



men who run for high judicial of hy fice, let alone the qualifications of the candidates. They cast their ballots by hunch and accident. Having no solid facts upon which to base their choice, they are often lured into voting for a man by nothing more than the look and sound of his name.

A number of leading lawyers are advocating an end to this hitand-miss system of electing high court judges in Texas. They are backing a plan which calls for a non-political commission to nominate the judges, the governor to appoint them, and the voters to decide periodically which ones if any ought to be removed.

What are the prospects for such a change?

Only by constitutional amendment approved by the voters will it be possible to change the system of electing judges. Most voters will admit they don't know much about judges, but they are not ready to give up their right to elect members of the Supreme Court. It will take a lot of campaigning to persuade a majority of the voters that a system of nonpolitical appointment is better.

On July 24, more than a million Texas Democratic voters took part in nominating four men to serve on the Supreme Court. Three weeks later, a statewide survey by the Texas Poll showed that only 30 percent of the qualified voters and only 35 per cent of the persons who actually voted could recall by name one or more of the winning candidates.

It was not that most voters forgot the names of the judges. The fact is that they never learned them. A statewide survey of qualified voters three weeks before the July 24 election showed at that time only 16 per cent could recall by name one or more of the men whowere running for Supreme Court.

Comparison of the two surveys indicates that the publicity which attended the election helped acquaint a good many voters with the names of the principal candidates. But it was not enough to inform a bare majority. It seems clear that the great majority voted blindly when they marked their ballots for Supreme Court judges.

Farmers who need additional legumes should contact the ACA office, Stone advises, before obtaining the phosphate, as they may be eligible for ACA assistance in buying this phosphate. The county committee has lifted the limit on phosphate to the individual, provided the farm limit has not been exhausted and provided the phosphate is to be applied to winter legumes at the rate of 200 pounds pr acre.

Farmers who are contemplating terracing during 1949 may receive payment under the 1948 program on constructing waterways required by the new terrace system. Approvals will be issued for this practice even though the farm limit has already been used on other 1948 practices. Waterways should be constructed and vegetated before the terraces are constructd, Stone points out, since it is vry difficult to adequately protect the waterways from erosion when both terraces and water ways are constructed at the same



Total cost of feed per case of gegs figures \$5.60, and this leaves a profit of \$9.40 per case, making the poul-




