Both her parents are dead, and her step-aunt died there February 18, and she left for Texas February 28.

A brother was killed in World War II in China, and the only supposed relative she has is this so called "stepbrother' who no one knows, who is supposed to be her legal guardian.



REPUBLIC OF TEXAS LAND PATENT

In the Coryell County legal records are shown many copies of the earliest land grant patents connected with the history of the county. These patents were issued by the constituted authorities when this territory now known as Coryell County was included in Milam County, and while Texas was yet a Republic, shortly before the Republic was annexed to the Federal Union of States.
