

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

Frank Blair, vice-chairman of the county ACP Committee, says that every year some farmers fail to complete practices or fail to meet specifications in the practices they do not carry out.

Mr. Blair explains that the couny committee has the responsibilty to seeing that funds used to assist farmers in carrying out conservation practices are used to obtain the maximum of soil and water conservation. Assistance is given to help a farmer build the terraces only where terraces meet specifications. The same is true of other practices.

Some farmers fail to qualify for assistance because they don't understand what was required. The committee doesn't want any farmer to carry out practices and then find that assistance cannot be given because the practices fail to meet specifications.

Farmers also are reminded of their responsibility in furnishing acceptable evidence of conservation practices carried out. Measurements, prie slips, analysis tags, or whatever is required should be obtained at the time the material is purchased or the practice carried out. A little attention to these matters now, said the county chairman, will save time and money later on, and only in this vay can the nation be assured of maximum conservation.

161 years ago this week, on August 22, John Fitch, an inventor, launched his first successful steamboat.... just twenty years BEFORE Robert Fulton built his famed Claremont. Fitch's boat was about 45 feet long and was propel'ed by a series of paddles on each side. After many faults had been corrected, the boat moved along the Delaware river at a speed of 3 or 4 miles an hour. A second boat, about 60 feet long was built in 1788, by Fitch, with the paddles at the stern. In 1790, still another boat was launched by the eccentric inventor and ran almost 3,000 miles without accident during its first season.

Statistically speaking, Stevenson's lead in the poll is not large enough to indicate a sure victory. Scientific surveys like the one reported here may be off as much as 4 percentage points merely because of sampling error.

Also you must take into account last-minute shifts of opinion, especially among the undecided and the wishy-washy, and the all important turnout factor. A candidate may have more supporters than his opponent and still lose the election. This can happen if a larger proportion of his wellwishers stay at home instead of turning out to vote while those of his opponent are taking part in the election.


