YOUR NATIONAL GUARD DIVISIONS CONTINUE THE OLD TRADITIONS

This is the eleventh of a series on the Infantry and Armored Divisions of the new National Guard. They are presented to acquaint you with the organization which will be an M-Day Force, trained, equipped and available for immediate service with the Regular Army in the event of any future declaration of war by an outlaw nation.

36th INFANTRY DIVISION—From the Alamo to Anzio, men of the Texas National Guard have stamped their fighting prowess indelibly in the annals of our constant efforts for freedom.



The Texas National Guard, from which the 36th Infantry Division sprang, came into being as volunteer companies and bands of fighting men during the Lone Star State's war for independence. These men were the defenders of the Alamo, and from this beginning the Texas Guard continued through Indian warfare, a second war with Mexico, the Civil and Spanish-American Wars and Mexican border service.

In World War I the 36th Division was officially formed at Camp Bowie, Texas, in July, 1917, and its personnel was drawn from Guard outfits of both Texas and Oklahoma. By May of 1918 it had units in France, and soldiers of the 36th met and defeated the Kaiser's men at Meuse-Argonne and St. Mihiel to add more battle streamers to their colors.

Mobilized from Texas troops in November, 1940, the Lone Star division maneuvered in this country and sailed overseas in April of 1943. It landed in the gulf of Salerno, Italy and stormed the German-held beaches in early September.

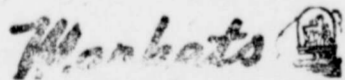
From there, the 36th moved steadily up the bitterly-contested Italian peninsula, its men braving heavy fire, snow, mud and mountains for months on end. It was at Cassino, and crossed the Rapido River. Shifted to the Anzio beachhead in the Spring of 1944, it took a big part in the final drive that reached Rome.

Then the division, with its famous 141st, 142nd and 143rd Infantry Regiments, made one more amphibious landing. On August 15, 1944, it attacked the beaches at San Raphael, in southern France, and moved rapidly inland. War's end found it fighting in the heart of Germany, with some of the top leaders of all Nazidom as its prize prisoners.

The fame of the "Fighting 36th" had spread far and wide. Many of its outfits had won Distinguished Unit Citations, and the French awarded their Croix de Guerre to the entire division.

Allotted back to its native Texas in the early postwar era, it's carrying on the old traditions today in America's new National Guard.

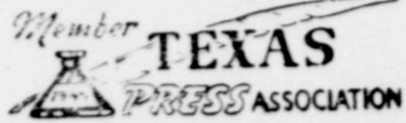
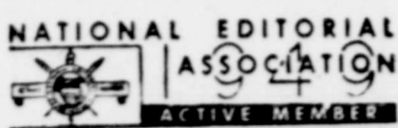

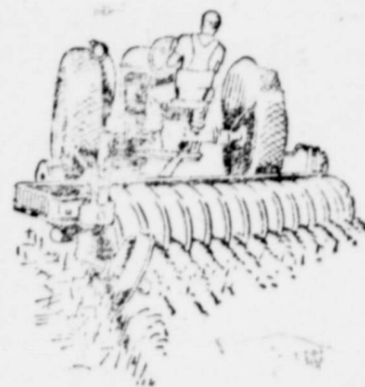

Cornelia Otis Skinner, born May 30, 1901, in Chicago, daughter of Maude (Durbin) Skinner and Otis Skinner, stage notables. Actress, monologist and author. She showed promise in dramatic ability when president of the theatrical club at Bryn Mawr College. Go to the Sorbonne in Paris, she studied acting at the Comedie Fran-

caise. She made a Broadway debut in "Blood and Sand."

Joseph William Kelly, born at Crawfordville, Indiana, son of a brewery wagon driver. This quiz master of the Quiz Kids on the radio started earning money when 8 years old after his father died. He ran for \$3 a night at a music hall and soon afterward quit school and made \$50 a week as "The Irish Nightingale" in a stock Co. At 11 he was making \$75 a week, but when his soprano voice broke he dropped to office boy in Indianapolis.

Ely Jacques Kahn, born June 1, 1884, in New York, son of a glass manufacturer, who came to the U. S. in 1868 from the Austrian Tyrol. At 19 he was graduated from Columbia, took his degree in architecture four years later and went to Paris to study design. Later he became professor of design at Cornell.

Grover Aloysius Whalen, born June 2, 1886 on New York's lower East Side, son of a general contractor. He left law school when his father died in order to take over the business. He became interested in politics in 1916, backed John F. Hylan for mayor and became general manager of Wanamaker's New York Department Store.

Maurice Evans, born June 3, 1901, at Dorset, England, son of a justice of the peace. His father's hobby was to dramatize for amateurs the novel of a fellow townsman, Thomas Hardy. Maurice made his stage debut at 7 as a shepherd boy in "Far From the Madding Crowd". Later while working as an assistant cashier for music publishers and acting in amateur performances at night he was discovered by a producer. He made his London hit in "Journey's End".

Baron Carl Gustaf Emil Von Mannerheim, born June 4, 1867, at Louhisaari, Finland, son of an industrial magnate. This field marshal, military hero and "uncrowned King of Finland" entered military school in Russia at 14. He rose rapidly in the Czar's Che-

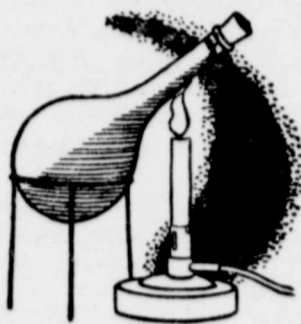

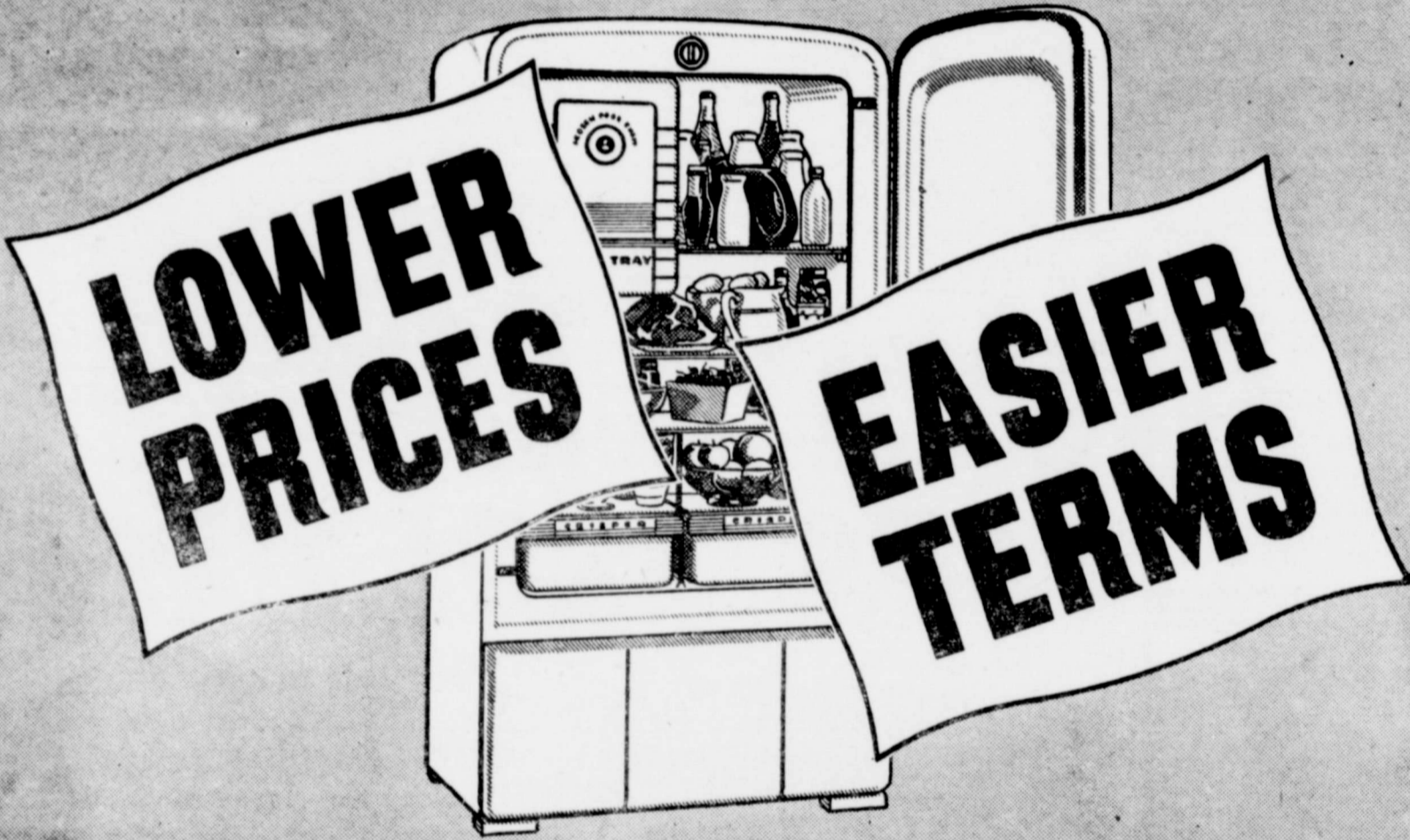

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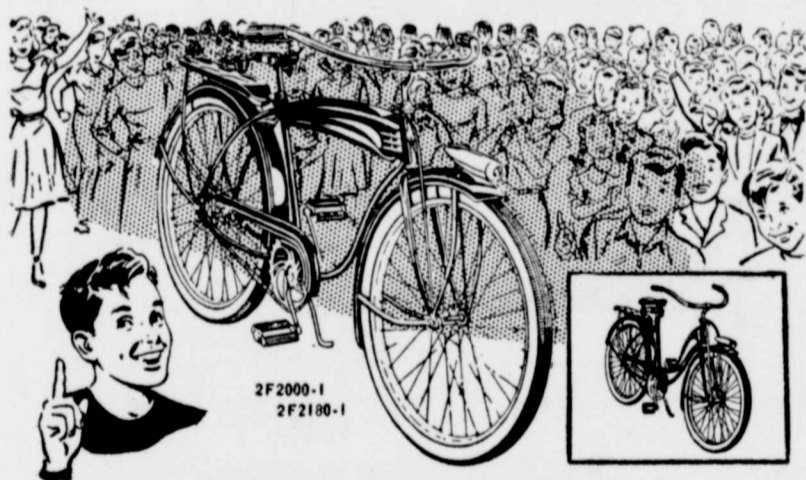

The Texas Poll The Statewide Survey of Public Opinion

AUSTIN, Texas, June 4—A large majority of Texas voters believes the Legislature should hold annual sessions, according to the latest statewide survey by the Texas Poll.

The Poll shows, however, that almost half of the voters think the lawmakers now have a regular session every year. Only two out of every ten realize that regular sessions come once every 2 years.

Qualified voters, as a group, are slightly better informed than the general adult public.

These findings are based on a survey in which the following questions were put to a cross section of the adult population:

Texas will vote September 24 on a proposed constitutional amendment requiring the Legislature to meet every year. The amendment also raises the pay of lawmakers to \$3,600 a year.

While voters favor annual sessions, they are inclined to oppose a pay raise for legislators. In a special election four years ago, a pay raise amendment was defeated three-to-one. The latest survey by The Texas Poll discloses that only two out of every ten voters believe members of the Legislature are underpaid. A large majority admitted, however, they did not know how much a legislator is paid.

County Agricultural Agent. W. P. Graham, states that the Cotton Thrips which did so much damage last year is orking on the cotton again this season. Along with this insect is the Fleahopper and in some cases the Grasshopper ready to get the early cotton. Farmers in the Oglesby section are sparying with Kiltone, a new insecticide which Sherwin-Williams Co. puts out as the greatest discovery since the cotton gin.

One pint of this Kiltone diluted with water applied to an acre of cotton is controlling thrips and beahoppers. Those farmers having cotton dusters instead of the sprayers would do well to start the application with 3-5-40 at the rate of 7 to 10 pounds per acre. It is supposed to kill all cotton insects and can put them under control if the dust is applied at seven day intervals.

For control of grasshoppers with Kiltone use three pints instead of one pint with dilution of water. The amount of water will usually be, if applied with a sprayer, two and one half to three gallons with sixty pounds of pressure. Anyway apply a definite amount of active ingredients per acre.

One pint of Green Light Chlor-

dane will also control grasshoppers. As both insecticides control grasshoppers the question will be simply the cost per acre. Check the cost of Kiltone, 3-pints, with the cost of Chlordane, one pint, and be overned accordingly.

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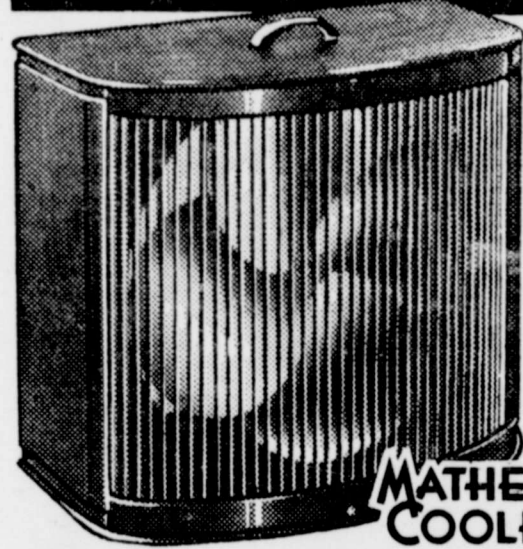
