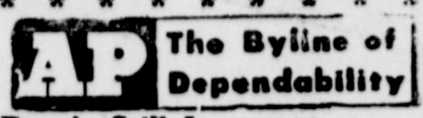

## Russia Still Is "Harrasing" In Berlin

BERLIN, Germany, Oct. 4. (AP) American Air Authorities said today they regard as just another "harrasing attempt" Russia's protest alleging hundreds of violations of flying regulations by the Western Allies on the Berlin Air Lift.

The Reds claim 656 violations by RAF, 86 by Yanks.

The Russians continue mum on the vigorous protest made by America against buzzing two American supply planes by nine Yak fighters in the corridor.

## Russia Says UN Has No Right On Charges

PARIS, France, October 4. (AP) Russia told the United Nations Security Council today it had no right to consider the West's charges that the Soviet blockaded Berlin menaces world peace.

Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Vishinsky declared the West's demand devoid on any ground, as it does not fall within the scope of the Council and said the issue should go before the Big Four Council of Foreign Ministers.

First, of most import to most of us, is this thing: Fire Prevention!

When you're writin' such as this, naturally, personalities creep in. So. As we've reiterated, our insurance is out in February, or about. We bought with the maximum fire credit, and we're going to have to buy with the maximum fire penalty, which means, when we DO pay up again, it's going to cost us (and by golly, you, too, when you pay yours), 35% more than it did when we bought 5 years ago. That's the reason, everytime you hear a fire call, we say: "Insurance goin' up"

Altho, we've never had a fire we think they're silly! Silly, because, most of them are downright carelessness, penny-pinching, and plain foolishness.

When me moved in this building, the wiring would absolutely run an electrician crazy, not to mention a fire insurance inspector, or agent, or company. Most of our wiring now, is in metal conduit, and it's higher'n heck, but FIRES are higher.

When theyfirst turned on the "juice" in our houses, we had a "drop" in each room—remember? Nothing else. No electric fans, refrigerators, cooling devices, floor lamps, table lamps, washing machines, dishwashers, deep-freezers, irons, ironers, radios, heaters, etc. etc. etc.

But, yes, BUT, in these self same houses, wired for a "drop" in each room while a 40 to 75-watt globe, with the "juice" running thru those two little old insulated wires, (wires now probably crystalized, and rubber insulation if any, worn off or rotted) are STILL struggling to carry this load.

Can you imagine, if this was water, a 1/4 inch pipe, and you tried to force a 6 inch main's water thru it. to carry this load, what would happen! Naturally, there are fires!

Then, there is that, or them, or those, other things, grassy alleys, yards, vacant lots, old everything, etc., etc.

Aw, you could go on for eons about this Fire Prevention stuff in Gatesville, and scratch the surface—never

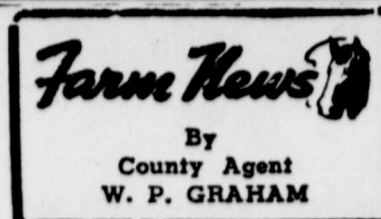
#### Louisiana Chicken Gumbo

(With oysters when they are in season . . . or shrimp alone at all seasons of the year)

- 4-5 Pound chicken, jointed
- Salt, pepper
- 1/2 lb. ham, cubed
- 4 tbs. fortified margarine
- 4 tbs. shortening
- 1/2 cup onions
- 3 qts. boiling water
- 4 tbs. cornstarch
- 2 tbs. cold water
- 1/2 lb. okra
- 1 tb. minced parsley
- 1/4 tsp. thyme
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 dozen oysters (when in season)
- 1 dozen raw shrimp, shelled and cleaned

Salt and pepper the chicken. Saute to golden brown with the cubes of ham, in the melted margarine and shortening. Add onions, turn heat very low and continue to saute gently until onions are soft. Add boiling water. Cut okra into inch-long pieces, dropping into the boiling pot, as you cut. Mix cornstarch with the cold water to smooth paste. Add parsley, thyme, bay leaf. Add oyster liquor, if oysters are to be used. Cover and simmer gently 1 to 1 1/2 hours until chicken is very tender. Add seafood. Cook gently another 6-8 minutes. Serve steaming hot with boiled rice—or with boiled grits. Serves 6-8.

**The Texas Poll  
The Statewide Survey of Public Opinion**

By **JOE BELDEN**,  
Director, The Texas Poll

AUSTIN, Texas, October 2.—In the face of growing U. S. participation in international politics, isolationist policy today appeals to only a small part of the Texas public.

A statewide survey by The Texas Poll shows:

1. Seven out of every ten adults believe the U. S. should continue to help Europe solve its problems.

2. About six out of every ten would maintain or increase the present level of U. S. aid to Europe. Three out of ten think the U. S. is doing too much. One out of ten is undecided.

3. In the recent U. S. Senatorial runoff, isolationist-minded voters tended to favor Coke Stevenson over Lyndon Johnson, but only a small margin. A majority of Stevenson supporters, as well as the Johnson backers, want U. S. aid to Europe kept as at the present or stepped up.

The foreign policy issue was injected into the recent senate race by Johnson. He himself was all-out for aid to Europe, and he claimed that Stevenson was an isolationist who would scuttle aid to Europe.

Analysis of The Texas Poll's survey shows Stevenson is favored by a small majority of isolationist-minded voters, while Johnson has the support of more than half the voters who think the U. S. should help Europe with its problems.

**That Bogota Affair**

The bloody uprising which almost wrecked the Inter-American Conference at Bogota recently was headlined in the American press. Most observers thought it was just another South American political upheaval. Yet, when the smoke of pillaging, the looting, and the dynamiting had ceased, it was evident that this rebellion had something different. The new ingredient was the amazing precision of timing and the speed with which the events moved.

When American newspaper men who were in Bogota had time to think about it, they discovered that this "revolution" was pulled off with the same practiced techniques that European Communists have been known to use. It was also discovered, after the haze cleared, that our own State Department, including our Bogota foreign office, had received warnings out of Chile that something was afoot. Yet, nothing prevented the uprising.

**"Mass" Action**

First a liberal party leader was shot down on the street under circumstances that indicate the Communists may have killed one of their own, just to get things started. The assassin was stomped to death and mutilated so that identification was impossible. After that, just like clockwork, mobs in widely scattered areas got busy. They grabbed radio stations and asked the "masses" to go forward to the attack.

The Communists then really took to their soapboxes. They openly identified themselves as Communists and called for comrades to raid any place that might have weapons. Other mobs attacked public buildings, including the famed Capitol where the Inter-American Conference was being held. Yet another mob dragged the assassin's corpse to the Colombian president's mansion, where it was flung across the doorstep for the rest of the afternoon.

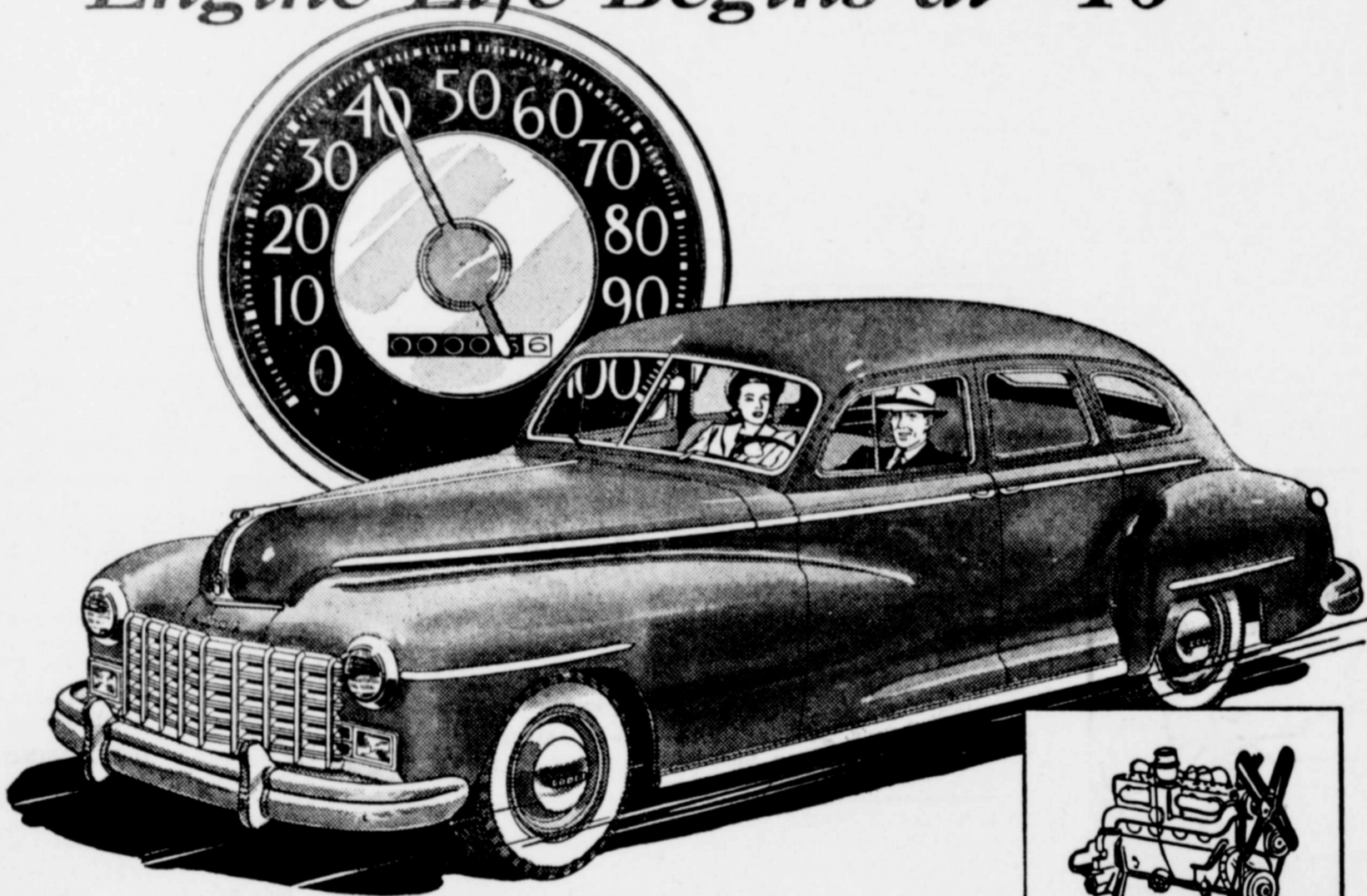
**Lawless Fanaticism**

What happened to the police? They had disappeared. Nor did the army show up. The mob, therefore, went about freely burning automobiles and wrecking buildings. Though the army was said to be critically short of gasoline, yet plenty was available for the gangs. Plenty of dynamite also. While these things were happening in Bogota, key centers elsewhere were being burned and pillaged in the same manner.

Why am I recounting all this? I want to demonstrate that Communism is not a law-abiding political party. It is a lawless fanaticism. We have had a demonstration right here in this hemisphere which shows the type of terrorism and force Communists use to gain political power. What Communists have done in Russia and in European riots and uprisings, they will do again wherever they can, in whatever countries they find sleeping on the job.

America must not be lulled to sleep by the sweet words of misguided idealists, who are being used by revolutionists the world over. There are few real Communists in America. There are not many Americans that desire to join lawless mobs. But Communists will stop at nothing which will cause strife and division among our people. We must know the methods of Communists, for if we do not anticipate the harm that even a few of them can do, we stand to lose what is America.

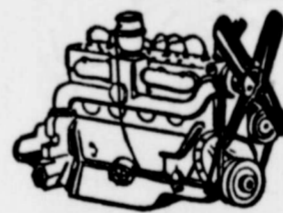

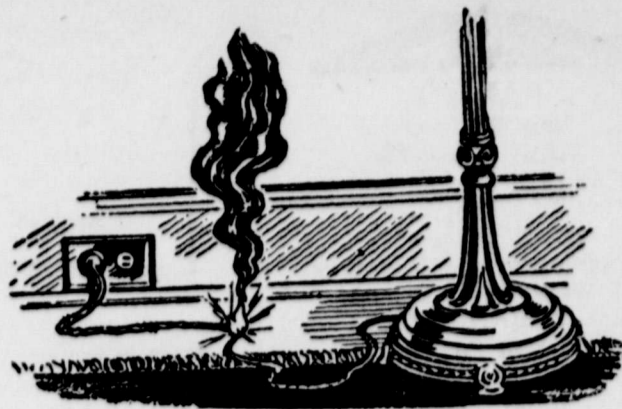

Cat put in gas chamber, lethal gas ignited when cat's fur rubbed. It was Static Electricity.

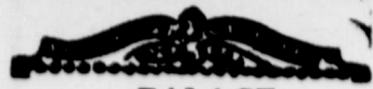

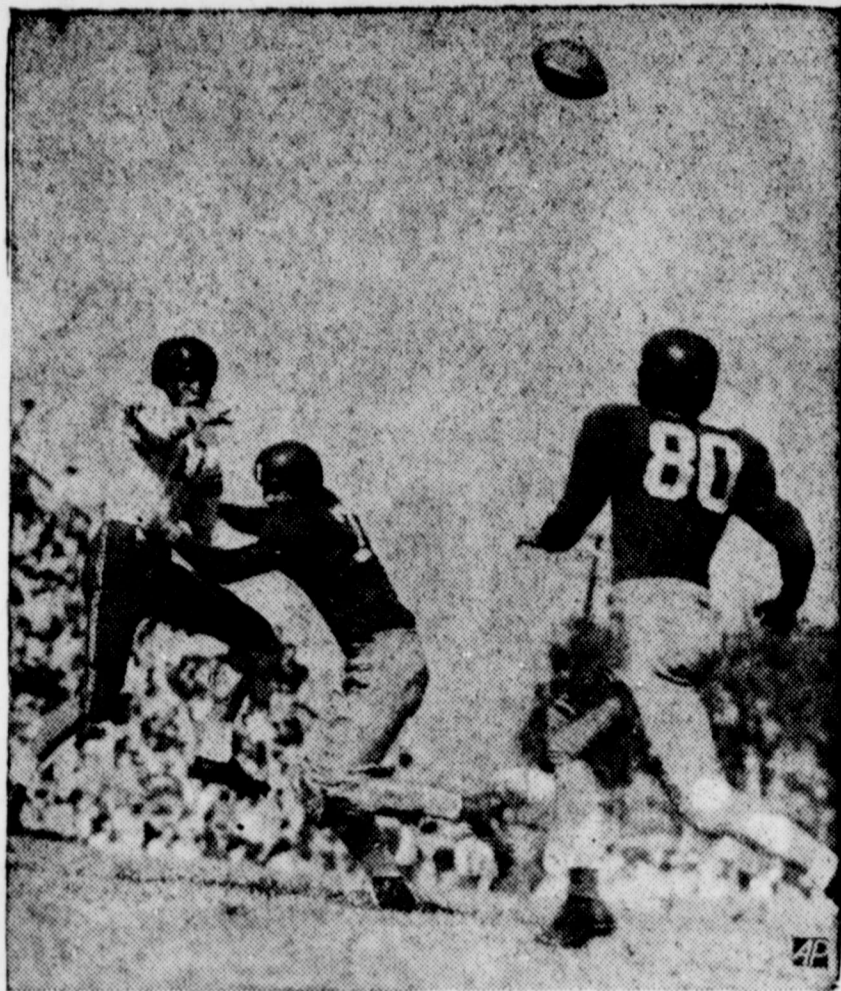

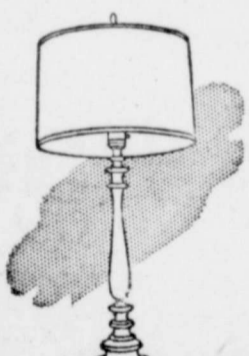
