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A Few Facts about the Hamilton County Electric Cooperative Association

In 1936 T. D. Craddock, then County Agent of Hamilton County, and a group of Hamilton County farmers and business men, conceived the idea of getting electric power for the farmers of Hamilton County.

For many months they labored unceasingly on this project and finally in 1939 they perfected an organization and obtained a loan from the Federal Government. The men who started this project, did so without the hope of gain or reward, but simply as a service to the farmers of Hamilton County.

There was not a single Evant man in that group neither was there an Evant man on the board of directors.

They obtained applications of 800 farmers of Hamilton County and let a contract for the building of lines. They made a contract with the Texas Power and Light Co. for the purchase of electric current and the first pole was set at Evant, simply because that was the closest point to the T. P. & L. power lines.

As farmers of neighboring communities saw the advantages of electric power, they began asking Hamilton County REA for it and the Association began to expand in all directions.

The REA does not allow its lines into towns of over 1,500 population, therefore its lines do not come into Hamilton itself, but the Association originated in Hamilton and has been there ever since. It has its office and warehouse in a large brick building for which they pay only \$40.00 per month rent.

Recently they began to think about erecting their own building and to that end bought one-fourth block from the City

of Hamilton, which is a part of the City Park that fronts on Highway 281. It has been rumored that they paid \$15,000 for this lot, but this is not the case. The City allowed the REA to make their OWN price, which they did, and this was \$1,500 (FIFTEEN HUNDRED). This lot has been approved by the Washington office and also the building; to be erected in Hamilton, and the loan for the building is now under way.

About eight months ago the Hamilton County REA bought the light system of Evant from the LCRA and that little town suddenly awoke to the fact that they would like to have the home office of this electric power system, that was originated and brought into existence by the patient toil and work of Hamilton County farmers. Not as an extra service to its citizenship, but purely as a commercial venture.

Hamilton is proud of the REA. It is also proud of its neighboring towns and villages. It thinks very highly of the town of Evant. It is a good town and has very fine people. It thinks so highly of it that just a few years ago, but for the heroic efforts of the Hamilton Fire Department, the entire business section of Evant would have been destroyed by fire.

Hamilton has never sought to improve itself at the expense of its neighbors. Its industries have originated there and it has not tried to coerce or otherwise taken from its neighbors, businesses that rightfully belonged to them. It has grown into the city that it is by its own efforts and has not taken from someone else. It believes in the rules of fair play and clean business, not only between individuals, but also towns.

Now Let Us Reason

The Hamilton County Electric Cooperative Association is approximately 75 miles long and 65 miles wide. Just what advantage would it receive by moving its home office ONLY 15 miles. A 2 1/2 million dollar concern from a thriving city of 5000 to a town of 500. This village does not have a hotel—Does not have natural gas—Does not have adequate telephone facilities—Does not have an Express office—Does not have a fire department—Does not have a freight terminal—Does not have sewage system—Does not have housing for the 48 employees of the Association. The Association is a big user of all these things. Would you like to see it operate without them?

Have the 48 people who work for it, many of whom have their homes in Hamilton, been asked if they would like to move or lose their jobs?

Would the Association like to pay the additional high fire insurance rates on all its property that it would have to pay to Evant?

The Association now has one of the lowest electric rates in the whole country, would you like to see these rates increased because of the move? This will be necessary because of increased expense. Do you think that service would be better or be improved, by moving it to Evant?

Who do you think would gain by such a move? Someone would, or they wouldn't be trying to move it, would they? Someone would greatly benefit financially, but every fair-minded, right thinking person knows that it will NOT be YOUR REA.

You thought you settled this issue recently in the election of your old board of directors, but now it has come up again—WHY—Do you think if this carried, that it would be settled? What would keep some other town from doing the same thing? Remember that each of these elections costs YOUR Association about \$500. You can settle it now with your ballots. Mark them "AGAINST CHANGING THE LOCATION TO EVANT" and MAIL them in.

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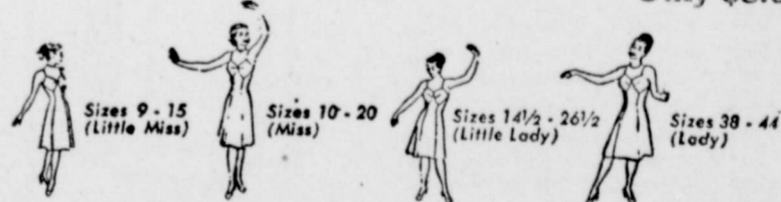

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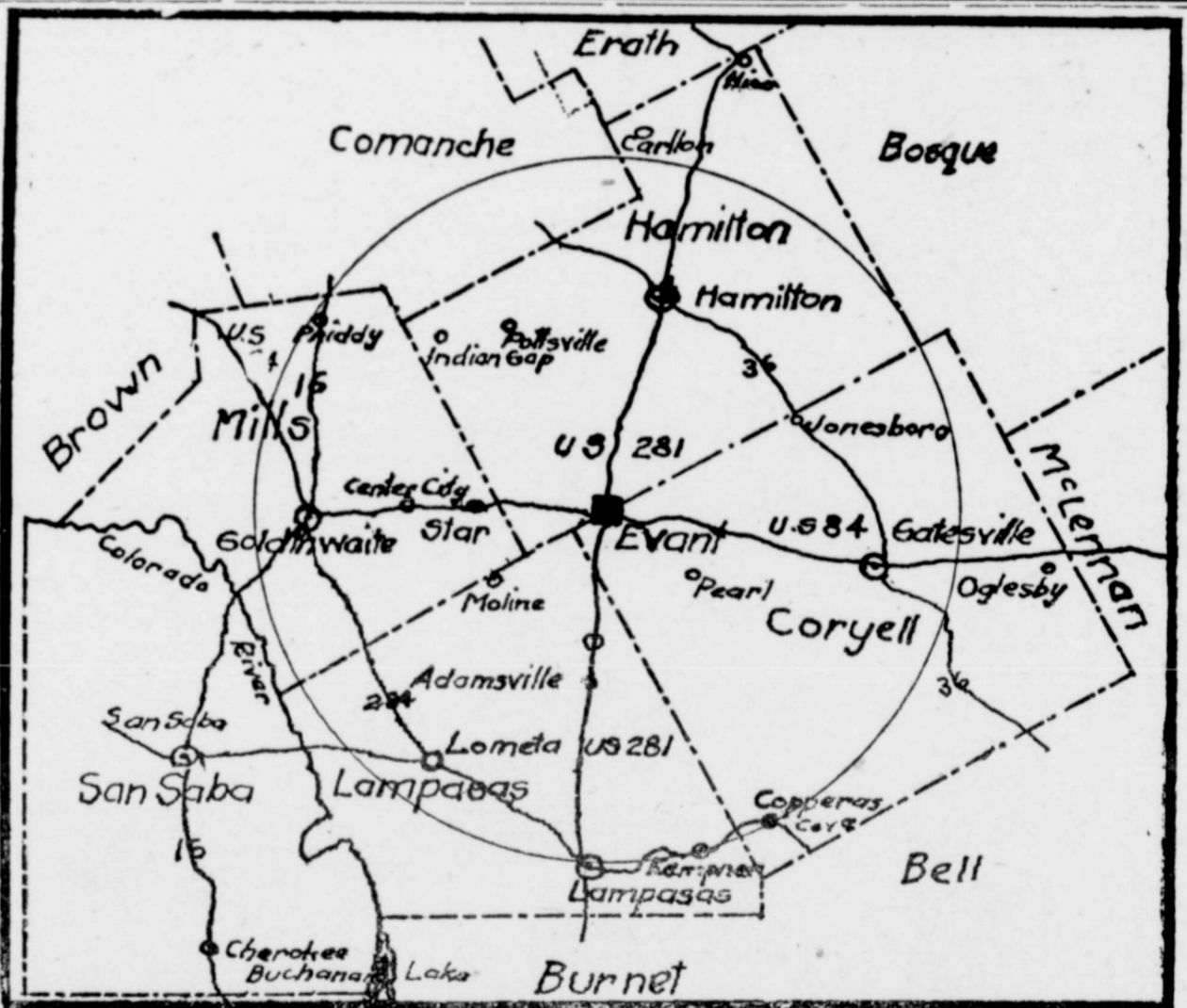
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Here's a map of the REA election which comes up September 18. Evant is after the location of the REA office. The Association does not own a building at Hamilton, and there has been an appropriation made to erect a permanent office building, at Evant, Hamilton, or maybe wherever the stockholders. (members) vote.

Evant presents these facts, for EVANT: In the corner of the 4 counties served by the REA; is in the center of the area served; has paved highways every direction for quick service in the district; more efficient operation from Evant; telephone systems in the territory; electricity is bought from LCRA at the sub-station at Evant quicker service on trouble calls; Hamilton is not served by REA, and office there would have to buy their electricity from another company; first REA pole in system was set at Evant; all points

can be reached by REA's inter-communication radio system which is to be installed on all service trucks, and this will be impossible unless the office is centrally located.

Savings by having the office at Evant: (estimates) lost time, riding trucks 16 miles from Hamilton to Evant, \$3,360; Truck operation, \$2,400; total, \$5,760.

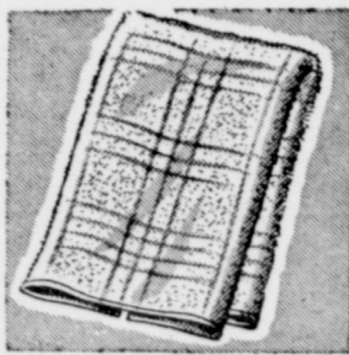

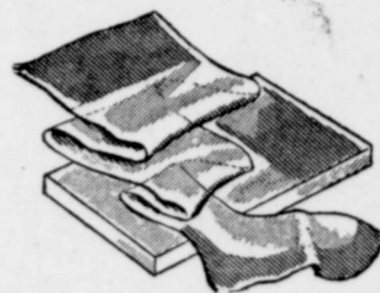

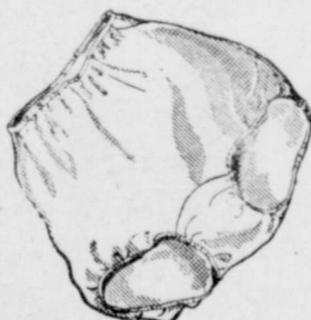
