**Location of Leon Dam For Temple, Belton is Settled**

Ain't THAT the truth They moved her back about a mile from the original location which will make it cover up just that much more Coryell County turf.

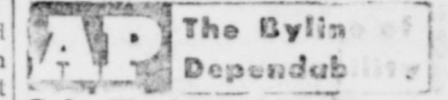
Anyway, Galveston Army Engineers announced in Temple Saturday that the proposed \$15,000,000 Leon River dam would be located 4 miles up stream from Belton and 7 miles up stream from Temple, 1 1/2 miles west of the point where the Belton Moody Highway crosses the river.

The site decided on would be located there, because the other, from core tests, showed the rock to be too cavernous to be sealed watertight.

A surveying crew under the direction of J. W. Savage for several weeks has been mapping the area where the dam will be constructed, using the \$500,000 appropriated by Congress this year for the work.

The dam will be 1,900 feet long and the maximum height will be 200 feet above the bed of the Leon River. Engineers estimate that it will take four years and \$20,000,000 to complete the project.

It is one of several water conservation measures planned for the Brazos River watershed.

### That Old "Controlled Credit" Started 20th: R. M. A. Explains.

The Associated Credit Bureaus of America has advised Evan J. Smith, head of the Retail Merchant's Association, regarding the new "credit controls" which came into being September 20.

Here, we brief it. 30 day accounts not affected; does not effect items under \$50, retail; only 12 kinds of consumer durable goods in regulations; 3 1/3 required for new cars, and if balance does not exceed \$1,000, must be paid within 15 months. If balance over \$1,000, 18 months, but payments of less than \$70 per month not permitted.

Besides autos, these are included, cookstoves, dishwashers, ironers, refrigerators, washing machines, air conditioners, radio, television, phonographs, sewing machines, vacuum cleaners, furniture and soft surface floor coverings, 20% down, please.

Regulations, Smith says, are just what the RMA has been trying to get folks to do—pay up, as you agreed to, buy what you can afford, and don't ride your credit. Credit is NO substitute for IN-COME.

Neither will it affect need for complete credit information in the community, or, keeping your credit good. Just makes it more so, both for customer, and the merchant.

### ACA News of Interest to Farmers And Stockmen

Farmers desiring to establish or improve permanent pastures by seeding adapted grasses and pasture legumes this fall should contact the ACA office for approval before seeding, advises Clois D. Stone. The seeds on which approvals may be obtained are: Buffalo, rescue, bluestem, grama, Indian grass, perennial and annual ryegrass, and bur clover. Some of these seed may be obtained under purchase order. The payment rates average about 65% of the total cost of the seed. Bur clover and annual ryegrass must be seeded in a mixture with or overseeded on at least one perennial grass.

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## Texans 'n Washington

Since the war more and more congressional wives are joining their husbands on overseas excursions.

Senator Tom Connally of Marlin and Rep. W. R. (Bob) Poage of Waco, along with Senator Carl Hatch of New Mexico, were chosen the southwestern delegates to the Interparliamentary Union meeting in Rome. The wives of the Texas legislators went with them.

Mrs. Frances Cotton Poage, formerly of Eastland and once clerk of the Texas Senate finance committee, sat down at a typewriter September 13 in the American embassy in Rome and wrote back an account of their travels in Germany, France, Switzerland and elsewhere after arriving in Europe by boat the latter part of August.

Excerpts from the letter follow:  
"Next morning we left (Frankfurt) by daylight, and drove thru the Rhine Castle country to the Dutch Border. It was a beautiful day, and the Rhine was pretty, and all the castles were interesting, but when we got into Cologne, I was sick at my stomach at the ruins.

"It is the worst destroyed of all the German cities, they say, much, much worse than Berlin. There were thousands of people going in and out of the big Cathedral, which was the only thing left standing, and you don't see any place for all the people to live, yet they are so few here. \* \* \*

"In Paris when I stood on the same balcony that Marie Antoinette and her children had stood on before they were taken away from Versailles to be executed, I felt that there was nothing else for me to see—but, in Rome, when you the burial place of Peter and

Paul, and stand in buildings more than 2,000 years old—and see the spot where Brutus stabbed Caesar—to say nothing of the Sistine Chapel, where the ceiling depicts the creation of man,—you realize that this is indeed the Old World, and that our country is sure NEW.

"Lawrence Westbrook is over here on business, and is here often it seems. We had dinner with him one night and his Rome representative who had been a prisoner of the English for four years.—a member of the old Roman aristocracy, incidentally,—and he sure gave the English heck, which made me wonder if he liked America any better. . . I think they all want what we have to give them, but my impression is that they don't care a hoot about us,—and even the Embassy staff tell you that they laugh at us behind our backs every time an American gives them a tip. We have all been warned that the hotel charge you about 22% for service, and that we can either give tips or not, as we like. But, of course everybody does it.

"Next to the language, the money is the most difficult. It is big enough in size to paper your house but amounts to so very little for its size. And, things are tremendously expensive, too. \* \* \*

"It was wonderful to hear from you, and I hope the Texas heat has subsided by now. . . It is gonna be hard for us, after being cool everywhere,—except Italy. . .

"But, if I can just get back where I can talk to people, and get some clean clothes, I think I can take anything in the good old U. S. A. \* \* \* I shall have to come home and study Roman History for six months in order to appreciate what I have seen."

## HAMILTON-CORYELL SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

F. A. Morris, cooperating with the district, has recently completed another waterway on one of his farms. According to F. A., waterways are the most important part of a terrace system. Where a farmer intends to terrace next year he should have his waterways constructed and vegetated. Waterways are hard to establish to permanent grasses after the terrace water is spilled into them. This work was done for Mr. Morris with heavy equipment under the supervision of County Commissioner Jake Clearman.

The technicians of the Soil Conservation Service have run terrace lines on the J. B. Edwards, Jake Hodel, Herman Hodel and Willie Hoppe farms, which are in the Osage Group. These terraces will be constructed in the near future.

Francis Powell, representing R. E. Powell & Co. has recently signed an agreement with the district board of supervisors for a complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan on the farm known as the old Chaney place near White Hall. He has already had constructed a waterway approximately 100 feet wide and 6 miles of small channel type terraces. As soon as the cotton is picked he will have the terrace system completed. This work is being done with heavy equipment belonging to Beat 3 of Coryell County.

Mr. John G. Morse, cooperater of the Southwest Camp Hood Group, has recently completed 1700 feet of waterway. This waterway will be established to Bermuda and native grasses to control erosion. Mr. Robert Gilliam did the work with heavy equipment belonging to the Gatesville Schools.

Douglas Gilmore, cooperater of the Turnersville Group, has completed 2 miles of channel type terraces. These terraces spill on to pasture land. The Gatesville School constructed these terraces with heavy equipment.

Twenty-three Baptist churches of Coryell Association will join with more than one thousand Texas churches in hearing a state wide Baptist radio broadcast on Wednesday, October 6th. On an 8:15 program originating in Dallas, Dr. J. Howard Williams, state executive secretary, will present the enlarged project for Texas Baptists for the coming year.

This is to be the first time in the history of the organization that the Baptist General Convention of Texas has used the means of radio to speak to over 1,000 congregations at the same time. Fifteen frequency modulation radio stations located in every section of Texas will carry the 45 minute program, which is to be the first ever broadcast over an entire network of FM stations in the state. This will also be the first time any FM stations in Texas have attempted to pick up and rebroadcast programs from other FM stations.

Besides Dr. Williams' message, the program is to include music by the choir and the All-Girl Chorus of the First Baptist Church of Dallas. Dr. R. Alton Reed, director of the radio department of the Baptist Convention, will announce the broadcast.

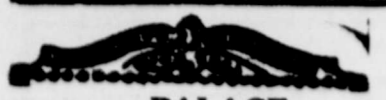
