"Our hospital was constructed and equipped under the Federal
Works Program at a net cost to
the county of approximately $\$ 44$,00.00 , and opened its doors fo Hospital on December 7, 1942. Hospital bonds were voted to the amount of $\$ 30,000$ and sold to the State Board of Education at an
interest rate of $\$ 2,000$ per year. At in addition to the two-cent tax levy voted with which to retire said bonds, a five-cent maintenance tax was also voted to be used
if necessary to supplement the if necessary to supplement the take care of operating expenses.
"Only $\$ 3,000$ of the maintenance tax funds collected have been operating expenses, all of which was transferred to the hospital operation, primarily for the purpose of acquiring a stock of drugs
and supplies. The balance of the funds received from the mainten ance tax levy, totaling approxi mately $\$ 23,000$ is invested in $21 / 2$
percent government bonds to crepercent government bonds to cre-
ate a reserve as against future demands of the hospital for th quipment or actual operating ex penses if the time comes in the pay ifs way.

boat was about 45 feet long and was propelled by a series of paddles on each side. After many faults had been corrected, the boat moved along the Delaware river at a speed of 3 or 4 miles an hour. A second boat, about 60 feet long was built in 1788, by Fitch, with the
paddles at the stern. In 1790 , still another boat was launched by the eccentric inventor and ran almost 3,000 miles without accident during its first season.
