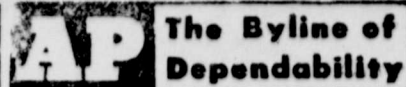

Distinguished Unit Citation, the  
Good Conduct Medal; the Canadi-  
an Defense Medal 1939 to 1945;  
the Canadian Trooper Wings for  
Airborne Infantry; and the Brit-  
ish 8th Army Ribbon for the Af-  
rican campaign.

### Jack Porter "Available" For Demos, Dixies and Republicans

"Political tradition will be broken in Texas in the General Election next Tuesday when Jack Porter, former Democrat, now a candidate on the Republican ticket, is elected to the U. S. Senate,"

manager, declared today. "Democrats, Dixiecrats and other Texans who believe in clean government and Honest elections, form the backbone of Jack Porter's strength," said Wheelock.

"Porter's strength is not confined to any one section of Texas or any group of citizens," said Wheelock. "It is statewide and comes from people in all walks of life. Texans are convinced that Porter is qualified to fill the high office of U. S. Senator and they know that Porter will be seated when elected."

Wheelock said that the belief of most Texans that fraud had been committed in several South Texas counties was one of the main factors in the swing to Jack Porter. He cited the overwhelming vote cast in Duval County in favor of Lyndon Johnson as one of the big reasons Texans will break party lines and split the ticket.

"The Democrats know that in Duval County, Lyndon Johnson received 4,611 votes and his opponent, Coke Stevenson, 40 votes in the runoff primary," said Wheelock. "Thus Johnson received more than 99.1 percent of all the votes cast in that county. This is a greater percentage than the Communist Party receives in Russia."

Jack Porter, who was born on a farm in Parker county, is a strong advocate of States' Rights, protecting the Tidelands for the school children of Texas, the Bill of Rights, and constitutional government. In his campaign he has stated he will bitterly oppose the FEPC legislation of both Republican and Democrats and will vote his own convictions and not those of any party.

"My first consideration will be whether it is good for my country and state," said Porter.

Porter, who was a private in World War I, came up the American way from a poor boy to a successful businessman. he has been married 31 years and has one son and two grandchildren. He is a member of the Methodist Church.

### Free College Education Offered By NROTC In 52 Colleges

A free college education is available to certain Coryell County High School seniors and graduates between the ages of 17 and 21.

If they meet physical and mental standards and pass an aptitude test they may attend, at Navy expense, one of 52 colleges and universities in which there are Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps Units. The University of Texas and Rice Institute are the Texas schools with NROTC units.

Applications for aptitude tests should be made before November 15. Principals of high schools, college deans and Naval recruiting stations will advise students on how to apply. Aptitude tests will be given December 11 in 21 Texas cities.

Successful applicants will be permitted to take any college course they desire but must include certain naval subjects. Students enrolled in this program will be deferred from induction under Selective Service Act. In return for payment of tuition, books and other normal fees and a \$50 per month living allowance the student is obliged to participate in naval drills and cruises and, if qualified upon graduation, to accept a commission in the regular Navy or Marine Corps. After two years of active duty, he may elect to transfer to the Reserve Corps and return to civilian life or he may request retention in the regular service.

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### This Week in History

October 24 to October 30

87 years ago this week, the first transcontinental telegraph was completed, and a new era of swift communication dawned in the United States. Samuel F. B. Morse had patented his telegraph in 1837. By 1849, lines had been erected as far west as the Missouri frontier. Huge mountains and great plains challenged further progress. General opinion held any plan to link the continent from coast to coast impractical and visionary. But the Pacific Telegraph Company was organized for the express purpose of attempting the feat. On October 24, 1861, the company's two crews, working from the west and east, met at Salt Lake City, Utah, and the first transcontinental telegraph was completed.

### JUDGES WANT RETIREMENT FOR BENCH SERVICE: AMENDMENT COMING UP

The first step toward creation of a more efficient and independent judiciary for Texas will be made November 2 by Texas voters if they approve a proposed constitutional amendment providing for judges retirement.

The amendment is one of eight to be voted on at the general election—it is last on the ballot—and will authorize the Texas Legislature to establish a judiciary system that will provide more economical and efficient administration of justice, a more independent judiciary, more competent competent judges and security for aged and infirm judges who have devoted their lives to public service.

Texas is one of only 17 states that do not provide for retirement of members of the judiciary. 31 states, including Louisiana, Arkansas and New Mexico, have adopted similar plans. Retirement for Federal judges has been in effect for many years.

The proposed amendment applies to only 47 appellate judges and 132 district judges over the State.

Proponents of the amendment

point out that the change will enable more qualified lawyers to seek positions of public service, and allow younger, more active men to decide the controversies of Texas citizens.

The proposed retirement system would help speed the trial cases by providing for special assignment of retired judges to active duty when and where needed to relieve congested dockets. If this

is not done, there will be a need for the establishment of additional courts, at increased cost to the taxpayer.

- Sift together . . . 3 1/2 cups flour
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 2 eggs
- Beat well . . . . . 1 cup sugar
- Gradually add . . . . .
- Beat until light and fluffy. Add . . . . .
- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted
- Add flour mixture to egg mixture alternately with . . . 1 cup milk

Turn out on floured board and roll 1/4 inch thick and cut with floured doughnut cutter. Fry in hot deep fat (360°-370° F.) 2 to 3 minutes, or until lightly browned, turning doughnuts when they rise to the top and several times during cooking; drain on absorbent paper. Makes 2 dozen.
