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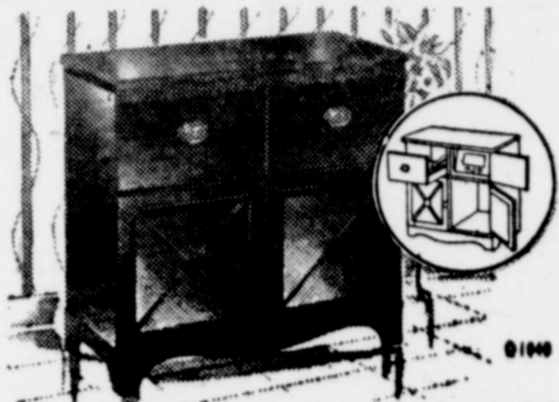
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NURSES TO RECEIVE THEIR DIPLOMAS MAY 15th AT PROVIDENCE HOSPITAL

HAMILTON-CORYELL SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NOTES

Elvy Sargent, an employee of the soil Conservation Service, has been transferred to Meridian, as Work Unit Conservationist. Mr. Sargent has been at Gatesville for the past 4½ years.

Berry Bucklew, a cooperator of the district and living 4 miles west of Purmela seeded approximately 50 acres of his pasture to a native bluestem mixture early this spring. This was planted with his tractor planters using sweeps and cotton plates. He has an exceptionally good stand and by proper management should get plenty of grass.

Dr. E. E. Lowrey, Aussie and Robert Whisenhunt, Ruth Yongue, have planted KR Yellow bluestem this spring. These have been checked and they have a very good stand. The grass planted on Robert Whisenhunt's and Ruth Yongue's places was planted in waterways and will serve to control erosion from terrace water. That planted on Dr. E. E. Lowrey and A. E. Whisenhunt farms is for grazing and seed source.

M. B. Rogers, tenant on the Ruth Yongue farm has been busy the past week sodding terrace outlets to buffalograss. He has done a good job. Other cooperators should sod terrace outlets while it is too wet to get into the fields. Outlets can be successfully sodded until June 1st or as long as there is ample moisture.

Sam Whitley, a cooperator of the district living east of Turnersville, has completed approximately 900 linear feet of diversion terrace. This terrace was constructed with heavy equipment belonging to the county under the supervision of Commissioner Carroll.

Frank Wilson, a cooperator of

the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District has completed 1600 linear feet of diversion terrace. This work was done by Commissioner Carroll.

Mrs. Litt Meharg, cooperating with the district has completed ¾ mile of channel type terrace. This farm is farmed the conservation way by Mr. Bohne.

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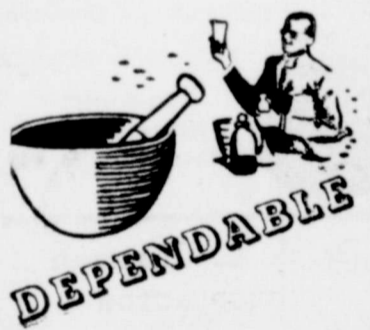
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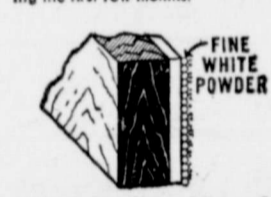
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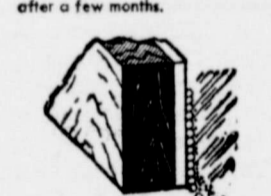
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TEL Class Has Spring Bonnet Affair Tuesday, May 10th

This rare picture of the almost extinct whooping cranes was taken on the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge on the Texas Gulf Coast last December by Lon Fitzgerald, staff photographer of the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Com-

mission. C. A. Keefer, refuge manager, said only 33 of the cranes are known to be alive. Recently he found the nest and two eggs of two captive whooping cranes on the refuge, the first ever made by the cranes in captivity and the first found in the U. S. since 1890.

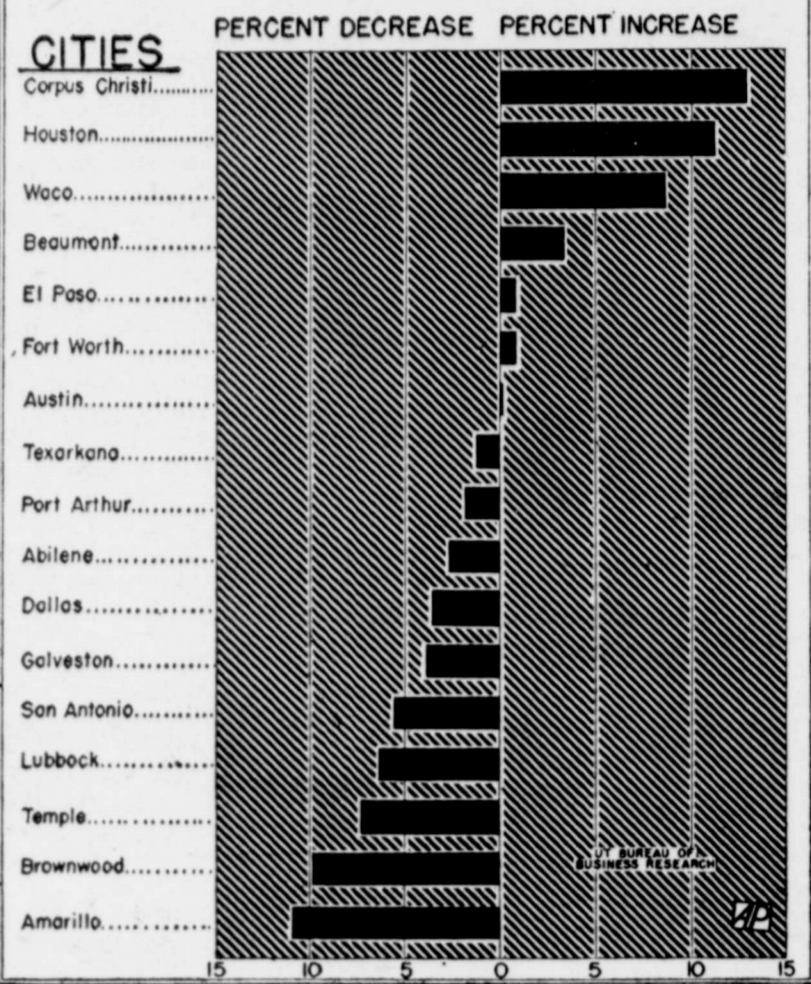

TEXAS RETAIL SALES DROP

Texas retail sales for the first quarter of 1949 were slightly below the like period in 1948, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports. Total sales were estimated at \$1,164,808,000 for the first three months. Sales of durable goods stores gained 6 percent, but nondurable sales slipped five percent below sales of the corresponding period of last year. Recording the biggest gain

among Texas Cities was Corpus Christi which reported retail sales for January through March at 13 percent above a year earlier. Houston registered an 11-point increase Waco nine percent, and Beaumont three percent. In number of other Texas cities sales for the first three months were less than those of a similar period last year. Retail sales fell 11 percent in Amarillo, 10 percent in Brownwood and seven percent in Temple (AP) Chart.
