

This was outlined Thursday morning of last week when the Agricultural Committee of the Chamber of Commerce met with President W. Dawson Cooper at the Chamber of Commerce Office in the City Hall.

Those on the Committee were Otha Johnson, Eddie Winfield, J. J. Bates, Tom Freeman and W. P. Graham.

As yet, the judge for the show has not been named, as he must be a member of the American Poultry Council.

Pens have been secured from Temple, and entry blanks have been mailed to 250 poultry raisers all over Central Texas.

The 38 sets of chickens given to FFA boys will be brought back, and judged, and the boys and girls turn back to the Chamber of Commerce which furnished the chicks, one rooster and four pullets to be auctioned at the show. which will help finance it, and the next year's show. There were fifty chicks given to 38 different individuals.



This Week in History

#### **NOVEMBER 14 to NOVEMBER 20**

167 years ago this week on November 18, 1781, Louis Daguerre, a French painter and physicist, was born in Cormeilles, France. To him, goes much of the credit for the development of photography. Several men before Daguerre had produced photographic silhouettes of objects but unless kept from the light, they darkened and isappeared. Daguerre found that a silver plate eposed to vapor of iodine became sensitive to light and that he could develop his exposed silver plate by treating them with mercury and "fix" the image with sodium thiosulfate.
