GISD Trustees Meet With Architect: He Submitted Plans

Meeting with the Gatesville Independent School District Trustees Tuesday evening, Mr. Wilson of Wilson & Patterson, Fort Worth, submitted preliminary drawings of the proposed new school for the District.

The building is classed as a "functional" structure, meaning that it has all modern facilities for carrying on school activities. 24 individual class rooms are included with an auditorium, library, playrooms, cafeteria, teachers' room, principal's office and nurses clinic.

It's a one-story affair with connecting corridors to all parts. Each classroom has a bi-lateral lighting plan, which means light will come from both sides of the room in such a way as to eliminate glare.

The first three grades will have in each room all the working facilities and in addition boys and girls rest rooms, cloak rooms, water fountains and work tables.

A covered zone is provided for unloading busses, located at a part of the building away from the traffic and so that noise will be eliminated from all other parts of the building.

Overall cost, ready to move into is set at approximately \$517,000, including seats, library equipment and heating equipment, which also includes the best materials that can be bought.

The architect suggested the building be placed on level ground or at least not to exceed a four-foot fall.

The building itself, will cover about 3 acres of land, and 12 will be necessary for the playground, totaling at least 15 acres.

It is the plan of the board to select a site within a few days.

Brannan Outlines Farm Program

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 7. (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Brannan outlined today before a joint meeting of the Senate and House Agricultural Committees the new administration farm program offered to give consumers a "real break on food prices and farmers a fair income".

They would use many devices now employed but would make major changes to put more meat, milk and other dairy products, poultry and eggs in stores at lower prices.

Prices on these foods, making up 75 percent of the farm output, would be allowed to move freely, instead of holding up a market price with parity. When prices dropped below present level, the government would make up the difference with cash payment to farmers.

HST Wouldn't Fail To Drop Atom Bomb

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 7. (AP)—President Truman held out hope today that world peace can be maintained without dropping another atom bomb.

He told Democratic freshmen in Congress last night the decision to drop the A-Bomb on Japan was in the interest of saving 200,000 American lives and perhaps 300,000 to 400,000 of the enemy.

"Now I believe that we are in a position where we will never have to make that decision again. But, if it has to be made for the welfare of the United States, and the Democracies of the world are at stake, I wouldn't hesitate to make it again", he said.

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HAMILTON-CORYELL SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NOTES

Claude Ferguson, living approximately 5 miles southeast of Pankake has recently worked out a coordinated soil and water conservation plan on his farm with the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District.

W. L. Penny, Work Unit Conservationist, of the Soil Conservation Service, assisted Mr. Ferguson in developing this plan. Mr. Ferguson's plan consists of clearing cedar and establishing cleared areas to native grasses; terracing all fields; contour farming all fields; planting each cultivated acre to a legume crop for soil-im-

provement once every third year; establishing a waterway to permanent grass before terracing one field and plowing so as to leave crop residue on or near the surface of the land. Mr. Ferguson has approximately 40 acres planted to clover and vetch this year. Which is looking good. He is busy clearing 10 acres of cedar now. Terracing will start in the near future as Soil Conservation Service personnel have already run him 1½ miles of terrace lines.

He has his pasture divided so as to rest one while grazing the other. He realizes the importance of resting a pasture after planting grass seed and intends to protect his grass seedlings until they become permanently established.

G. M. Adamson, a cooperator of the district, living west of Topsey near the county line, has purchased additional land and has signed a contract with the district. Mr. Adamson has completed all conservation work planned with the district on his home place. This new place joins his home place on the east. He plans to tie the terracing system of the two places together.

Raby Alford, living in the Arnett community, has planned his farm with the district board of supervisors. Mr. Alford will retire approximately 50 acres of his thinnest land. This will be seeded to native bluestem. When this is established this will give him 35 acres bluestem pasture. Mr. Alford plans to rest his pastures each year, clear underbrush and cedar and allow 15 to 20 acres per animal the year round. All cultivated land will be terraced, contour farmed and will have legumes planted once every third year.

Vernon Wright of the Pearl group has completed his terracing system. The new terraces are of channel type and were constructed with heavy equipment belonging to the county under the supervision of County Commissioner Curtis Smith. Mr. Wright said, "that although his terraces had just been completed they withstood the big rain of a couple of weeks ago in fine shape." He stated he had lots of water capacity to spare.

Marvin Matlage, cooperator of the South Coryell City group, has had the district engineers run 3 miles of terrace lines the past week. Mr. Matlage plans to have these terraces made this summer after small grain is harvested.

In cooperating with the personnel of the district, Mr. Matlage decided to have these lines run and marked through the small grain. This makes it possible for him to terrace whenever he gets ready as he won't be waiting on the lines.

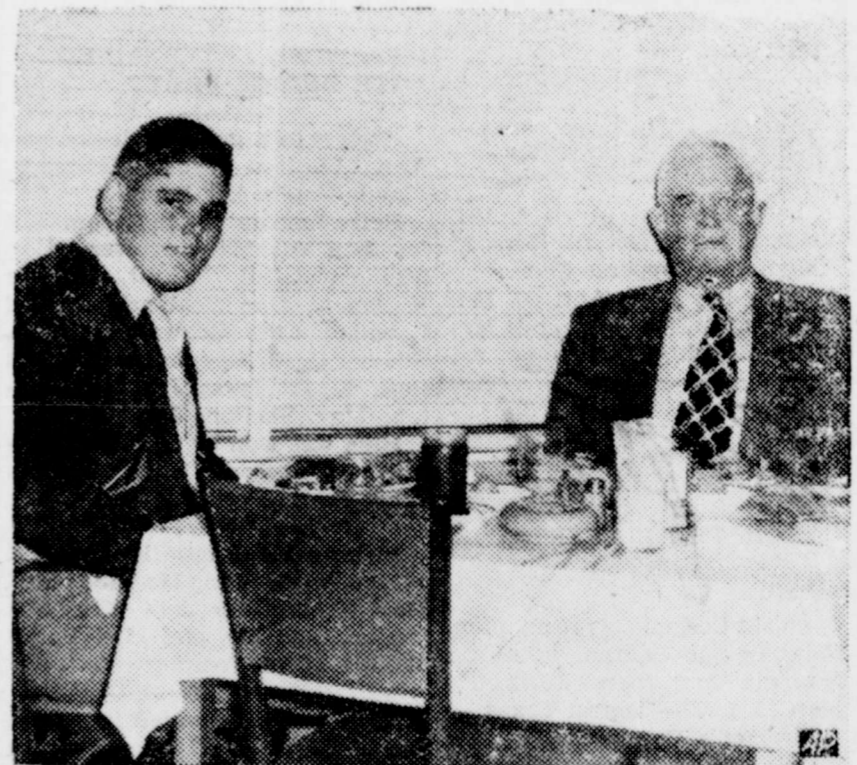



Dear Friends:

Every other Monday is District Day in the House. On those days the House sits as a kind of board of aldermen or city commission for the District of Columbia. There is no city, county or state government here. The District performs the duty of all of these governments. Like all other governments, The District has trouble in getting enough taxes to meet its expenses.

In my opinion the basic trouble is that property has never paid enough taxes her. The rate is \$2. That is less than the City rate in Waco and most any other city of any considerable size. It must also be remembered that this is all the tax any property pays in the District. It escapes entirely the school tax, the county tax, and the state tax that most other people pay.

The federal government makes up some of the deficit by a direct contribution which accounts for about one-eighth of the cost of running the District. I can see no justification in this and have always opposed it because I believe that the City of Washington gets benefits from its tax free Federal Buildings in exactly the same proportion that our other cities do from the post office building and other federal offices that may be located there. Monday a bill imposing a sales tax in the District was again brought before the House. I have repeatedly expressed my opposition to this kind of tax. I think it is the most unfair type of tax. The man with a family of nine has to pay nine taxes while the single person escapes with very little tax. I voted against the bill, but it carried and is now pending in the Senate.

Early in the week we passed the Interior Department Appropriation Bill. This measure contains the appropriations for the Reclamation Projects in the West and the Southwest Power Administration which controls and distributes the power from Denison Dam (and will control the power at Whitney Dam unless Congress changes the law as Governor Jester asks so as to allow this power to be sold to the highest bidder). There was a determined effort to deny funds to the Southwest Power Administration for the construction of transmission lines to connect the Denison Dam with the dams owned by the Federal Government in Oklahoma and Arkansas. I think we should tie these dams together and make their combined power available to the people at the lowest possible figure. I voted for the bill which carried without serious amendment.

This afternoon (April 1st) we have just voted, and by an overwhelming majority, to pass my bill to remove the unfair taxes and regulations against the use of margarine. This is a good example of the difficulty of putting through a change in the law even where a large majority favor it. Bills to remove these taxes have been coming before us ever since I have been in Congress. Last year the Huse passed a bill to repeal the taxes. Many people complained that that bill did not protect the customers at a public eating place. The Senate did not act on the measure last year. The first day of this session I introduced a bill, H. R. 3, repealing all taxes and other restrictions on margarine, whether white or yellow. However, my bill required all yellow margarine sold in public eat-

ing places to be identified as such. The Committee defeated my bill by a 14 to 13 vote, and reported a bill by Mr. Andresen, of Minnesota, and Mr. Granger, of Utah, which repealed the taxes but forbade the sale of colored margarine in interstate commerce. Mr. Rivers, of South Carolina, offered a bill to remove the tax and requiring no identification. After two days of debate we got the House to vote down the Rivers bill and to substitute my bill for the Granger bill, and then to finally pass my bill, by a vote of 287 to 89. I feel that we have vindicated
