

Civilian Committee Tours Camp Hood, Courtesy, C. O.

Major General J. G. Christiansen, Commanding General of Camp Hood, and the 2nd Armored Division, was guest to a "Civilian Committee of Gatesville, starting at 10:45 Tuesday, the 10th.

The guests were met at the main gate, and went by bus to the Officer's Club for a brief greeting by General Christiansen, and cooling refreshments, and then visited in order, the Film Library, saw a Combat Film, had lunch at the 85th QM Co's. Mess hall.

After lunch, and a brief stop again at the Officer's Club, they made a tour of the post including Hospital area, Range Installations on South Range Road, and saw the Sugar Loaf Gas Car Range, and saw a tank firing demonstration, then a hill climbing demonstration at another area.

Following this they visited the CC "A" Recreation Hall, inspected the barracks and day room, and saw the 18-year-olds in training.

After another "briefing" at the Officer's Club they were shown a relief map of "Future Plans for Camp Hood" at the Post Engineer office, and then, to the main gate for the trip home.

Accompanying the party were Major General J. G. Christiansen, Colonel R. W. Stevens, Col. J. N. Robinson, Lt. Colonel C. C. Hulse. These men rode in the bus with the men of the Gatesville party, and the local ladies took over the General's and other Staff Officer's cars.

Outstanding, and most interesting to both the military personnel as well as the civilians was the training of the 18-year-olds, and a grand job is being done by Col. Collier (?) who is in charge of this activity.

Everything is done to "humanize" the training, and there is complete cooperation between the so-called "brass" and the enlisted personnel, and the 18-year-olds. Camp Hood has been designated as one of the training centers for the 18's who have volunteered for one year's service, and the basic training period has been whittled from 13 to 8 weeks, and the boys are kept just that busy. One officer said the "IQ" of these 18-year-old boys, who were interrupting their college work for this one year in the service was higher than the rating of enlistees during World War II.

In all, it was a great day for the Gatesville people.

Water Shortage In Fort Worth: Use Stopt

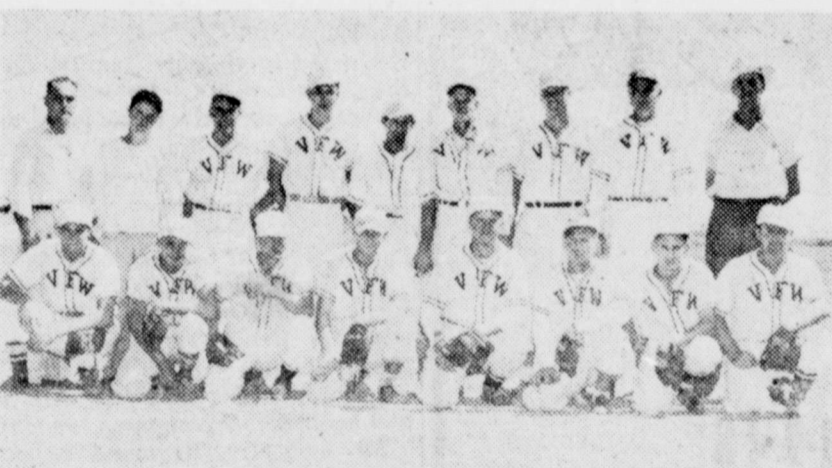



Dear Friends:

It was Wednesday (Aug. 4) before I got back to the House from my stay in the hospital. I still have to go back tomorrow and I have my right leg in a cast which I must wear for probably another five weeks. This will make it impossible for me to get home when the Session adjourns, but fortunately it has not kept me from attending any of the Sessions at which action has been taken.

The truth is this Session of Congress has accomplished practically nothing and gives no prospect of getting much done before it

adjourns.

Earlier this week the Republican Leadership brought in a resolution authorizing them to consider any legislation under "suspension" of rules. This means that the Speaker can at any time recognize any Member he wants to move to suspend the Rules and pass any bill. When such a motion is made, it is impossible to amend or in anywise change a bill. You must "take it or leave it". The opposition has only 20 minutes in which to point out objections. Then the House must vote. Of course, the Speaker will recognize only those Members to

bring up the bills that the Republican Leaders want to come up. You can readily see what tremendous powers this procedure gives the majority party and how the rights of the minority are destroyed. I voted against this procedure, but it was adopted by practically a straight party vote. Since then we have passed a bill to advance money to the United Nations to build a headquarters building in New York. I voted for this bill as did most of the Members.

Yesterday the House passed a so-called anti inflation bill. It increases the powers of the Federal Reserve Board to require greater bank reserves and to limit installment buying, but since it does definitely reduce, rather than expand credit, it should have a tendency to check the general price advance. I look upon this bill as utterly inadequate, but I felt that if I could not get a loaf or even a slice that I would take a bite. I, therefore, voted for it.

The House has just recessed till ten tomorrow morning. It now appears that we will pass some kind of housing bill tomorrow and then adjourn the Session. Everything that is taking place here now is so charged with party politics that it is difficult to know just how serious the present spy disclosures are. On the one hand, there is no question but that the Republicans have felt that it would be helpful to them to focus the attention of the public on the short-comings of the past Democratic Administration rather than on their own refusal to do anything toward paying the public debt or reducing the cost of living. On the other hand, I can see no justification of the employment of individuals of known questionable loyalty to our country. Nor can I see any reason for the President's refusal to give the Committee all the records it wants to see relative to the employment of these people. If there is nothing wrong, the people should know it. If there has been wrong doing, the guilty parties should be exposed, not protected.

As I see it, the House Committee has been far too willing to accept charges as proof and too willing to brand innocent people with suspicions. The President and most of the Administrative Branch have been equally culpable in its refusal to help bring the facts to light or to get rid of those who seem more interested in the welfare of Russia than of the United States. We should not lightly accuse any person of disloyalty, but once his disloyalty is established, we certainly should lose no time in getting him off the Federal payroll and inflicting the most severe punishment authorized by law.

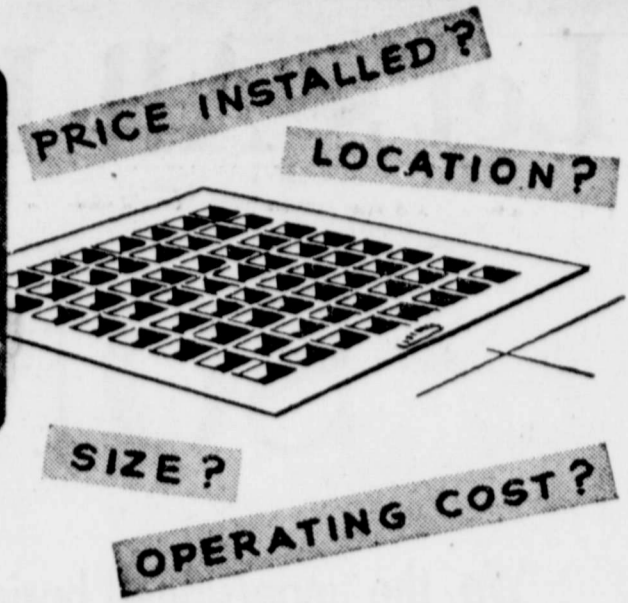
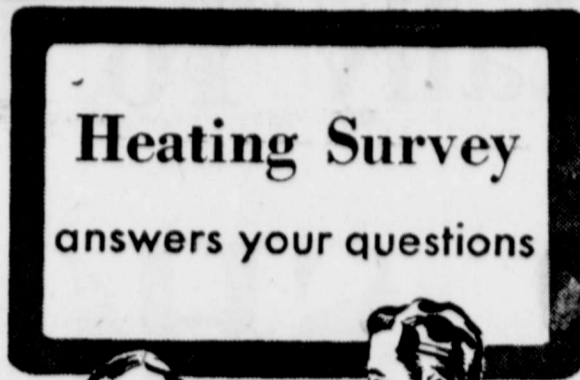

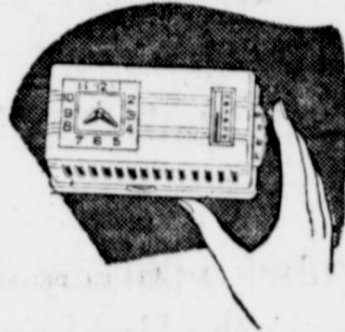
