What for today? That's always the question 'long about 2 o'clock, Mons. and Thurs. 'Nother reason we're glad the News isn't daily.

Anyway, we have rodeos, water carnivals, school carnivals, football games, baseball games, basketball games, revival meetings, and just about everything physical, eye appealing and spiritual, but the aesthetic or intellectual? Well, not much. ALL of these are good, and the NEWS has always been back of them all, not dragging; pushing.

Now with the prospect of a Concert Season which will bring three single artists, maybe, a pianist with Ear'e Spicer and then Dorothy Kendrick, and an 87-piece symphony orchestra, with, no doubt, others, such as property men, advance men, etc., of The Dallas Symphony Orchestra, the memberships are NOT selling as they should.

Again, with this in prospect, and if you, like we, can't play anything but a record machine, either, in our opinion on this Concert Season ought to go over. Total cost for the entire three shows will be about \$3,000. Rodeo people, whose show has a greater natural appeal, pay around \$12,000 for that, and that's very fine.

Every town HAS a rodeo, but NOT every town can have the Dallas Symphony Orchestra. It'll take 500 adult memberships at six dollars to do this. At the Rodeo, it's \$1.75 or more per performance, and at last season's concerts, the tariff at the door (was \$1 plus tax).

Since every town has a rodeo, the value of a rodeo as a civic advertising medium is doubtful. With a Symphony Orchestra which most towns can't have, it's an identification, a free advertisement, and a decided civic asset.

To see 87 or more people working in unison, hitting or blowing at the direction of one man at the right instant, is something we could enjoy even if we hadn't heard since we'd been born. We don't see how anyone could fail to enjoy, in some way or another (if they tried) seeing an organization of this world-wide repute in concert.

Yes, Coryell County and Gatesville are going to miss what they are going to miss, if they fail to buy memberships in the Coryell Municipal Concert Association, the cost of which is \$5 plus tax for adults and \$2 plus tax for children for the three proposed numbers of the Concert Season.

People have asked us: "Why can't we get Golden Gloves back?" Now, that it's going good and making money ((which the concert association is not doing, and won't). Well the answer to that one, is we had Golden Gloves for two years, pioneered it in Central Texas without the support of our town and county, and now, they want it back!

Is the Concert Association going the same way?

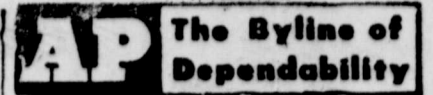

Teamwork Needed Between Congress and White House Dewey Says: Change a Must

Governor Thomas E. Dewey said today the job ahead of America calls for teamwork between Congress and the White House, and that that calls for a new administration.

President Harry S. Truman declared he had finally "smoked out" his opposition on campaign issues and that what the Republicans offered was a "Me, Too, Program."

Both candidates were in the midwest, Dewey at Joplin, Mo., and the President at Mankato, Minnesota.

ITU Ruled in Contempt Of Court by Swygert

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. Oct. 14. (AP)—Federal Judge Luther M. Swygert today ruled that the International Typographical Union is in contempt of court because it was insisting on closed shop in its contracts with newspapers.

The judge, who issued an injunction against the printers Union last March, ordered the Union to prove within 10 days that it is abiding by his injunction, based on the Taft-Hartley Labor Relations Act.

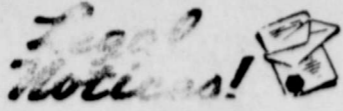

Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District Activity Notes

Knox Williams, James Sharp, cooperators of the Northeast Turnersville Group, have completed two miles of small channel type terraces. These terraces spill onto Buffalo grass and were constructed with heavy equipment belonging to the Gatesville Public School.

E. & R. Wright, cooperators of the district, are constructing three waterways on the farm they recently purchased. This farm is northeast of Turnersville. They plan to grass these waterways after construction and terrace the whole farm next summer.

C. C. Cheatham, a cooperator of the Northeast Turnersville group, is having a waterway constructed across his farm. This waterway is a continuation of the waterway from the E & R Wright farm.

Robert Whisenhunt, a cooperator of the North Ater group, has completed another 1/4 miles of small channel type terrace and his waterways. This waterway will permit Mr. Whisenhunt to complete his terrace system next year. Small grain will be drilled into the waterway for temporary protection. Next February or March they will be seeded to KR Yellow Bluestem grass for permanent protection. This work was done with heavy equipment belonging to the Gatesville Schools.

Bert Davis, a cooperator of the Arnett Group, is having 3 waterways constructed. After construction they will be seeded to small grain and clover. Next spring native grasses will be seeded for permanent vegetation. After the native grass is established in these waterways they will be used to take care of his terrace water.

C. F. Oney, cooperator of the Pearl Group, has completed approximately 1 mile of large ridge type terraces on his farm and is having 3/4 mile constructed on the W. A. Cox farm which he operates. These terraces were constructed with a whirlwind terracer belonging to Wes Scott.

STARTING THE CONCRETE
