The "tour" took Cox and the men thru Hamilton, Comanche, Dublin, DeLeon and Eastland, where they stopped for gasoline.

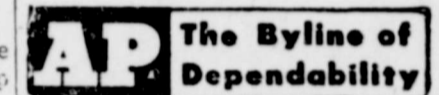
**Revival Opens For Two Days At Calvary Baptist Church**

### HAMILTON-CORYELL SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT

J. B. Williams and his son, co-operating with the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District has picked out of their farm plan several conservation jobs they intend to do during 1949.

During 1948 Mr. Williams constructed all of his diversion terraces and waterways and seeded them to grass. He also started his range program by resting the majority of his pasture a year long. In spite of the fact it was so dry his pastures have shown marked improvement.

This year he plans to seed 32 acres of old fields back to native grass. This and the balance of his west pasture will again be rested. He realizes that if he is to ever get his pastures back to where they will produce what they should he have to use good management. Mr. Williams also intends to construct approximately 6 miles of large channel type terraces. He started with madrid clover last year and it did so well that he intends to plant several acres more in the near future. They also built a nice Austin stone house last year which certainly is an asset.

Edwin and Roland Wright, co-operators of the district program had the technicians of the Soil Conservation Service run 7 miles of terrace lines on their farm that lies northeast of Turnersville, last week. These terraces will be the large channel type and will be constructed this year with heavy equipment belonging to the county under Commissioner Carroll's supervision.

All the necessary waterways were constructed by Edwin and Roland last year and were seeded to grass to prevent erosion when the terraces are constructed.

Love Young, co-operator of the Young Store group, had the district's engineers run all his terrace lines last week. These terraces will be constructed this year. Terrace lines were run and marked through small grain and vetch. If all farmers intend to get terrace lines they want it will be necessary for them to mark them through their small grain as Mr. Young has. If you are going to build terraces this year you should have your lines run as soon as possible.

Paul Hinson, cooperator and Ames veteran student, had the balance of his terrace lines run on his home place. These terraces will be constructed as soon as crops are out of the way and equipment is available.

Boone Wilkinson of the Pearl group, had the necessary terrace lines run so that he could plant his home orchard on the contour.

Berry Buckelew, Ralph Perryman and Dr. E. E. Lowrey cooperating with the district program planted native grass seed in their pastures last week. These areas planted did not have any desirable grass and it was decided that the only way to get desirable grass was to plant them. These plantings will be observed during the growing season with interest.

Curtis Maynard and his vocational agricultural class with the assistance of Ely Sargent, technician of the Soil Conservation Service sodded the waterway and terrace outlets on cooperator Glen Herrman's farm last Tuesday. A good job was done in approximate two hours. One of Mr. Maynard's vocational veteran students operates the farm. The class is to be complimented on their fine co-operation and for the fine work they are doing in soil conservation.

The bride is a graduate of the Gatesville High School, and at the time of her marriage was employed as Dental assistant to Dr. T. R. Williams of this city.

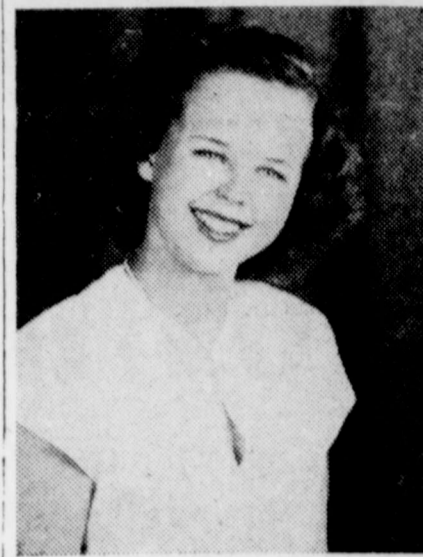

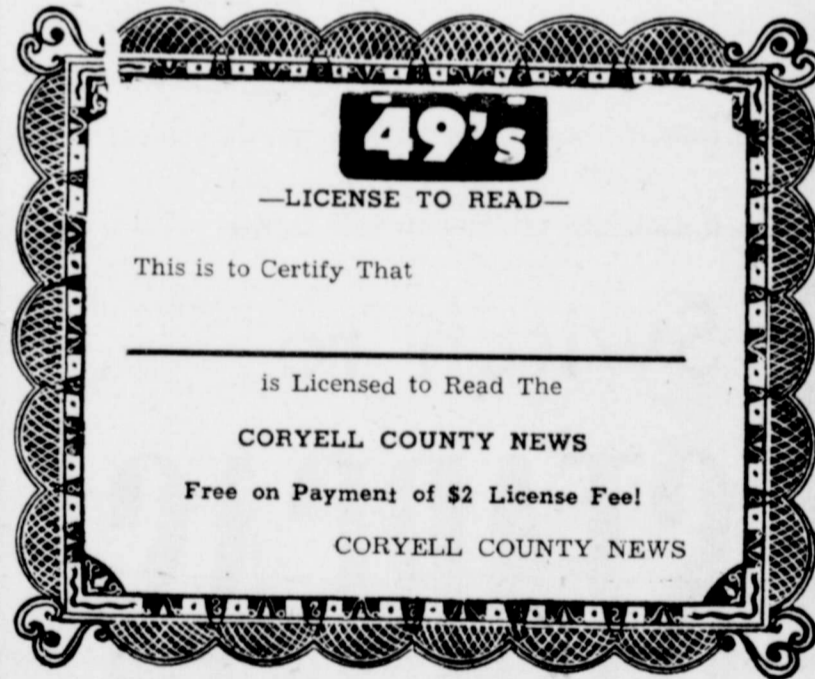

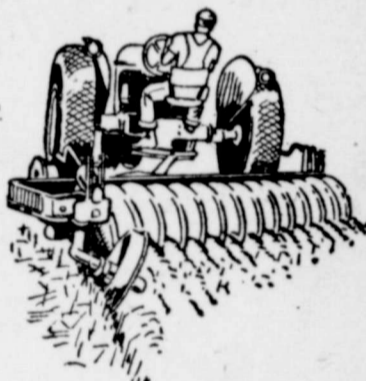
