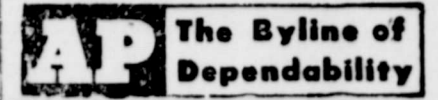

### PRISON MODERNATION IS VOTED

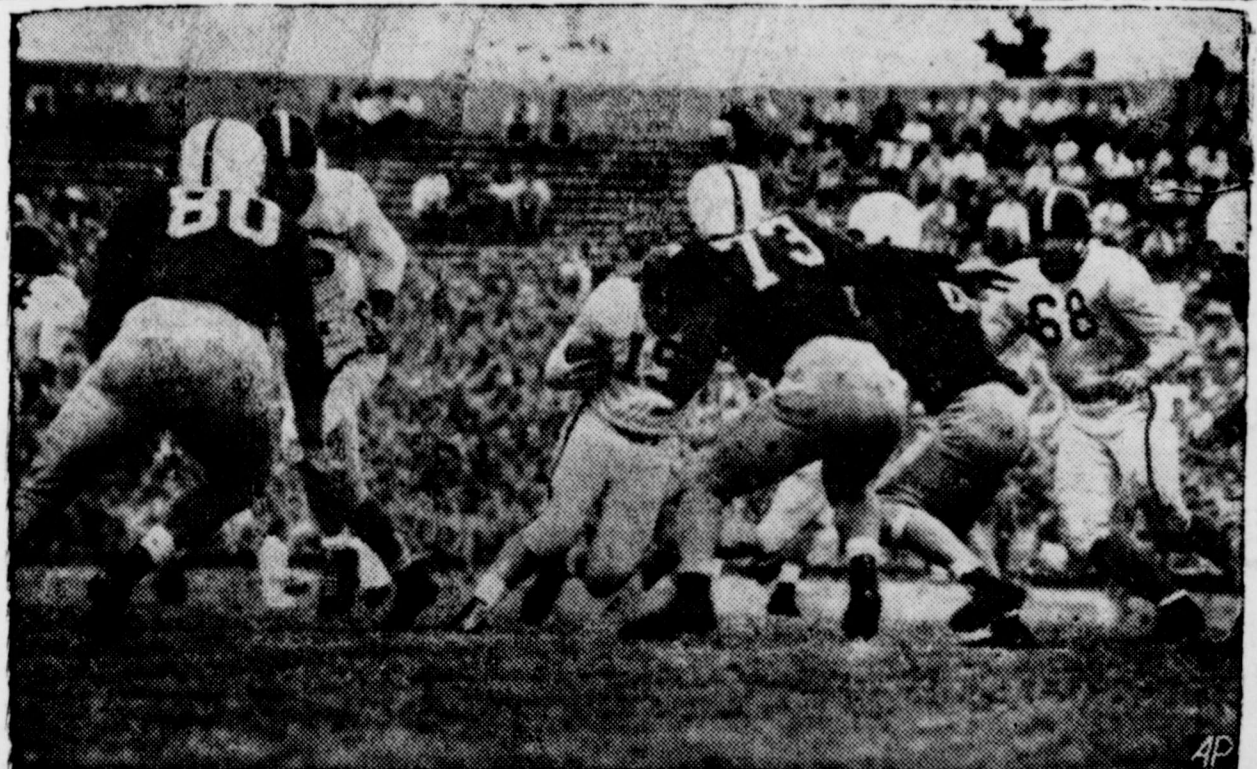

## The Texas Poll The Statewide Survey of Public Opinion

AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 30.—Although the national polls indicate Thomas E. Dewey will be elected president, a decisive majority of Texas voters will cast their ballots for Harry S. Truman Tuesday.

As of two weeks before the election, neither the Republicans nor the States Rights Party had won enough supporters to challenge the Democratic nominee's traditional hold on Texas voters.

A statewide survey by The Texas Poll, ending October 20, found the standings of the presidential candidates as follows:  
Harry S. Truman.....61%  
Thomas E. Dewey.....30  
J. Strom Thurmond..... 8  
Henry A. Wallace..... 1

Truman's relative strength was almost exactly the same in two earlier surveys by The Texas Poll. The most recent Gallup Poll shows him even stronger than that in this state.

The latest survey by The Texas Poll reveals also the popularity of Lyndon Johnson has dropped slightly since he won the Democratic nomination for U. S. Senator.

The trend in Johnson's popularity is charted in the following table based on four statewide surveys.

The recent jump in Johnson's "not-so-good" index is evidence that the campaign against his election is making some headway.

Meanwhile, Jack Porter, the Republican nominee for U. S. Senator, has succeeded in making his name known to more than one-third of the qualified voters. Considering the short time he has been campaigning, this is no small achievement. The names of only a few of the major state officials can be recalled by more than one-third of the voters, according to other surveys.

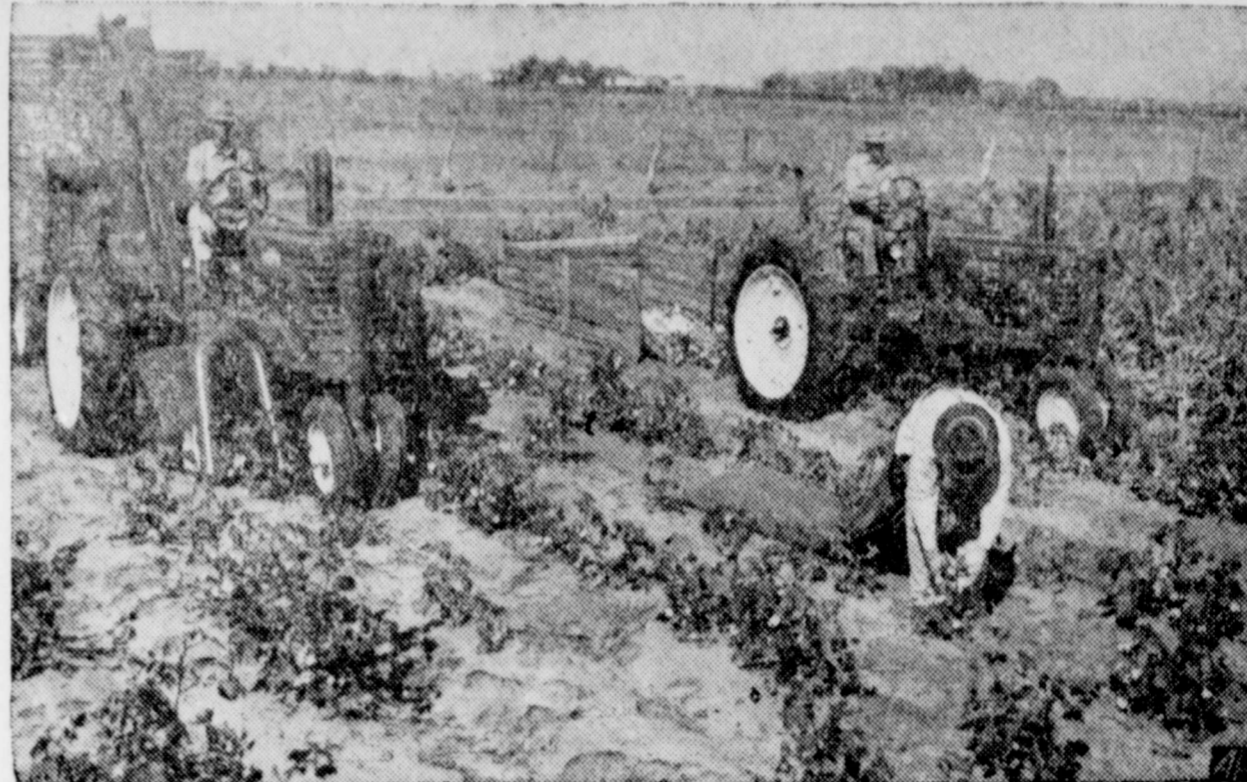

When friends drop in for tea or coffee, your own home-made bread will add a gracious touch. Make Orange Nut Tea Bread ahead of time for it slices better after 24 hours. Cream together 1/4 cup shortening, 1 cup sugar. Add 1 egg, beaten. Sift together 3 cups flour, 1/4 tsp. baking powder, 1/2 tsp. baking soda, 1 tsp. salt. Add alternately to creamed mixture with 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup orange juice. Add 1 tsp. grated orange rind, 1/2 cup chopped nut meats. Pour into greased loaf pan 10 1/2" x 5" x 3 1/2". Bake in gas oven 350° for 1 1/4 hours. If you want to keep the Tea Bread longer than a few days, add 1/2 cup dates.

Broiled potatoes turn out crisp and brown when peeled raw, sliced quarter inch thick, dipped in oil and placed on pre-heated broiler pan under medium flame. About 6 to 8 minutes on one side and 5 on the other make them just right for a quick-broiled dinner.

When the gas flame is turned down to simmer point after bringing vegetables to the boil, you save about 75 per cent in fuel.

If you are buying a new automatic gas water heater, be sure that it is adequately sized. Your utility company or dealer will tell you, for example, that some automatic appliances use more hot water than the manual types.

If baked apples are filled with jelly for the last 5 minutes of cooking, the children will eat every bite.

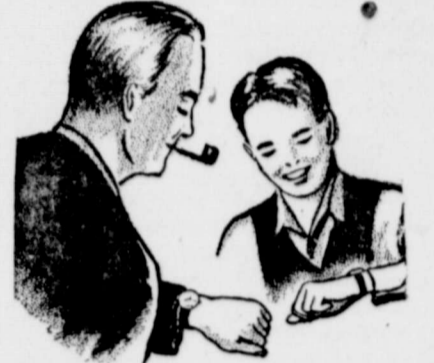

# Hornets Drop First To La Vega 20-19 They're Glad It's Over

**EXTRA POINTS ONLY THING  
KNOCKING 1,000 Pct. DOWN:  
A "MORAL" VICTORY**

If there ever was a "moral victory" Gatesville High School Hornets have one now! Even the La Vegas will admit that, but in the scorebooks of District 19-A, they don't have any exceptions or room for any "moral-victories". That is bad!

In that thriller, there were errors, yes, but in the overall picture, the Hornets played above themselves, and literally covered themselves with glory in a battle in which they were the underdogs, and were doped to lose by one or two markers. They did extremely well, and the game would have been theirs, if they'd been over their stage fright in the first period. That was when the game was really lost, but here it is, as it was unrolled on Thompson Field in Bellmead, better known to ALL Gatesville, parts of McGregor, Mart, Marlin, West, and everyother place within 100 miles of Waco and a large part of Waco and Baylor University. There were some 5 or 6 thousand in the overloaded grandstand packed double and tripple around the fence, in the aisles—everywhere.

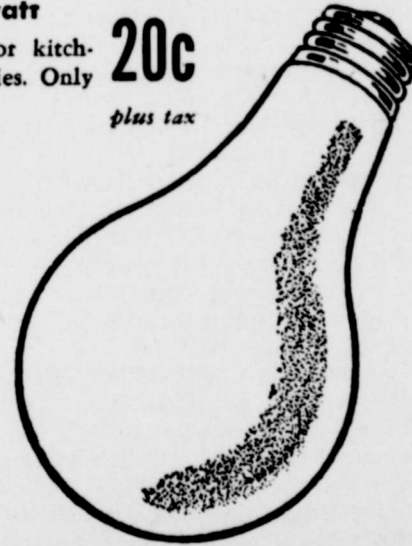
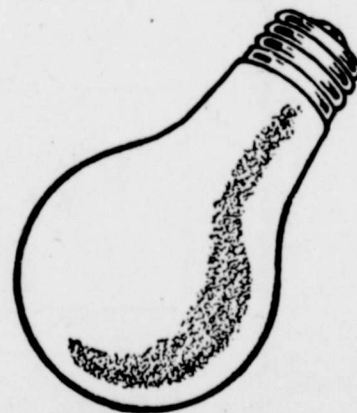
