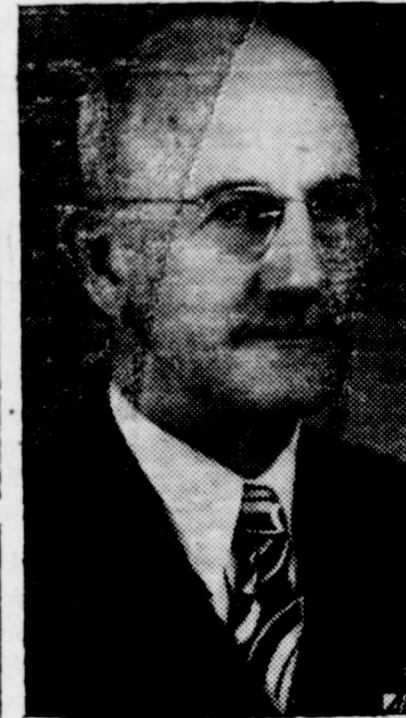
Coryell 4-H Livestock Judging Team Wins 2d In Stephenville Wednesday

County-Wide Co-Op Is Organized at Courthouse: Directors Are Named

At a meeting in the District Courtroom Tuesday evening, at which time the lower floor was covered with interested parties, organization of a Coryell County Farmer's Co-operative was started.

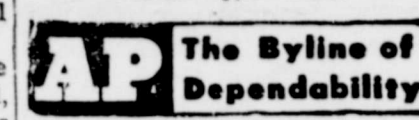
Directors named for 3 years were Harmon White, Robert Melbern, and N. Foote; 2 year directors are Paul Hinson and M. E. Fairchild; and for 1 year, Sam Barnard and James Yows.

It's a \$100,000 proposition, and common stocks go for \$5, and preferred for \$10. Owners of common stocks vote, and preferreds participate in dividends up to 6% "patronage" payments, if a profit is shown, will be 4% of purchases.

It was voted that the directors would name the officers, a president and secretary at a later meeting, and also pass on the by-laws, and name a manager.

Operation of the new establishment is expected to begin in about 2 months. What the co-op will handle will be worked out by the directors, and most co-ops, it is understood, are both marketing places for farm produce, as well as outlets for various merchandise such as fuels, fertilizers, appliances, implements, and whatever they may choose to handle. Ninety-nine out of every hundred organized have been successful, it was reported.

The co-op is a consolidation and development of some 8 co-operatives as follows: Mound, Flat, Arnett, Copperas Cove, Gatesville, Turnersville, Ames, The Grove and Pearl.

CITY PADRES ORDER ELECTION FOR MAY 14: 2-JOINT PROPOSITIONS

There's a lot of it on the inside! For details, read the citation in today's NEWS, and May 14, go vote for two necessities!

Tuesday evening, the City Council completed arrangements for an election to be held May 14, on two propositions, which are interdependent on each other. They are:

\$180,000 bond authorization for water facilities, lines, etc, and 2nd, \$70,000 bond authorization for Sewage facilities, lines, etc.

Both these will be financed, or rather the bonds paid, by slight increases in sewage charges (25c a month per bill) and a slight increase in water charges, which is expected to amount to from 60c to \$1.50 per water bill, with about a 90c average increase.

The bonds are for 25 years, with a 10 year option, and have been sold at 2.789 per cent interest.

Parts of the town which have never enjoyed these privileges will be serviced, and there will be considerable increase in water pressure throughout the city.

For the "taxpayer", estimates of from 5 to 15 percent are possible in savings on fire insurance due to the increased water facilities.

W. T. Hix Building New Home 30x90 For Gatesville Messenger

Construction started this week for W. T. Hix at the corner of South 7th and Bridge, on a new building which will, about August be occupied by The Gatesville Messenger and Star-Forum.

The building will be built of Elgin Tile with steel windows and asphalt tile floors. Plenty of windows will be on the south, and an overhead door at the loading platform at the rear on the Bridge Street side.

The lobby will be spacious, and separated from the shop of the building. Fred Smith is the contractor.

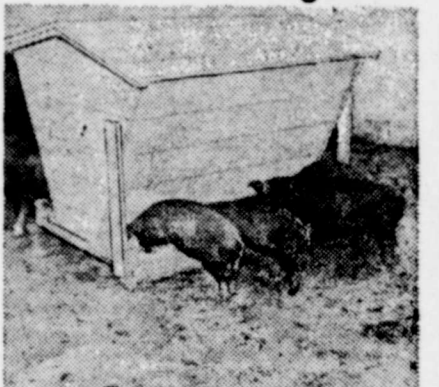

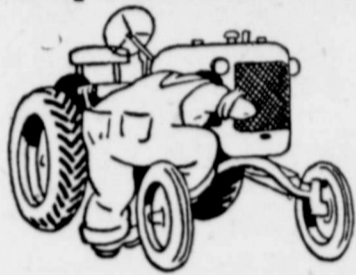

HISTORY OF CORYELL COUNTY

(Continued From Last Week)

Originally the post office was Wayback. When the petition for a post office was sent to the Department it called for the name Swayback, for Swayback Mountain, which stands as a sentinel guard near the town, but thru an error in spelling of the name, the new post office was authorized as Wayback until 1890. Henry Reavis was first postmaster.

E. P. Davenport and Ben Asbury freighted from Wayback to and from Waco. When they registered in Waco hotels they always signed as from Pearl, because they did not like the name Wayback. In 1890 E. P. Davenport, J. H. Harrison, and Ben Asbury petitioned for a change of the post office to Pearl. The name was granted and continued as Pearl.

Parks Blackstock built a horsepower gin in 1880. It was a 60 saw gin and was fed by hand. In 1870 Mr. Blackstock grew a wheat crop. There were no threshing machines in those days. A large place on a smooth stone was cleaned of all rubble. The wheat sheaves were placed on the stone floor and horses ridden over until the wheat was threshed. The chaff was then winded out by shoveling the wheat up and letting the wind blow the chaff away.

Miss Jennie Roberts taught the first school in a log house, puncheon floor, and split logs for benches. She now lives in Burleson County, and is Mrs. Tom Davenport. Later F. M. Long taught school there and always wore his sixshooter, or brought his winchester.

Fauntleroy Crossing, on the Leon River near Gatesville, was named for Col. F. W. Fauntleroy who served in the Mexican War of 1846-48 and settled near Gatesville in the early 1850's. He was the first District Attorney that Coryell County was called upon to furnish. His service was with the court of 1856-58.

Browns Creek, John M. Brown came to Coryell County in 1855 and settled on the creek that now bears his name. When war between the States broke out in 1861 he entered the Confederate Army and was commissioned Captain. He planned the coup that resulted in the capture of Frank Harko, or Harco, who depredated upon Coryell County settlers during the Civil War. Harko was soon afterward lynched.

Jonesboro was named for William L. Jones, who came to Texas in 1839. He served in the Mexican War of 1846-48. In 1866 he came to Coryell County and set up a saw and grist mill where Jonesboro is now located. The post office bore the name "Jones Mill" but a wholesale billing clerk billed some freight to Jonesboro, the people liked the name and adopted it as the name of their town.

Langford's Cove: It was named for Asa Langford who

Her condition was reported to be serious Tuesday, but was improved early Wednesday morning as reported by the local hospital attendants.

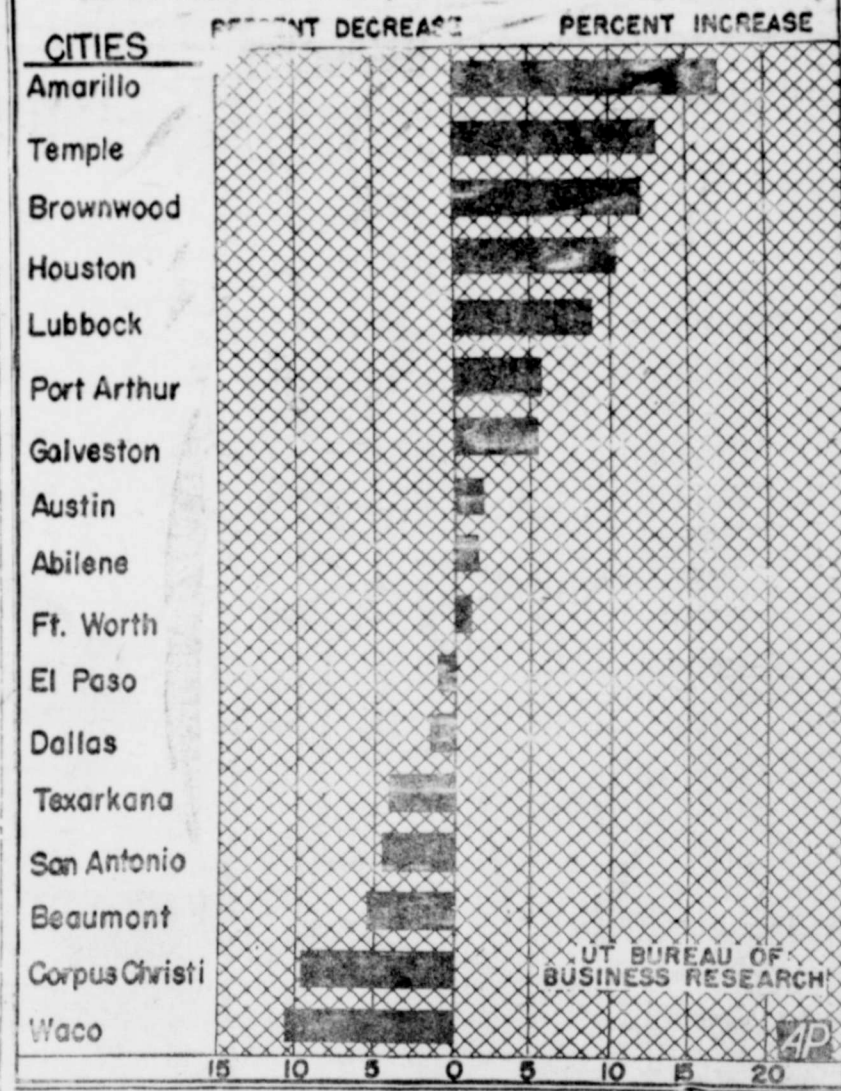

Texas retail sales for the first two months of 1949 were slightly over the comparable period in 1948, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported. Total retail sales for Texas were estimated at \$744,795,000 for the first two months of 1949. Sales of durable goods stores gained 6 per cent over the comparable period a year ago, while nondurable goods stores showed a 3 per cent

decline. Amarillo indicated the biggest increase among Texas cities, with a 17 per cent rise over the first two months of 1948. Sales for 1949 were up 13 per cent in Temple; 12 per cent in Brownwood; and 10 per cent in Houston. On the other hand sales for January and February 1949 were some what below a like period in 1949 in a number of Texas cities. Retail sales dropped 10 per cent in Waco and Corpus Christi and 5 per cent in Beaumont. (AP) Chart.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Gatesville, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purposes hereinafter stated; therefore
BE IT ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GATESVILLE, TEXAS:

I.
That an election be held on the 14th day of May, 1949, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the qualified electors who own taxable property in said City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1.

"SHALL the City Council of the City of Gatesville, Texas, be authorized to issue ONE HUNDRED EIGHTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$180,000) of revenue bonds of said City for the purpose of constructing improvements, enlargements, extensions and repairs to the City's Water System, said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed twenty-five (25) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed THREE AND ONE-HALF PER CENTUM (3½%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; such revenue bonds to be special obligations of the City, payable as to both principal and interest from and secured by an exclusive first lien on and pledge of the revenues of the City's combined Water System and Sanitary Sewer System, after deduction of reasonable operation and maintenance expenses?"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2

"SHALL the City Council of the City of Gatesville, Texas, be authorized to issue SEVENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$70,000) of revenue bonds of said City for the purpose of constructing improvements, enlargements, extensions and repairs to the City's Sanitary Sewer System, said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed twenty-five (25) years from their date, and to bear interest at a

rate not to exceed THREE AND ONE-HALF PER CENTUM (3½%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; such revenue bonds to be special obligations of the City, payable as to both principal and interest from and secured by an exclusive first lien on and pledge of the revenues of the City's combined Water System and Sanitary Sewer System, after deduction of reasonable operation and maintenance expenses?"

II.

In the event the said revenue bonds are authorized to be issued by a majority of the qualified electors of said City, voting at said election, and the same are issued and sold, the holder or holders of such bonds shall never have the right to demand payment thereof out of any funds raised, or to be raised, by taxation; and each bond issued or executed in pursuance of such election, shall contain this clause:

"The holder hereof shall never have the right to demand payment of this obligation out of any funds raised, or to be raised, by taxation."

III.

The City of Gatesville being divided into two Wards, each of which is officially designated as an election precinct, the polling places in each such precinct, and the Officers to serve thereat in the aforesaid election, shall be as follows:

That the ballots of said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF WATER REVENUE BONDS AND THE PLEDGING OF THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S COMBINED WATER AND SEWER SYSTEMS TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF."
"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF WATER REVENUE BONDS AND THE PLEDGING OF THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S COMBINED WATER AND SEWER SYSTEMS TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF."

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF SEWER REVENUE BONDS AND THE PLEDGING OF THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S COMBINED WATER AND SEWER SYSTEMS TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF."
"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF SEWER REVENUE BONDS AND THE PLEDGING OF THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S COMBINED WATER AND SEWER SYSTEMS TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF."

AS TO EACH of the foregoing propositions, each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote on the two propositions, respectively.

VI.

That a copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of Gatesville, and attested by the City Secretary, shall serve as proper notice of said election.

VII.

That notice of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this order, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS." Said notice shall be posted at the City Hall and at each of the polling places herein designated, same being public places within said City, not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date on which said election is

to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in The Gatesville Messenger and Coryell County News, newspapers of general circulation, published in the City of Gatesville, Texas, the first day of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date set for said election.

VIII.

That all revenue bonds of the two series hereinabove mentioned are to be ratably secured in such manner that no one bond shall have priority of lien over any other bonds, it being the intent hereof to provide for the creation of an indebtedness against the City's combined Water and Sewer Systems for the purposes hereinabove stated, and which bonds, if approved by the qualified voters, voting at the election herein and hereby ordered, are to be issued as one series, aggregating the principal sum of TWO HUNDRED-FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$250,000).

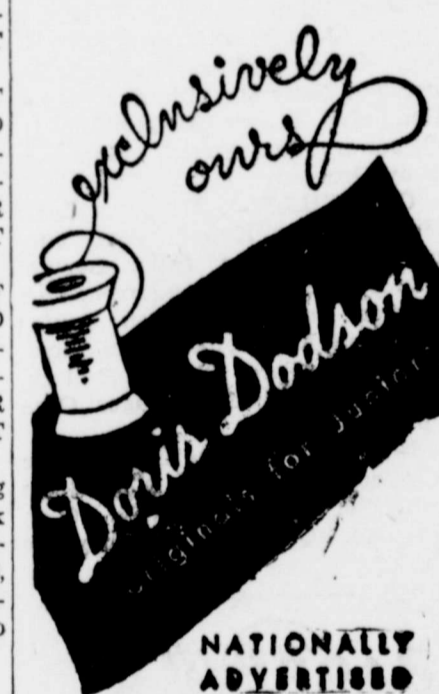

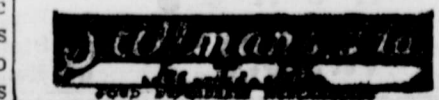

established a ranch there in 1854. A small creek near Evant is also named for Mr. Langford. James Carter also established an extensive homestead there in 1854.

Gholsons Gap: On Highway 66, south of Evant, is named for Frank Gholson who established himself there in 1855. He later did cow ranching on a large scale. It is said that he, at one time, owned more than 5,000 cattle.

Cherry Bluff: A massive limestone bluff overlooking Coryell Creek from the west, on the steep hillsides below the wild cherry grows in profusion. Hence the name of Cherry Bluff.

Schley: A school community in this county, named for a prominent pioneer family.

Nathaglin Creek received its name from an amusing circumstance. A long time ago young folks went to church and to parties on horseback. On their way to church one Sunday, a young couple rode down to the crossing on this creek. The young man's horse crossed; the young lady's horse leaped the stream, throwing the young lady off into the water. The young man dismounted and ran to his lady's assistance crying "Honey are you hurt?" Honey was not hurt, but since fermented honey makes a kind of vinegar colloquially called "Nathaglin, or Nathaglum" the people promptly gave the name to the creek.

Tama, was named for Miss Tama Alexander, according to Mr. E. W. Stewart of Copperas Cove. The young lady's father had a store there in 1898, but later moved.

Morrison Hollow: According to I. C. Donaldson, was named for H. M. Morrison who settled near The Grove in the 1850's. The Hollow is a ravine which empties its waters into the Leon River near the old Skinner Crossing below Neff Park. In early days it was used by cattlemen to drive their cattle to water in times of drought.

Skinner Crossing was also named for an early pioneer who opened a ford on the Leon River.

B. Perryman, whose father came to Coryell County in 1852, informs us that Table Rock Creek was so named because of peculiar rock formations found there, which resemble a stone table. Large flat stones supported by a single column.

W. H. Chambers patented a large tract of prairie land near The Grove, and left his name attached to that prairie land.

Anson Jones, one time President of the Texas Republic patented a large tract of land in Coryell County.

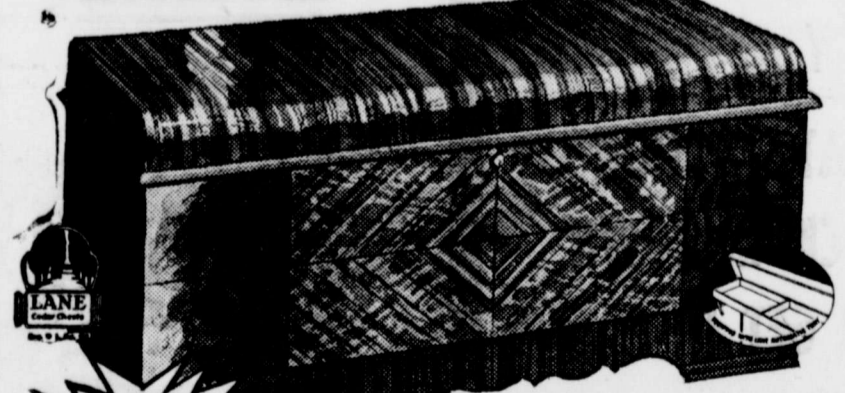
Elms Crossing on the Cow House River was named for David Elms who settled near Sugar Loaf Mountain in 1852, and in 1855 bought land on the Cow House River at the point where the Waco-Georgetown Stage line crossed that stream.

Potter's Crossing on the Cow House River, according

to Rev. Riley Potter of Copperas Cove, was named for his grandfather, John Potter, who settled there in 1850. This was the Rev. John Potter, the "fighting parson" of pioneer times.

Perryman's Creek flows into the Cow House from the west and was named for B. Perryman, mentioned above.

Harmon: A school district in the western part of the county was named for F. F. Harmon.

Camp Branch was so named because early settlers found there the remains of large Indian camps. Many stone artifacts made by the Indians may still be found.

Before the Civil War, Bud Kelly settled on Coryell Creek near the present home of Ike Pancake. The spring which is on the Pancake farm, was named Kelly Spring, thus preserving the name of a pioneer.

When Camp Hood was established in Coryell County in 1941, the area of the military reservation included the locale of many of the place names enumerated above. Present maps of the county may not show them, since vast changes have been made since the military occupation of the area, which includes many thousands of acres of the southern part of the County.

GATESVILLE'S FIRST METHODIST CHURCH

The Reverend Robert Barnard Wells organized the first church in Gatesville in 1855. It was the Methodist and had for charter members, D. R. Franks, J. L. Montgomery and Matilda Montgomery from Ft. Gates, L. M. Robinson, Rev. R. B. Wells, Miss Mary Wells, Mrs. Mary E. Wells, Dr. F. H. Lutterloh, Joe Harris, F. H. Robertson, Sarah McElroy, Nancy Saunders and Lidie Pollard. The building in which Rev. Wells preached the first sermon and organized the first church in Gatesville was on the corner east of Peels Cafe, on the southeast corner of the square.

Wolfgang Apull, born April 25,
1900, in Vienna, son of a physician.
The discoverer of the exclusion
principle in atomic physics, and
winner of the Nobel Prize in 1945.

Gen. Henry Duncan Graham
Crebar, born April 26, 1888, in
Hamilton, Ontario, in a non-mil-
itary middle class Scotch-Canadian
family. Attended the military
career and entered the Royal Mil-
itary College of which he eventu-
ally became commandant.

Norman Bel Geddes, born April
27, 1893, in Adrian, Mich., son of
a Scottish father and German mo-
ther. As a poor boy he was ex-
pelled from school in the ninth
grade for drawing a caricature of
the principal on the blackboard.
From the age of 13 he worked at
odd jobs, became a portrait paint-
er and went to Hollywood to write
and direct plays.

Angna Enters, born April 28,
1907 in New York City. From a
childhood in poverty she has be-
come a "one-woman theatre". As
a mime, she gives short sketches
without scenery and without dia-
logue. She has been called the
"what-is-it" of the theatre. She
got her start by borrowing \$25 to
rent a theatre, and print handbills
which she mailed to names picked
by chance from a telephone book.
Within a year she was a hit. As
a painter, she has had several ex-
hibitions in New York and Europe.

William Randolph Hurst, born
April 29, 1883, in San Francisco,
the only child of a wealthy former
U. S. Senator. Hearst could have
chosen a life of ease. Instead, he
took over the San Francisco Ex-
aminer, a broken-down paper with
5,000 subscribers, introduced big
red and black headlines and built
it up. Going to New York, he
bought the Morning Journal to
compete with Pulitzer's Morning
World, and thus started his fabu-
lous chain of publications. His
publishing empire has been valu-
ed as high as \$200,000,000. Hearst
served two terms in Congress, was
defeated twice for mayor of New
York, and made a bid for Presi-
dency in 1904. His militant, con-
troversial journalism has kept him
in the limelight.

Col Katherine Amelia Towle,
born April 30, 1898, at Towle,
California. Her ancestors were
English on her father's side and
Swiss on her mother's. They had
settled in the New Hampshire and
Vermont regions in pre-Revolution
times and later crossed the conti-
nent as pioneers to California. A
1920 graduate of the University of
California, Berkeley, where she
majored in political science.

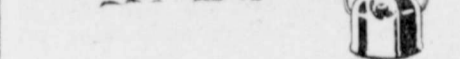
