Sammy Franklin Broome, 5, was burned to death Tuesday in a cotton picker's car near McGregor. The child, son of Mr. and Mrs. Morris Broome, formerly of near Pancake, was burned when he crawled into an old model coupe and the car caught fire, or was set.  
Broome said he had left cigarettes and matches on the seat of the car, and supposed Sammy had found them.  
A dog, the child's friend, ran to Sammy's father, barked, and started for the car. Mrs. Broome, thinking Sammy was not in the car, but had gone to the house, ran there to see. Mr. Broome went with the dog to the car and the boy's remains were found in the turtle back. No one had seen the fire. They thought the boy had set the fire and was hiding, until his remains were found.  
The Broomes had lived near McGregor nine months, coming from Pancake where Mr. Broome's brother, M. T. Broome lives. Besides Sammy, the Broomes have five children who survive, three sons, Howard, Donald and Harold and two daughters Irma Jean and Barbara June. They were in school at the time of the tragedy.

## Fire Prevention Committeemen Meet: Prevention Planned

Members of the Chamber of Commerce Fire Prevention Committee met in the Chamber of Commerce office Tuesday evening and made extensive plans for cutting present fire losses, and preventing further loss.  
A committee composed of Raymond Ward, chairman, Buddie Biffle and Ernest Cummings was named to study the technical side of the work with the inspectors, with the view of presenting recommendations to the City Council along prevention lines, including ordinances, building codes, and whatever the inspectors recommend. It had been previously voted to have an out of town engineer or inspector to look the situation over.  
The first committee named was the Education Committee, named by the body, and these included Oran Bates, chairman, John Frank Post and one other.  
Chairman R. D. Foster headed the discussion, assisted by President Dawson Cooper of the Chamber of commerce, and Bill Thomson acted as secretary.  
Others present were B. L. McClellan, B. K. Cooper, Jack Straw, J. Sherrill Kendrick, Dr. E. E. Lowery, Mrs. Floyd Zeigler, Mrs. K. R. Jones, Paul Hensler and Mat Jones.  
Mr. Cooper gave out these fire loss figures on Gatesville:  
Last year's fire insurance was \$480,107 in Gatesville, with the maximum 15% penalty or bad record, which cost \$41,830, the 15% penalty amounting to \$6,277, and the loss of the 25% credit we used to have made us spend \$10,426 more or, the EXTRA cost to property owners was a total of \$16,733.  
The coverage of Gatesville with credits and no penalties could be bought for \$31,374, but it cost \$48,107; the difference did no body any good, not even the local insurance agents.

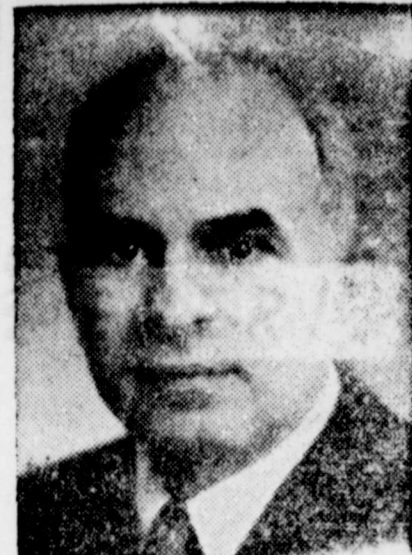

- 1/2 cup fortified margarine
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 squares melted chocolate
- 1 2/3 cup flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 cup milk

Cream together margarine, sugar, and salt. Stir in melted chocolate and beaten eggs. Sift flour, salt, and baking powder together and add alternately with milk. Add vanilla. Bake in two layers (8-inch) or square flat cake pan (9-inch) in a moderate oven (350° F.) for 20 to 25 minutes. Ice with chocolate icing (recipe below), and sprinkle top with coarsely chopped nuts.

**Chocolate Icing**

- 2 tbs. fortified margarine
- 1 egg yolk
- 2 squares melted chocolate
- 1 1/2 cups confectioners sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons cream

Blend margarine, salt, and egg yolk together. Add melted chocolate. Stir in sugar, beating to a spreading consistency.
