Dave Curry's Aerial Advertising First Of Kind In The U. S. A.

At Friday evening's football game, Coryell County people got to see a FIRST!

Dave Curry, local air instructor at Scott's Airport, has invented a neon sign that is attached to the bottom wing of an airplane, spelling out an advertising message in neon lights.

In cooperation with George O. Jones, Waco bread manufacturer, Mr. Curry has designed this new advertising medium and patents have been applied for to cover it fully.

The neon tubes on the wing are protected by aluminum channels, and the power is from an air-current ac 65 ampere generator secured to the landing gear strut.

The equipment, besides the neon tubes, includes 3 15,000 volt transformers, and the letters are four feet high and 2½ feet wide. The letters are interchangeable so any advertisement can be written on the bottom of the plane. Friday evening they were using JONES FINE BREAD, which was very good when directly over a crowd.

Mr. Curry expects to market the idea and patents when everything is cleared, either on a royalty basis, or manufacturing them and installing on planes which he buys first, selling the complete equipment.

It started in a "ground loop" session with Curry, Jones and others, and Mr. Jones, being an air enthusiast, agreed to back Mr. Curry in the deal.

Two "Reportable" Fires This Week: One Man Is Injred: Kids Play

Bill Williams, electrician, was painfully, if not seriously burned Wednesday morning about 10 o'clock, when gas for an ice machine was ignited by a gas flame under the coffee urn at Meek's Cafe, corner 7th and Leon.

Mr. Williams was taken to the hospital and received treatment for burns on his hands, head and legs, the worst burns apparently being on his legs.

He was checking escaping gas in freezing equipment when the fire started. No estimate of the damage was made in either fire.

Courthouse Sanded Partly To Discover Deterioration

J. Sivadon, of Savidon Engineering Company, who's been throwing a concentrated sandstorm at the County Court House, said Wednesday, besides a "clean-up" job, sand blasting, also showed weaknesses in rock and cement construction, caused by weather and other strains.

By the sandblasting, these faults can be discovered and remedied before the faults and deterioration gets dangerous.

Houston Attorney Explains How to Vote Split Ticket Nov. 2

Lloyd Wheelock, state campaign manager for U. S. Senatorial Candidate Jack Porter of Houston, said that state headquarters in Houston had received thousands of requests for information on voting the split ticket in the general election.

According to Wheelock most of the requests come from Democrats and States' Righters who wish to vote for Mr. Porter but also support some candidate on their own ticket.

Wheelock said he had conferred with Steve Pinckney of Houston, prominent Texas attorney, who is active in Porter's campaign, and that Mr. Pinckney gave him the

following information: "It is possible for any citizen of Texas who is qualified to vote in the general election to cast that vote for the candidate of his choice, regardless of party affiliation. Article 2931 of the civil statutes of Texas, which was enacted in 1905, specifically provides for the voting of a split ticket in a general election. To vote for Jack Porter, or any candidate of your choice, it is only necessary to scratch the names of every other candidate on the ballot except those you wish to vote for."

Pinckney went on to say, "The so-called loyalty pledge does not apply to the election which will be held on November 2. This election is a general election which is held all over the United States on the same day. It is not a state or party primary. Our courts and the Attorney General's department of Texas have held this to be so for many years past."
