They occur at all levels from the sand gravel that was the original valley floor up to and above, the present surface The cave-offs show the same cultural manifestations are present at all levels, however, with gradual improvements as one progresses upward
On the surface middens cultural intrusions, as pottery more refined technique in chipping, various artifacts, are found. Such cultural intrusions are highly specialized fist axes, pottery, boat stones, many "bird points" thumb nail scrapers, and other artifacts. However, the lower level types of flint artifacts still were in use to the very period when burnt rock middens ceased to be used, or piled up by the original American. Also fragments of seashells, and of obsidian, occur. There were intrusions from every direction. However, it does not follow that the original burnt rock midden builders were superceded by another race. The evidence is that the burnt rock midden builders absorbed the cultural intrusions and con tinued to pile up burnt rock middens to historic times. Also, the burnt rock midden builders were the first aboriginal people to occupy this valley, and that as the alluvial deposits raised the valley level the burnt rock mid den builders rose with each succeeding level and continued their dominion here. Cultural intrusions who that they were under pressure from the east and northwest by Caddoan races, from the north by the relentless Comanche, from the northwest and west by the ruthles Apache, and from the south by the coast tribes. The races when white men arrived on the scene in the early 19th century. The Tonkawa were removed from this region when Fort Gates was evacuauted in 1852. This was probably the oldest existing race found in Texas on arrival of the white race.
Two of the outstanding cultural traits of Texas find their strongest manifestation in the Burnt Rock Midden area, that is, the curved base tanged knife, and the corner tang knife, also the boat stone culture.
How long did this culture last? It lasted thru the period of time it took erosion to carry down silt enough o raise the Leon Valley level from three to more than ten feet above its original level on the "light sandy" founthat time the people who dwelt here found themselve always under pressure from other peoples beyond thei
