

Coryell County is in the Lyndon Johnson column for U.S. Senatr by a margin of 148 votes, with 1816 votes cast out of a possible nearly 5,000. W. A. (Son) Shofner outclasses his opponent 1107 to 471, in the unofficial count. In Bell County, Shofner got 5,883 to Roark's 2,175. Other counties Other counties have not been heard from.

This Week in History

AUGUST 22 to **AUGUST 28**

161 years ago this week, on August 22, John Fitch, an inventor, launched his first successful steamboat..... just twenty years BEFORE Robert Fulton built his famed Claremont. Fitch's boat was about 45 feet long and was propelled by a series of paddles on each side. After many faults had been corrected, the boat moved along the Delaware river at a speed of 3 or 4 miles an hour. A second boat, about 60 feet long was built in 1788, by Fitch, with the paddles at the stern. In 1790, still another boat was launched by the eccentric inventor and ran almost 3,000 miles without accident during its first season.







Nations Make Choices

As drastic and as devastating as war is, I am confident that the economic troubles of many European countries are not traceable entirely to the aggravations of war. Famines, wars, oppressions: these are symptoms, not causes. Certain nations, like Switzerland, fare surprisingly well amidst the decay and chaos so common in Europe. Little Switzerland is not hollering for help. She is a free enterprise country.

Of course, Switzerland was not a belligerent, and hence was spared some spoilage of war. But now comes news that Belgium is prospering. What is the reason? Belgium chose a free economic system at the close of the war, when she might have taken some foolish panacea. This little country rightly chose a system of free enterprise and eco nomic freedom as the system most likely to bring recovery.

A Practical Way A reasonable degree of freedom is enjoyed by the Belgian people. Reports have it that the standard of living there is well up toward prewar levels. Newspaper reports have called attention to Belgium's airline, Sabena, which reported its net profit for the year at \$2,800,000. This has happened despite the fact it started out with practically nothing after the war. The airline had lost most of its equipment, and had to get help from the government to go ahead.

This is high contrast to what is happening to British airlines. Owned entirely by the socialist government and operated by them, the British airlines find difficulty in keeping their losses down to that figure. The difference is that Britain blundered in choosing, and Belgium chose wisely. Surely the European neighbors of Belgium will notice her good example. Planned economy sometimes looks good on paper, but it is free economy that permits people to use their initiative and work out their own salvation.

Matter of Teamwork

I am not at all surprised to hear these things about Belgium. I was there in the summer of 1946. One very remarkable thing impressed me. And in this there is a lesson for our own people: labor was at that time cooperating in Belgium with the management of industry and with government, in keeping prices down. America has not achieved that much teamwork, and we need it. Dangers still threaten in the battle against inflation.

In Belgium, labor leaders were saying that it was necessary to increase production and thereby bring down prices rather than put up wages and keep prices high. They reasoned that in the long run this would be the best for labor. It is not surprising that their standard of living is reported good by those who have recently toured the country. Freedom Wins

As a result of that policy, and because she kept her private ownership and private management of industry, Belgium has come back more rapidly than other European countries that were hit by war. This experience is only another link in the strong chain of evidence that free men working in a free economy are happier and better off than they could ever be under some kind of totalitarian government-any kind. Choosing freedom of enterprise, Belgium has shown wisdom.







True or False?

"American business doesn't make enough profit." Do you think that statement is true or false? Many people haven't the vaguest idea. Some folks have been fed propaganda which seems to show at every turn that the main purpose of industry is to exploit the poor man. These persons are side-tracked into the wrong answer. Why should we ever forget that American business under our system of freedom of opportunity has itself done more than anything else to make the poor man rich? That is industry's goal!

There is one group, however, that is well acquainted with the fact that business in general does not make the profit it ought to make to keep our system going ahead safely. This group is made up of communist and socialist agitators, as well as fellow-travelers. They know our system depends upon honest profit incentives. The communist program in this country is planned around the fact that the average American industry does not make enough profit. They are counting on that.

On Taking Over Their's is no short range program. It is long range. The commies do not believe that our industrial enterprises, on their present profit margins, can survive a temporary depression. These would-be dictators are strict believers in depressions. They always count on taking over after the next "boom and bust." What we must not fail to see is that our American system, if not held back, has the ability to triumph over economic setbacks. We always come back stronger than before.

It is unfortunate that the general public sees industry as making exorbitant profits. Actually, most people do not know that industry's profit level is as low as it is. Take a specific industry for example. According to surveys, many think the steel industry takes for profit as much as 25 cents out of every dollar of sales. This is wrong as can be. During the five recent "boom" years, just 3.5 cents out of each dollar taken in by the steel industry was profit. And much of this 3.5 cents was "plowed back under.

Profit Means Jobs

We look upon steel as being the leader of our manufacturing industries. Steel is basic. It supplies the raw materials and semi-processed materials which are the chief need of manufacturing plants today. Our daily lives are conditioned by the place of steel in modern civilization. This is one reason why we should be concerned about the decline of profits shown by the steel industry, on a long term basis.

Why would the agitators like profits to be less? They would like to see the government "take over" any All of the children of Mr. and of our major industries. That would bring them a step nearer their own goal: "taking over." How has the profit of steel and other industries, despite big increases in sales, been kept so low? The main reasons: enormous operating costs and heavy taxation. Only a very large and efficiently managed industry could operate successfully under these conditions.

Steel, like other industries, requires constant reinvestment of new funds. Moreover, a large portion of profits have to be returned to the business. Thrifty-minded cooks are turning to poultry for main dishes instead of higher-priced meats and they are especially proud of Roast Duck stuffed with Orange Sweet Potato Stuffing. Combine 3 cups hot mashed sweet potatoes with 1 tsp. salt, 1 cup lightly packed bread crumbs (corn bread if possible), 1 cup peeled diced oranges, 1 tbsp. grated orange rind, 3 tbsp. melted fat. This is enough stuffing for a 4-5 lb. duck. Lightly stuff neck, fold skin over back, fasten with skewers. Body cavity should be lightly stuffed, closed with skewers, then laced tips under and tie ends of legs together. After placing on back in shallow roasting pan, let excess fat escape by pricking skin across back, around legs, wings and tail. Roast uncovered in slow gas oven held at 325° for 2 hrs. Serves 4-6.

Housewives who want leisure, yet must serve tasty meals on time, have learned to plan entire oven meals cooked by clock control. All they do is set the clock which automatically lights the oven burner, then automatically turns off the gas when the meal is done. The clock that the cook can walk out of the servant do the cooking for her.

The removable drip trays underneath the top burners of your gas range are as easily cleaned as a dish. Just wipe with warm soapy water, dry thoroughly on bottom and top before replacing.


