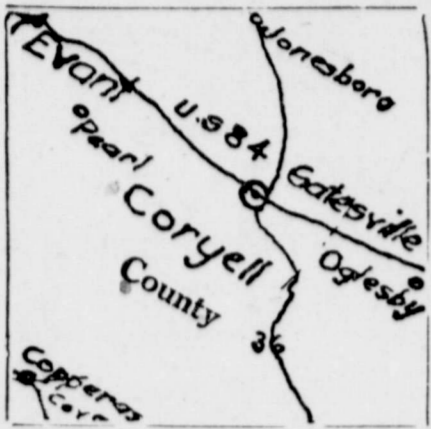


Cen-Tex Firemen Convene Here In May '49

Bert Allen Floyd of Purmela has announced his candidacy for College of Pharmacy representative to The University of Texas student assembly. The election will be October 20.

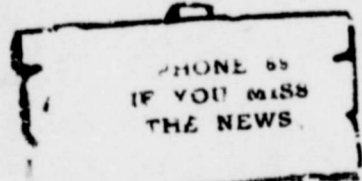

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This Job Of Being A School Teacher: Handed To Us!

Here's a story handed to us! It tells about the teacher, and his, or her troubles, and is worth your time, and, we quote: "Thousands of years ago Erasmus said that teaching is a labor-

ious task. Do you know that teaching is one of the very few positions in which an employe never clears her desk—so to speak? (She ought to be in the newspaper business!) Her job is akin to that of a good mother. Hers is the responsibility of making plans for thirty or forty children instead of one, two or three. These thirty or forty young individuals depend upon her to lead, guide, and direct them thru almost eight or more of their waking hours. Can a teacher leave her job at school?

"Not only must she have something new each day. She must make each child feel at ease among his classmates so that he may have a receptive mind for learning. Here is a child who has so little that must wear the same clothes every day and he is not always clean or as well dressed as the child sitting beside him. Another child has an abnormal manner of speaking, so his classmates laugh when he speaks. Still another—more fortunate—has everything he desires, materially, and does not exhibit a democratic spirit among his classmates. Another is overbearing and has a tendency to "bully" his fellow students. Does the teacher leave

WHAT'S Your trouble, ga?

He cited the instance of a reporter who was sent to interview a woman billed by the circus as "the homeliest woman in the world."

The reporter interviewed the woman, wrung from her a background of hardship and unpleasantness which had left her completely untouched. She had learned to rise above misfortune which had touched her. When he had finished with his interview, he decided it was impossible to write about the homeliness of the woman because she actually had become beautiful in his eyes.

Mr. Powers of course makes his living as agent for pretty women. Primarily, he needs girls who will photograph well. A lot of them don't need radiant beauty to appear before a camera. However, Mr. Powers is noted for his ability to se-

gregate at Nordheim.

A German in the Russian Zone of Germany, from near Tangermunde, Germany, has written a song and dedicated it to Rev. Kramer, and the Nordheim Lutheran Church.

Her simplicity despite the world of education she now lives in, leaves everyone amazed. Her own wardrobe is scanty but she always looks neat and well-groomed. That inner glow that Powers describes shines from her pretty blue eyes. It's something she couldn't buy if she won Fort Knox in a beauty contest.

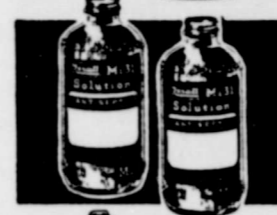

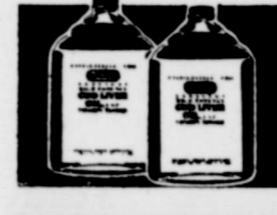

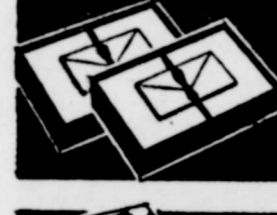

- 1 teaspoon pickling spices
- 1 teaspoon salt

Have bones removed from meat at market (but be sure to carry them home). Spread meat open and flat. Season with salt and pepper. Chop watercress rather fine. Add minced parsley, onion, red pepper, celery salt. Spread this filling over the cut side of the meat. Roll (like a jelly roll), folding in the "fatty" ends of meat. Tie into firm roll. Cover with boiling water; add vinegar, salt, pickling spices, meat bones. Simmer, covered, 2 hours. Remove meat roll from water. Place in baking pan. Spread meat with the margarine, cover with the bread crumbs and season with salt and pepper. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) about 45 minutes, until crumbs are browned. Remove strings before serving. Serve hot or cold. Water in which meat was cooked may be used for a sauce to be served with hot meat, or, if meat is to be served cold, use as a base for soup.

Sauce from Broth

To serve with hot meat. Brown 4 tablespoons flour in frying pan (without fat). Add 2 tablespoons margarine after flour is brown. Mix to smoothness. Add hot broth; stir over heat until creamy. If desired, add a teaspoon of sugar to make a sweet-sour sauce.

AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 16.—Less than two-thirds of the voting Democrats in Texas can pass the loyalty test which the State Executive Committee has put to local and state officials of the party.

Acting under a resolution of the State Democratic Convention, Chairman John C. Calhoun of the executive committee has asked all officials of the party to pledge

their allegiance to Harry S. Truman as Democratic candidate for president. Those who fail to make the pledge may be asked to resign their positions in the party organization.

If the same loyalty test were put to all persons who voted Democratic in the recent primary elections, the State Executive Committee would find more than 300,000 nominal Democrats who might be considered "disloyal."

Hornets Lay Away 2nd Conference Game: Worsens Gamely West

Let's worry about one at a time, the next worry is West!

Itasca's Wampus Cats are history, and the history of the 1948 GHS Hornet series, looks now, like Bob Woodruff's Baylor Bears—still on top, but most of the worries in front. Too, both clubs by the early season prognosticators, experts, and Monday Morning Quarterbacks, gave neither a chance to finish "in the running" in their respective conferences—they may not yet!

Next week, with West on "foreign soil" we'll probably give you the play-by-play, but as long as the games are at "home" you ought to be there and see for yourselves.

But, let's look back, like the lawyers do, and see what happened Friday evening in Holmes Stadium, in Gatesville.

Simply started off with a bang, the Hornets taking Itasca's kick on the north end, and moved down toward a marker successively until they reached the 32, and then Davidson passes veer to Roberts, Painter puts it on the 25, McMahan there. Davidson takes from Painter, stopped by Davis and Dyer on the 10; Painter puts

it on the 5; Daniels puts it on the 2, an Itasca offside refused by the Hornets, and then, Davidson puts it over and Painter adds extra thru the line.

Second marker started in the fading moments of "the quarter, Cockerham kicks to Painter on the 50, stopped by Pruitt after 10; Painter hands to L. Meeks, who rambles to the 38. Then "star" Roberts (Burr, to you) took on the 38, and with the nice blocking by Painter and Daniels, etc., and a cutback on his own, picking up interference, he goes over standing and Daniels placekicks, and it's 14-0.

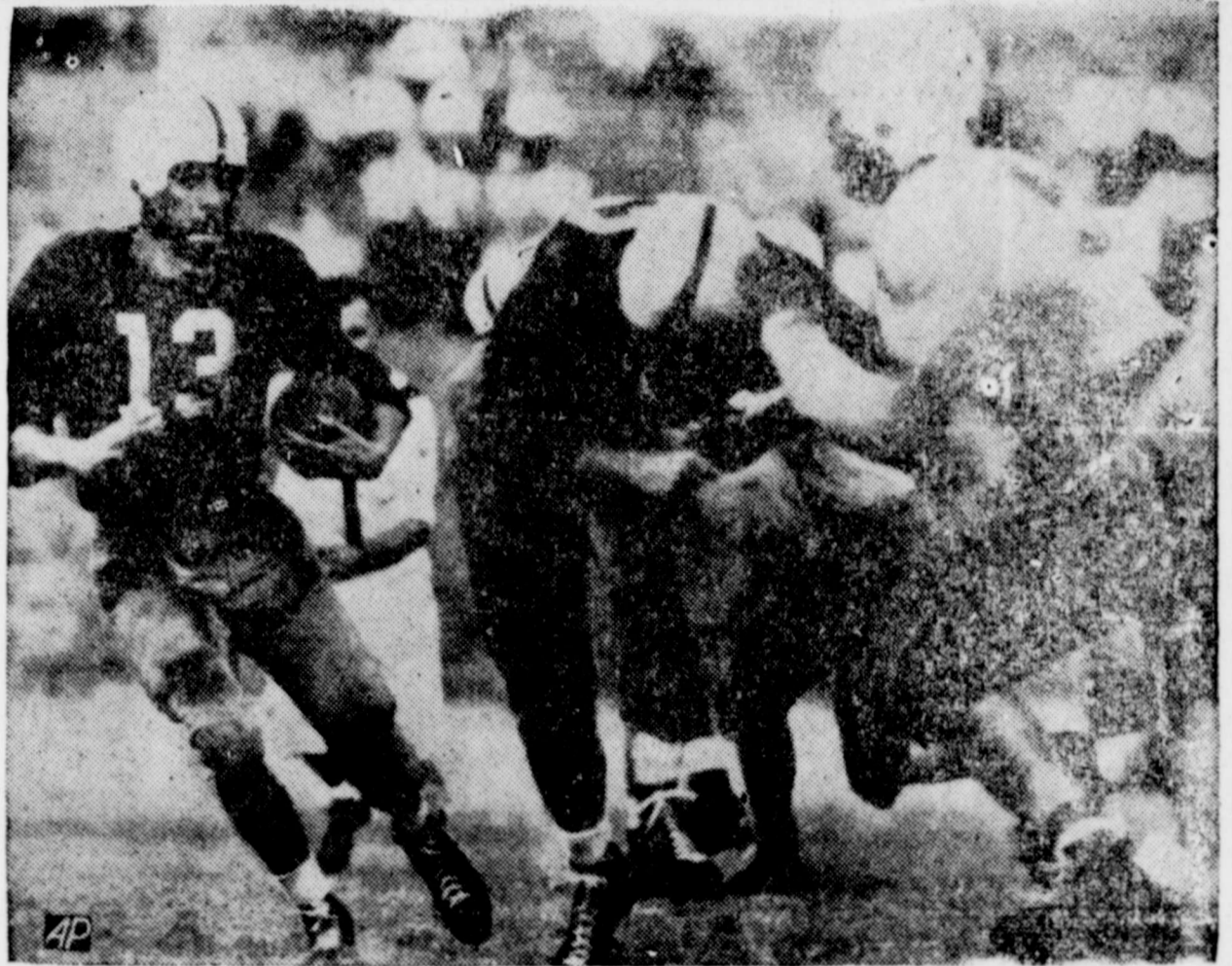
In the 2nd, too, the Cats got busy, making it look like a ball game at the half. Davidson punted to Cockerham on the 30, Baize knocking him out on the 37. Then Sid Pruitt (not our principle), got loose with good interference, and ankles beautifully, going first at right, and cutting back to the left 63 yards run for the touchdown, and left the Hornets standing. Davis kicked extra, and the half ends before any more markers.

Right after the half, Painter intercepted a Cat pass on their 34, and Davidson on a "lay-out" play, races down the sideline taking Roberts' pass and runs over after taking it on the 25. McMahan blocks the kick for extra. That was all for the 3rd.

Finishing the scoring for the evening, the Hornets pushed over the first of these with a series of 1st Ds, then, from the 5, Painter goes to the right, and goes over standing, and Davidson passes too hard for the extra. Then, Davidson intercepts Cockerham's pass on the 25, returning to 50, and then passes to Dickie on the 40, and he's nailed on the 37; Roberts weaves to the 27; Roberts nearly knocks Dickie out, when he places ball on the 3, then Painter carries, is hemmed, pitches to Daniels, he goes over, and that's all for the game.

Bradley saved the Hornets at least six points when he nabbed Huffman as he was away and put it on the 40 yard line. Later, Painter intercepted on the Hornet 25, turning the play the other direction. Baize did some nice work the Hornet line, Collins, Meeks, Frakks, Brookshire and Walker played well. Probably the most consistent backfielder was Painter, Roberts showing well at times, Daniels and Davidson, but Davidson's heaves were wide and too hard for receivers.

For the Wampus Cats, we'll take McMahan, Davis and the Bons boys, in the line and Pruitt, Huffman and Cockerham in the backfield.

OCTOBER 17 to OCTOBER 23

On October 17, 1781—167 years ago this week—Gen. George Washington completed a master stroke of military strategy that ended the war between America and Great Britain. Washington, arranging his troops at New York as if to launch a heavy attack, suddenly wheeled his army to the west. He had almost reached Philadelphia before the British were aware of his real aim.
