She is shown leading the Grand March at the Ball with Winthrop Aldrich, president of the Chase National Bank (one of the world's biggest).

Now, that IS LIFE-like, but LIFE, and even THE NEWS didn't know, that there was a Langhorne descendant right here in GV

He was Sgt. Edward Langhorne Johnson, and he and his wife, one 21, the other 13, stayed in Gatesville during his service at North Camp Hood, with Miss Olga Neufan and Mr. and Mrs. Tom R. Mears.

Notin' unusual about that! No, there isn't!

But,—, and hereby, hangs the tale.

In this Langhorne family, Suh, there is an heirloom, and it's been handed down since shortly after GW was head of these United States, or about that time, and this heirloom is a silver tea service.

It is handed down to the oldest member of the Langhorne family, and was in possession of Sgt. and Mrs. Edward Langhorne Johnson, Gatesvillians, for a while, some seven or eight months. This beautiful tea service, according to Mrs. Tom R. Mears, literally had engravings (of each handee-down) all over it, and was really something to see.

All of which is fine, and fine old Virginia families do things like that, but, LIFE, we think, missed the boat on a good story when they didn't find out about who had this tea service.

One of the other famous Langhorne sisters, Nancy, was married to Viscount Astor, and became the first woman to sit in Britain's House of Commons. She is world-famed for her sharp tongue, and Lady Astor (in LIFE) is here seen at a state occasion wearing, along other jewelry, a tiara set with the Sancy diamond which belonged to Queen Elizabeth.

One member of the family, during the Revolutionary War between the Colonies and England, hauled the Liberty Bell to Allentown, Pennsylvania, to save it from the British, who took Philadelphia, and was assisted by a man named Seabury.

We ought to have had Winchell down here during the war to "point out celebrities" to us. They were certainly Remember Will Rogers' son?

Biggest Cash Grab In 100 Years: Legislature

AUSTIN, January 12. (AP)—The biggest cash-grabbing contest in more than 100 years of the Texas Legislature was off to a furious start today.

The 51st General Session was just two days old and bills calling for appropriations totaling \$111,266,075 had been introduced.

This was eleven million more than the rosiest estimates of the General Funds Surplus. It was nearly a third of the total amount the Comptroller estimated would be available for spending from the General Fund.

Last Date For Farmers To Report '48 Practices At ACA Office Is 15th

There you are, Mr. Farmer. If you've been practicing 1948 practices during last year, get over to the ACA office and tell them about it, so says Clois D Stone.

If you've carried out a practice and have not returned your prior approval, this should be done not later than the 15th.

The ACA office is now issuing approvals of assistance under the '49 Farm Program to farmers on terraces, drainage ditches, cutting cedar, planting pasture grass seed and Hubam and Madrid Clover planting for Spring.

These have been issued prior approvals on standard and diversion drainage ditches and terraces. R. J. Nettles, Mrs. Ruth Russell, Louis Spross, Martin D. Clary and Doyle A. Duncan. Purchase orders on some of these were issued to Coryell County Beat 3 and Clarence Luker. Mr. Clary will construct his own terraces.

Prior approvals have been issued on pasture grass seeds to Joe Milner, John R. Baskin and R. E. Pancake, and it will be planted in drainage ditches built last year, to prevent the ditches from eroding.

NEW ARMY MEN, AND SOME GO BACK FOR SECONDS; ASSIGNED VARIOUSLY

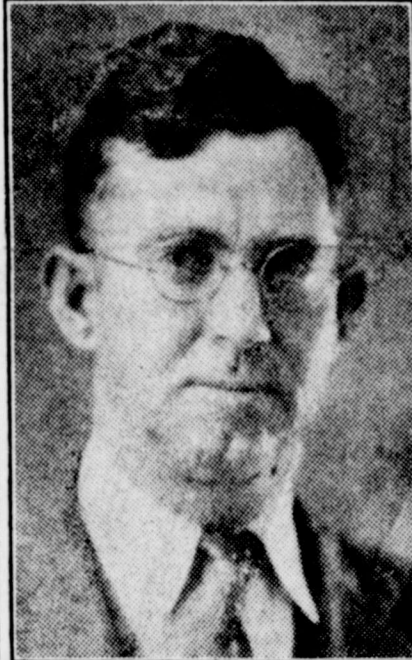
Uncle Sam's Army took some more men out of Coryell County during the past week, some 1 year some recruits, some old timers.

Texas' First "Town Inspection" Will Be Made In Gatesville February 16-17: Suggest Only

Don't get this wrong! There's going to be nobody telling you MUST do anything, when the first "Town Inspection" in the state of Texas is made which will be on February 16-17.

From 15 to 30 experienced inspectors will be here for this two day inspection, which is, and already has, commanded state-wide attention, since it is the first of such inspections in Texas.

Twenty states have had inspections of this nature and there are many "repeat requests". These have been going on for the past 25 years, and some 1,800 of them have been made.

The special Fire Prevention Committee, headed by R. D. Foster, will get cooperation from the Chamber of Commerce, Schools, Fire Department, Boy Scouts and many other organizations in making this a success.

Walter Plangman, Director of Public Relations of Texas Insurance Advisory Association, the Lions Club speaker, Wednesday,

outlined this work to the Lions and showed a film on fire prevention, entitled, "Crimes of Carelessness", by the National Board of Fire Underwriters.

Invited to be here during the survey, will be Railroad Commissioner Olin Culberson; Waco, Austin, Temple, and many other fire chiefs; and Gene Saunders State Fire Marshall. The inspectors will be representatives of Field Clubs and State Agents' Representatives of many fire insurance companies.

Details of the town inspection will be worked out at a meeting of the Fire Prevention Committee with several members of the field club, and the inspection will be of fire hazards in all mercantile, public school, theatres, hotels and church buildings and the inspectors will make suggestions, which, are not compulsory.

It is something Great for Gatesville, and Texas, and there's no question but that Gatesville citizens will go into the matter thoroughly.

'49 "March Of Dimes" Drive Opens: Mrs. Brown Reports on Last Year

The 1949 Infantile Paralysis Drive opens in Coryell County, according to Mrs. Lucille Brown, Campaign Chairman, and the campaign runs from January 20 thru February 5.

In her report, Mrs. Brown says there were 27,032 cases of polio reported in the USA up to December 11, 1948, and 1,743 of these were in Texas, and 7 of the cases were in Coryell County, and all the money collected in 10 years in Coryell County was spent last year, and \$561.62 was borrowed from the National Foundation to pay for cases treated from this county. The local treasurer is exhausted and a small account for one of the patients is unpaid.

The treasury had \$1,877.83 when the '48 epidemic started, and with the borrowed amount, \$2,439.45 has been spent in Coryell County.

Fifty percent of the campaign drives go to the National Foundation and is used for equipment, supplies, hospital grants, medical school and training those who assist in taking care of these cases. Also, a percent is pooled to assist during an epidemic as was the case in '48.

During '48, Coryell County lost one patient out of seven, and even after the patients are partially cured, they have to have further treatment, braces, etc., which cost money.

Mrs. Brown asks contributors to send their donations to any school, bank or business house, and as all workers are volunteers, don't wait for them to look you up; look them up.

This is one of the most worthy drives that is ever made in Coryell County; one in which no one is driven, and in which, certainly they should not have to be driven.

Gatesville "Ham" Gets Death Messages From Ice-Isolated Points

W5HOF, Gatesville, a short wave "Ham" radio station, operated by John Wilder, radio instructor of Coryell Veteran's Vocational Schools has, along with other "Hams" in ice-isolated towns in West Texas, been performing a distinct and only service.

During the current storm, one death message originated in Sweetwater, and another in another West Texas point, and he got the messages thru to Waco and Beaumont.

In addition to this service, the "Hams" have been handling all calls for Lone Star Gas Company, Atlantic Pipeline Company, Fort Worth & Denver Railway Co., West Texas Utility Co. and The Santa Fe Railroad, from points around Odessa, San Angelo, Kermit, Amarillo etc.

These "Hams" belong to the Amateur Emergency Corps, and they sit at their radios 24-hours a day during these emergencies. Texas is divided into four districts, North, East, South and West Texas Sectors, and Wilder is the County Sector Chief for Coryell County.

Gatesville Quint Bowed Out In Finals Of The Invitation Tournament

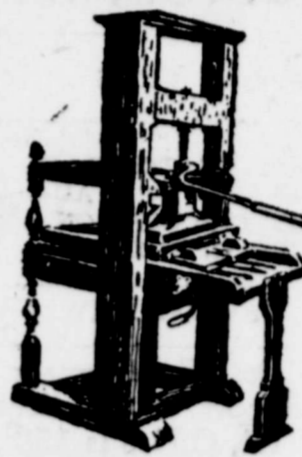

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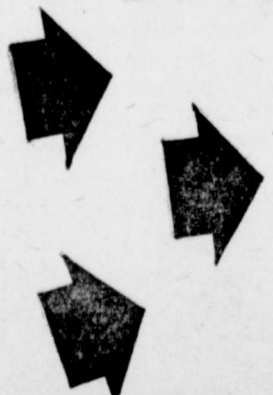

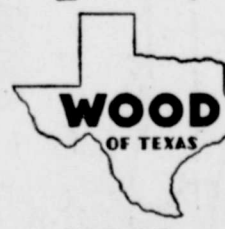

January 7, 1949.
Dear Friends:
With the advent of a new year and a new session of Congress it is my pleasure to resume my weekly reports from Washington. Mrs. Poage and I have been in Texas since early this fall, but inasmuch as I was on crutches most of that time and could nei-

ther walk nor drive a car until recently, I have not been able to visit over our District as I had hoped to do. We did, however, enjoy our stay at home. I am now walking with a cane and we feel ready to begin what will probably be a long and important session of Congress.

The Eightieth Congress met in

a final session on the last day of 1948. Members who had been elected to fill vacancies were sworn in giving them seniority over newcomers to the 81st Congress. The "Hoover Committee" was given extra time in which to report. Deceased members were eulogized, and the gavel fell. The Republican Majority was no more.

The next day the Democratic Members of the 81st Congress met in caucus. Here it was agreed to support a change in the Rules of the House so as to assure any bill that gets a favorable report of a hearing. I voted for this change both in the Caucus and later in the House, but I voted against the action which was later carried to cut off all debate on this proposal. I felt that those who opposed this change were just as much entitled to express themselves as those who favored it, and as long as I was insisting on a hearing for any bill, I could not believe that I was justified in voting to "gag"

the opposition in order to achieve "free speech" later. Many papers and commentators seemed to misunderstand the vote on this motion to close debate and reported it as the vote on the change of the rules.

On Monday, January 3d, the new Congress met in its first official session. Hon. Sam Rayburn was elected Speaker. He simply changed places with Mr. Martin who became Minority leader, as he had been two years before. The Democrats placed their candidates in all offices of the House—Clerk, Sergeant-at-arms, etc. They will take over the control and chairmanship of all the committees as soon as the committees are organized.

The Texas delegation met and selected me as their chairman for the coming year. This is an honor which I greatly appreciate even though it carries with it considerable work. The Texas delegation has long been considered as prob-

ably the most outstanding of any State. I shall do my best to see that it retains that position.

On Wednesday (January 5th.) the President appeared before a "joint Session" and delivered his "State of the Union" message. You have all seen his recommendations. I think many of them are good. Surely we should begin to pay the national debt. On the first day of the Session, I introduced a bill to pay ten billion at once. Surely we should recognize the need for expansion of our social security both to include many great groups of citizens like farmers, business and professional men, domestic workers, etc., and at the same time to provide more adequately for those now included. Surely we should recognize the importance to the nation of a fair wage for workers and a fair price for farm products (the farmers' wage). We cannot maintain national prosperity or industrial employment without a prosperous agriculture. Surely the farm family is entitled to modern conveniences. Before the message I had introduced legislation to extend rural telephones.

I could not subscribe to the President's recommendations in regard to the tidal lands nor to the so-called "civil rights". The tidal lands of Texas were retained by our State when we entered the Union. The Federal Government has no right to break its contract. Social equity between the races is something which cannot be legislated. Most of the proposed laws on the subject violate the rights of the States and the rights of the majority of our people. I want to improve the lot of our colored people. I want them to have full protection of our laws, but I would not deny to other people the right to employ and associate with whom they they please.

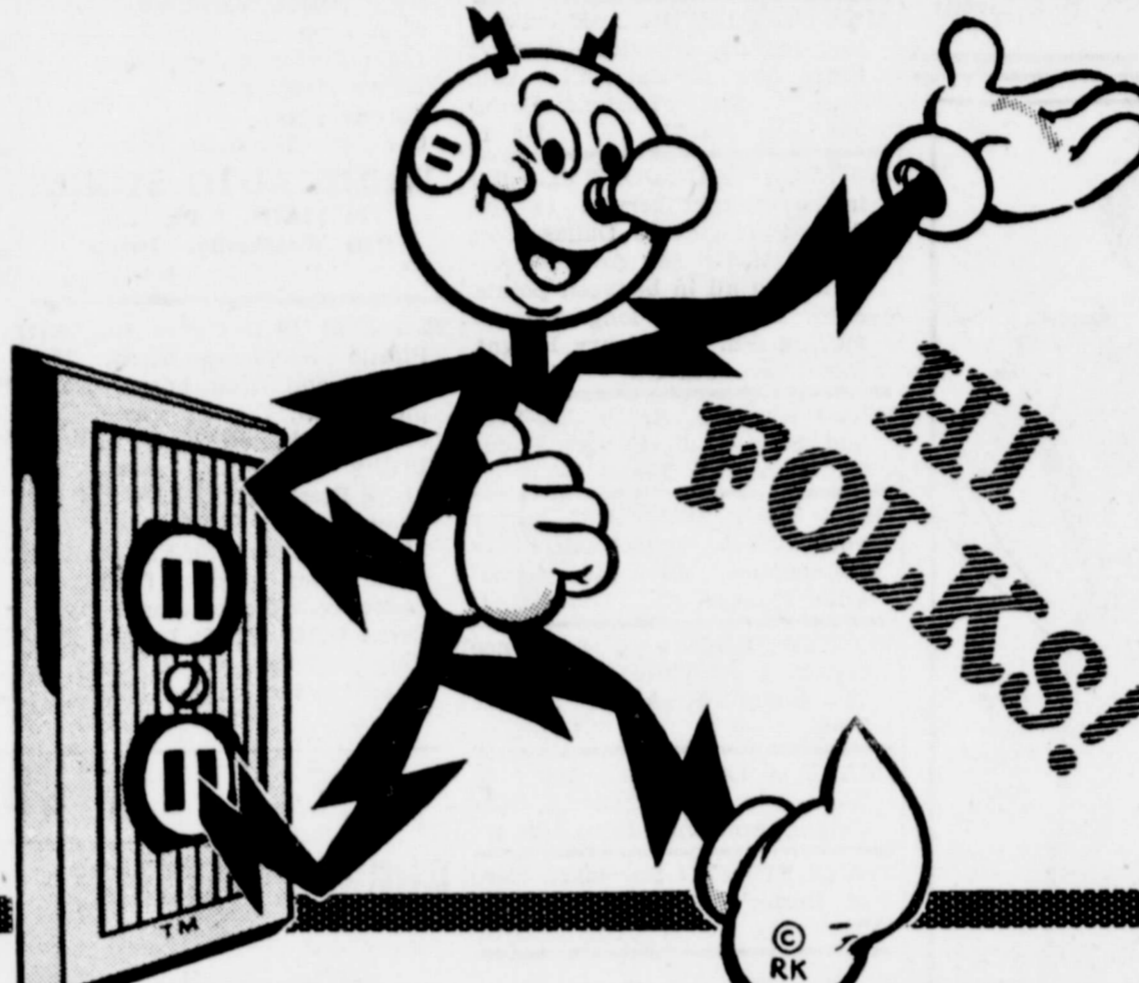
