This is enough!

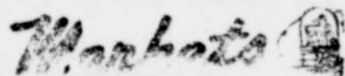
Concert Over For '48: Insufficient Money; Schedule Cancelled

Poage Announces Army Engineers Have Recommended Dam on Leon Near Proctor

Congressman W. R. (Bob) Poage, was the speaker at the Gatesville Lions Club Wednesday, released to the "country press" Thursday morning the fact that Army Engineers have recommended the construction of a dam on the Leon near Proctor.

In a letter to the NEWS and others of the "country press" he says: "Such a structure will mean the same kind of protection to the Leon Valley in Coryell County that the Belton Reservoir will mean to the Valley of Little River in Milam County.

"I realize that it may take as long to get this dam actually constructed as it has to get the construction started at Belton, but I am hopeful that all of the people both up and down the River will now understand the importance of working for a complete and coordinated program of river development that will bring the benefits of flood control to all sections, and I am happy to again pledge myself to do all within my power to secure the construction of this upstream dam on the Leon.

"It should, of course, be noted that the report of the Engineers recommends a number of other reservoirs on various tributaries of the Brazos. It is not to be expected that the Proctor dam will necessarily receive first attention. The Engineers will make their own decisions as to the priority of need of the various structures, but I can assure all of my friends

that I am not going to let them overlook the need for a second dam on the Leon."

Before this part of his letter, he stated:

"I have been criticized by some of my friends in Coryell County because I sought to secure authorization and later appropriations for the only project on the entire Little River-Leon watershed which had been surveyed and approved by the Army Engineers. I have tried to explain to these friends that I felt it my duty to get whatever protection I could for the fertile and populous valley lying along the river from Belton thru Cameron to the main stream of the Brazos. At the same time, I have repeatedly stated that I would work just as hard to secure a dam on the Leon above Coryell County as I have during the past fifteen years to get one at the Belton site.

"I have repeatedly expressed the belief that the best way to get upstream developments was to start river development at the point where the Engineers say the greatest protection can be secured by one structure."

GENERAL ELECTION RETURNS SHOW "THE DOWNS REMAIN SAME": BIG DEMO VOTE

SEVEN OUT OF EIGHT AMENDMENTS PASS, ONLY JUDGE RETIREMENT FAILS

Coryell County really stepped out in the 1948 General Election and an unusually large number cast their vote, most for the "straight Democratic Ticket" help-give President Harry S. Truman and his vice-presidential running mate, Alben Barkley another 4-year hitch in the White House. Coryell County's vote in this race was: Truman 2298, Dewey 304, Thurmond 88, Watson 5, Wallace 1, Thomas 2.

Former Congressman Lyndon B. Johnson completely vindicated his second Democratic Primary election by taking county by an overwhelming majority of 2177 for himself, Jack Porter 473, and Morris, Prohibition candidate 14.

This is complete, except for Leon Junction's box which had not arrived in County Clerk A. W. Ellis' office about 4:30 Wednesday.

For the Amendments, in Coryell, all of them passed with the exception of Judges Retirement, which failed 772 to 556 to pass.

The vote for the others were: (First figures for, last, against) Employes Compensation, 909-483; Districting, 744-481; Community Property, 810-435; Succession, 869-429; Homestead Exemption, 1101-325; County Salaries, 871-462; Advalorem Tax 710-554; Judges Retirement, which failed, 556-722.

Save-A-Farm Project To Be Shown Near Waco November 12

WACO, Texas, Nov. 3. (Spl.)—

"Burn down your cities and leave our farms, and your cities will spring up again as if by magic; but destrop our farms and the grass will grow in the streets of every city in the country," William Jennings Bryan once said.

Man's battle against soil erosion will be dramatically portrayed on a 172-acre farm near Waco on November 12 when more than 100 farm machines and a small army of 300 men will completely rebuild the farm in a one-day demonstration to emphasize the importance of soil conservation.

Soil conservation experts, representatives of every agricultural agency in the county and the agriculture department of the Waco Chamber of Commerce have planned the operation and businessmen are pooling men, money and machinery for the event which is expected to attract several thousand spectators.

The save-a-farm project will include installation of terraces, clearing brush, sodding, improving of stock tanks, fencing, planting orchards, seeding pastures, spreading fertilizer, landscaping and demonstrations of seed cleaning and treating. All portions of the project will be conducted so that spectators may move from one operation to the next with guides to explain the processes.

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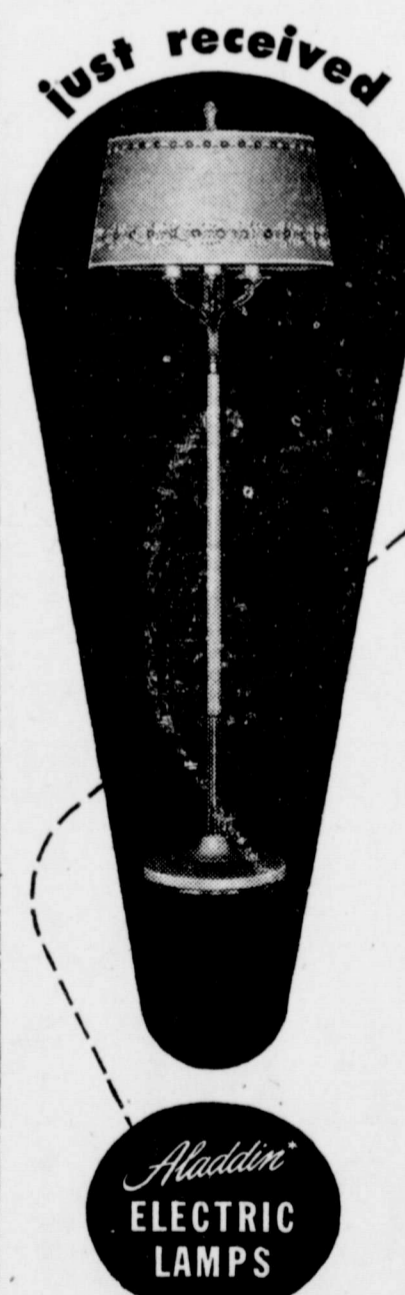
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
