OCTOBER 17 to OCTOBER 23

On October 17, 1781-167 years ago this week-Gen. George Washington completed a master stroke of military strategy that ended the war between America and Great Britain. Washington, arranging his troops at New York as if to launch a heavy attack, suddenly wheeled his army to the west. He had almost reached Philadelphia before the British were aware of his real aim. By then it was too late. Washington's armies lay across al' avenues of escape by land, and the French fleet, which had helped Washington in his battles, blocked escape by sea. It was then that Gen. Charles Cornwallis surrendered the British armies. conceding to America the victory.
