
# TEXAS' FIRST TOWN INSPECTION STARTS WED.



AUSTIN, February 14. (AP)-The Texas Womens Christian Temperance Union announced today if would fight what it calls "disguised saloon bill" now before the legislature.

Mrs. Claude Watts, WCTU head, said the Union would sponsor seven Legislative Bills to Bolster Texas Liquor Control Laws, now before the legislature.

She said the WCTU had been forced into the fight by the "bythe-drink" sales bill now pending in the Legislature.

Meanwhile, the Senate Finance committee was expected to give prompt action to a subcommittee report on an emergency appropriation of \$4,000,000,000 for the prison system.



As we mentioned above, that we did not believe the 1732. geological convulsions that produced folding, buckling and breaking of the earth's crust which produced the Frankfort, Germany, in 1530. escrapment known as the Balcones Fault probably had nothing to do with the burial of the Leon River Middens, after continued explorations in that vicinity, we still hold to that opinion.

The Leon River terraces show to have been built by the process of flood waters tossing their burdens of silt over the river banks in times of high water. In those early times the river valley was covered with a dense growth of rank grass, timber and other vegetation, which was deeply and finely rooted to the soil. This vegetation caught and held the silt until it too, was annexed as a permanent part of the terrain. It was a long process that thus laid several feet of rich alluvial soil over the home sites, or, the ancient sunken middens of the Leon Valley.

The slowly spreading terraces finally reached far out from the river banks, and were several feet higher than the original soil levels of the valley. Behind this, flood waters entered the lower levels along the foot of the hills and thus the extensive sloughs found their origin, and found an escape for the surplus flood waters from the river. Now the sloughs are performing the erosive duty.

At several places, notably on the Fred Acree, Pat Neff thru which the rushing waters poured, and in doing so, have uncovered some of the subsoil, or the original

The camp strata here ranges from 3 to about 10 feet below the present valley level. The midden is only a few inches thick, and lies on the contact of the original light soil that was the valley level, and the deep alluvial deposit over same.

A mile or more up stream from this site, Pat Neff used an excavator to cut a channel from the river bank to a slough for the purpose of relieving the river of excess water, and to help control flood waters to prevent them from devastating his fields. This channel is about 6. feet deep, and the bottom barely penetrated the light soil that lies under six feet of rich, dark alluvium. After overflow waters swept the channel clean a large midden deposit was exposed in the bottom of the channel. Much of this midden material, consisting of burnt rock, flint chips, scraps of flint, mussle shells, etc. was scattered by the overfloy for a hundred yards down the slough. Here, on the contact of the alluvial soil the light original soil of the original valley level, I found another fireplace in situ. The characteristics were about the same as in the fireplace described above.
