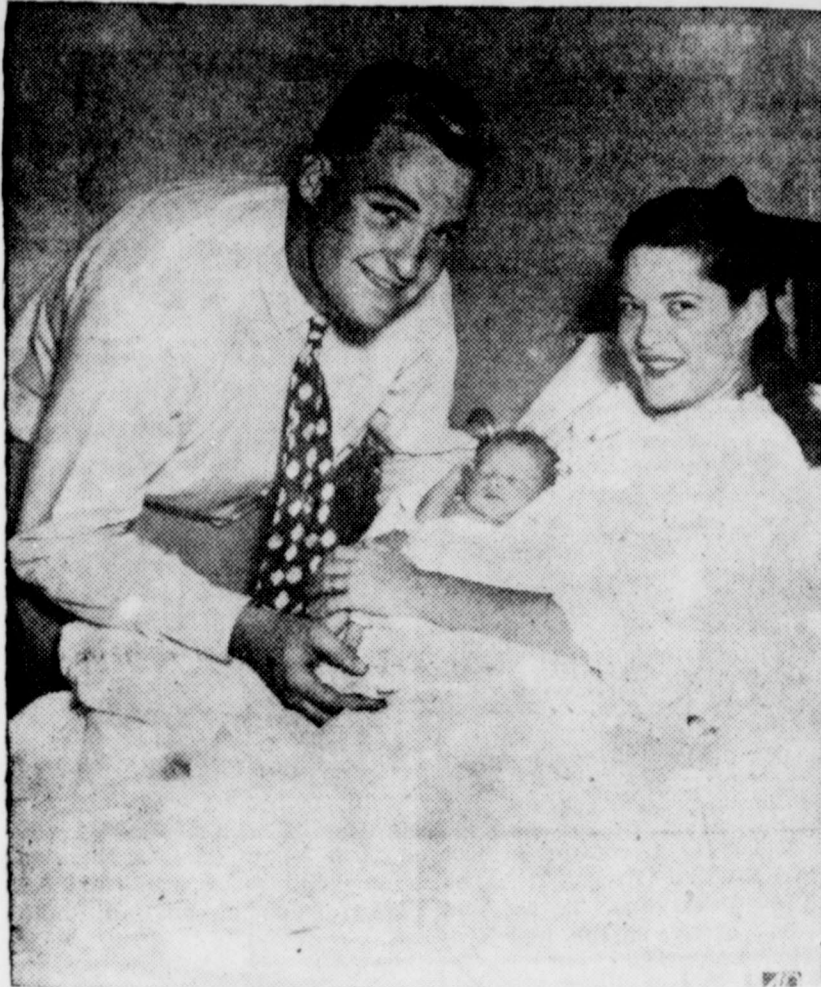

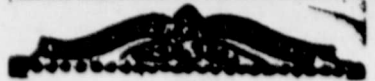

**Winter Legume Program Announced by PMA Stone & Blair Reporting**

The local ACA office has been advised that assistance will be offered to farmers desiring to build up their soil and protect it from erosion by the use of winter legumes and cover crops seeded this fall. The seed on which PMA payments will be made in Coryell County are: Austrian winter, dix-it wonder, singletray, caley and wild winter peas; hairy, common and willamette vetch; hubam and melilotus indica clover; and common ryegrass. According to Clois D. Stone, administrative officer, the government will pay approximately 60% of the cost of the seed. He stated that the ACA office could not issue prior approvals or purchase orders on these seed at the present time, but that he hoped the office would be able to start the 1949 Program during the latter part of August. Farmers will be advised when approvals can be issued on these winter cover crops.

The ACA office is still issuing prior approvals and purchase orders on the superphosphate to be applied to vetches, winter peas and clovers seeded this fall. Some of the farmers receiving approvals and purchase orders this week on phosphate were: Joe F. Williamson, Paul H. Martin, W. J. Dube, and Owen Dyer.

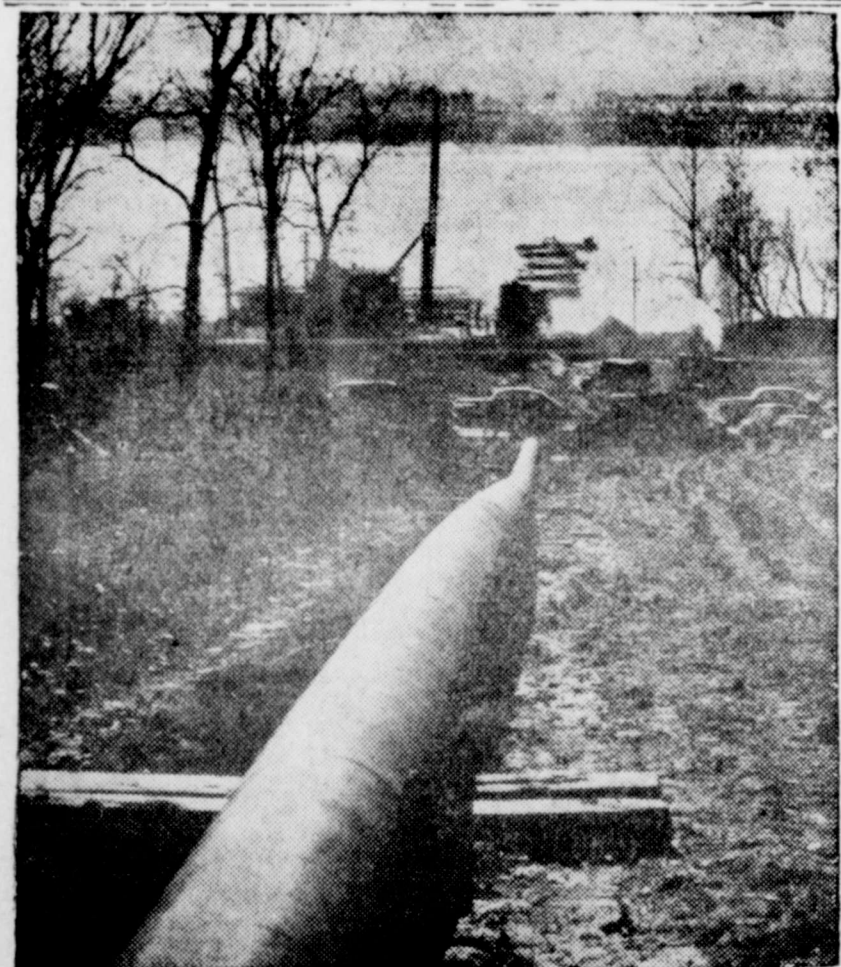
